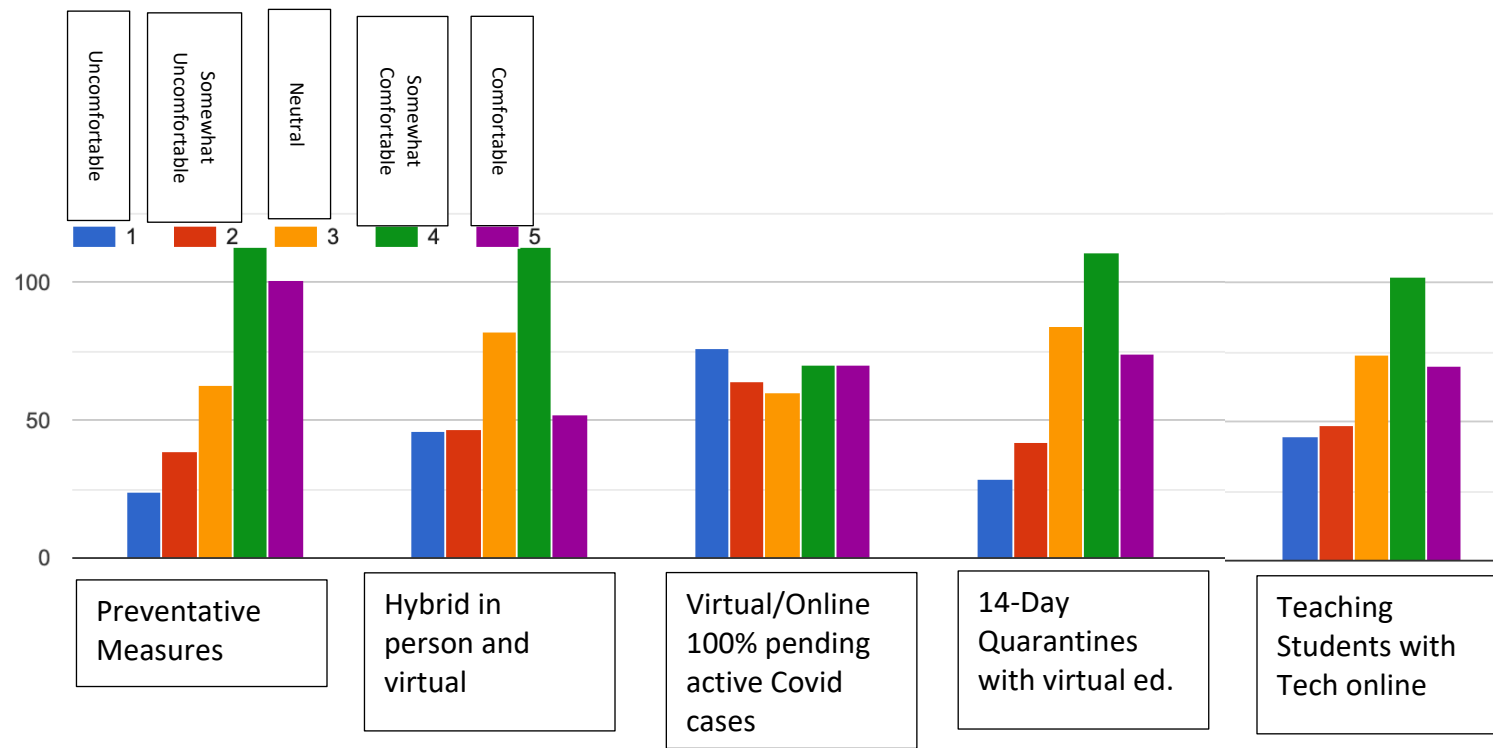
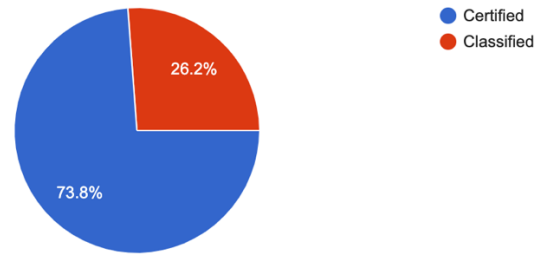

happen this year. We would like tech support for this task. I could use training on using Pearson on the ipads. There's a rumor that there will be something available from Great Minds. If it's a new resource, training please.

The one thing we saw with my daughter was that if not all of her teachers (elementary) were using the same way to post the assignments it was difficult to know if she did everything. The teachers that posted assignments only in the classroom stream

were easily lost by everyone's comments. If they all had a due date then she was able to successfully follow the dates and assignments.

<p>I feel that students who have parents that work, need to have someone who will teach them how to navigate the online process. They need to be able to navigate comfortably on their own.</p> <p>I had a lot of parents call me during the beginning of the online learning. They worked and then had to come home and help their student complete their work.</p> <p>They would tell me that they were not a teacher for a reason. It was frustrating for them and their student.</p> <p>I don't know if there is a tutoring process to help these students navigate, or if teachers can walk them through the process for their class and let them know what is expected of them.</p> <p>Have a number that they can call to ask for assistance when they don't understand.</p> <p>This is especially needed for the student who is a sped. Their needs are different.</p> <p>They are used to that one on one contact.</p> <p>I know my grand kids did terrible.</p> <p>They felt overwhelmed moving from 4 classes a day to eight. Having to try and complete the work in all of their classes. They were not prepared for the process. They were not aware that they had all week to complete their assignments. I think more training with how to teach online courses would be useful. In order to see a higher rate of student success I feel that there will need to be increased accountability this time around. Judging by community comments from several parents, they feel that their efforts were futile because their students received the same grade and the kids that did not do anything. Virtual learning was not an effective way for my struggling students. I recognize that many of the parents struggled with supporting their child with online learning due to not knowing how to utilize the technology and follow up to be sure they completed assignments, or they were not available to ensure their child joined the teacher &amp; classmates in Google Meets at scheduled times, or they had multiple children they had to keep track of schedules for, or the student refused to do the work or get in Google Meets.</p> <p>Thankfully, I was utilizing Google Classroom throughout the school year, so I was able to know how to create assignments for students to easily complete. I also had my own child join the classes so I could check to see how the assignment looked on the students end when there were questions about the student view. Then I made corrections. The students should have been familiar with how to get assignments from me in Google Classroom. The only addition I had was posting "Instructional videos" for students to watch.</p> <p>I don't think all teachers know how to post assignments in Google Classroom to where students can complete the assignment</p>

I helped some students figure out how to take a posted assignment that they could not type on, and generate the document so they could type on it, but had to e-mail it to their teacher and could not submit it in the Google Classroom. Professional development on the platform we will be using on the iPads for online learning for K-3 for the teacher side and student side. It seemed to be different than the computer and the teacher side was different from the student side in Google Classroom. Whether it is Google Classroom, Canvas, etc. An easier way for students to submit written work on an iPad. The iPads were very hard for the K-3 to use, do the work and watch the videos. The students couldn't figure out how to edit documents to write their answers on it. They struggled sending/submitting their work on the iPad. It was hard for me to walk them through it because I couldn't see what their student screens looked like. How can we address this going into the new school year? These things caused many frustrations for parents and students.

First, clear communication FROM THE DISTRICT must be sent to all parents with expectations and consequences regarding the upkeep and use of technology. All parents WILL BE held to these expectations and consequences. Additionally, if we go partially or fully online, clear and specific communication FROM THE DISTRICT must be given as to what students will be required to do in Google Meetings (ie: eating during a meeting, playing during a meeting, laying down during a meeting are unacceptable-when on line, you should behave as if you are in class, if you don't teachers may kick you out and report you to the principal--we had kids having entire meals with families online during Google Meetings) and if students leave their iPad at home and we are fully in school or partially in school, parents need to make sure it is brought to school and charged so they can do work at school on their iPad as well (this too needs to be communicated and enforced BY THE DISTRICT OR SCHOOL ADMIN).

Next, THE DISTRICT needs to make clear guidelines for teachers about what is expected of them during full and partial online teaching AND THESE NEED TO BE COMMUNICATED TO ALL TEACHERS THEY AFFECT AND BE CONSISTENT FOR ALL TEACHERS AT THEIR LEVEL OR DEPARTMENT. For example, all K-4 should have the same set of "rules" for online teaching time and Google Meetings (for example, one school shouldn't be doing daily Google Meets for 4 hours and others doing them once a week, this just makes one school/teacher look bad and others overworked, a happy medium needs to be found and communicated). Of course, the district needs to take into account that not all classes can be easily moved into an online platform (for example, primary grades are much more interactive and will need more prep/change to normal classroom work than a high school English class or the Welding, Woods, Metals, and Autos classes are impossible to truly teach in an online platform and actually have the kids learn anything). There NEEDS TO BE CONSISTENCY!!

Also, teachers will need actual training in Google Classroom, Canvas, and See Saw (this does not mean--"here, watch these videos, now your trained", like we have done with all the other trainings we are required to do on a yearly basis). I also think THE DISTRICT needs to decide what programs each level is going to use as their platform and have those levels use it ACROSS THE DISTRICT. For example, Canvas is not an easy program for lower grades, but See Saw is; perhaps K-4 should use Google and See Saw, 5-6 Google and whatever they best deem, and secondary Google and Canvas. Once again, the DISTRICT NEEDS TO HAVE IT BE CONSISTENT ACROSS ALL ELEMENTARY BUILDINGS AND IN THE SECONDARY BUILDINGS AS WELL.

We need to look at what online programs are available with our current curriculum and see how we can utilize it. From what I understand, Great Minds is working hard to assist teachers. Pearson was a pretty big issue during the crisis teaching. It's website

<p>was barely workable for most students and could not handle the demand put on it...this may be something to consider in the future when reviewing the curriculum for K-4 reading.</p> <p>Last, we really need to look at what teachers have access to on line and if those are the actual programs we want them to have. There are some amazing math and reading programs that the district does not want to support, but were saviors during the crisis teaching. For example, when students couldn't read anything on ReadyGen because the Pearson site wouldn't load it for several days, they could read from RAZ-Kids instead (it always worked). I have heard of Dreambox, but when initially told about it I was informed it was for K-1, now I hear we can go clear to 6th with it. We want to be with our students, we don't want to be restricted in proximity and we want students to have a place they can feel safe. We must remember students are still children who deserve to play, eat and participate in cooperative learning.

Students will think the same grading policy that was used last quarter will be used again. Some students did nothing in on line and got an A because of 3rd quarter. I understand the problem, I do not have a solution but I think many students believe not doing the work for whatever reason will be ok.

How will parents and students be held accountable? How do we ensure all SWSD #1 students have equitable time online. Should teachers have a minimum or set schedule of when things are taught each day/week. From what I have heard everyone was a little different which is fine but some classes had 1-3 Google Meets a day and some had some 1-3 times a week. I don't feel the time was the same across the district. If they don't do assignments what will be the effects? If we get to go back as somewhat normal. I think a parent night would be helpful to have students/teacher show the parents how to find assignments in case of online learning and where things are located and how to use the technology.

Hoping for regular school schedule as elementary students need structure and socializing periods with their peers.

The teacher needs to have some sort of direct contact with each student weekly, whether by email, Google Meet or a phone call when being taught virtually.
I am concerned with consistency. I understand that guidelines may change what we are able to do. But, if everyone uses Google or Canvas. (this choice could be school or district wide), this will streamline any back and forth that may happen. This will allow for students to be comfortable in all classes in that format. I think students struggled with having classes in multiple online formats so having all classes in one online place would help them to be a lot more successful. Also, I think we need to take advantage of the non-flu season with in person time, at least in small amounts, so students can be successful fully online during flu season if/when things get worse.
If masks are required for teachers, how will this work for teaching k-1 students sounds and tongue placement?
Please don't make masks mandatory. I can already foresee the challenges with having young kids keep them on and using them properly. It will also be hard to teach wearing masks!
As a special education programs teacher, I feel if there is a block schedule, all program students should be grouped together. It will be very difficult to provide supports and services to these students when half are at the school and half are at home.
The Tech department has done an amazing job! Hats off to them!
Just put student needs first...staff will adapt! I know it's hard (from our first experience) but it is doable! The more support for staff learning, the better. My job isn't just in the classroom, but in the community (by providing career exploration activities) but we found many resources online that students could explore. We may need to consider purchasing new and innovative career development tools for the online learning platform.
Farson-Eden, Wamsetter, and even Black Butte, to some extent, are different settings than the rest of the district. If these schools maintain compliance with protocols, will they be required to face potential closings if the rest of the district sees an issue? Can they continue to operate if there are no triggers requiring their closure, likewise, if there is an incident, will their closure be limited to just the affected school?
Being in school with other students is so vitally important for social and emotional growth. These students need one another as well as an in-person teacher to truly benefit from their time in an academic setting. If students have to be split into two smaller

groups, I think an AM/PM schedule would be most beneficial for the students as they would have access to their peers and school personnel each day of the week.

I have two primary concerns based on our experiences in the spring. The first is a concern that students will be unprepared as to exactly what online education looks like; our stint in the spring probably won't be the same as what we do with more to plan and prepare. They will need to have accurate models and expectations for more heavily structured online learning.

The second concern deals with the workload that was given to students. In particular at the Junior High, students seemed overwhelmed with the amount of math work being given. This also caused students to begin ignoring classwork in language and other subjects. Language had largely finished our standards by the time this happened, so they weren't going to hurt too badly going into the next grade. But if there is once again unacceptable workloads in math in the fall to the point that students aren't doing other subjects, this will have an impact on their growth and how ELA builds throughout the year. I also am afraid of the stress this will put on our kids.

I hope we can find a way to get the students in the building at least once a week, if possible. I think this in itself will do wonders in helping the kids to manage workloads and stress. Even if we could do something where students stay with the same teacher/class all day, like elementary, and we guide them through their online subjects... perhaps we can help them. Thanks for all the task force is doing at this time!

As a parent of a student, and a teach myself, I am concerned about having to put my children in childcare if there is a hybrid system. I can't expect childcare to provide instruction and I can't expect my own young children to keep learning on their virtual days with no support. I almost think it needs to be an all or nothing model (online or in person). Many of us have our own children to help guide through this and I'd like to be able to keep my kids learning and safe also. Wearing masks constantly (unable to breath), separated and never able to play at recess or have time to be with other people, move classrooms and move around is not how students will gain information. Teachers need to enjoy their jobs as well wearing a mask (not being able to breath) and not being able to interact with students or other teachers will create poor morale, which turns into poor learning environment for students. Starting the year like we ended the year last year will be such a let down for so many students/parents/teachers. We need to get back to some semblance of what we had before. Go to school, be interactive, be engaged and then go home at the end of the day (or practice because without any activities the whole atmosphere of school will be somewhere below miserable).
My biggest concern with returning is ensuring that ALL staff adhere to the given guidelines. What will be done to ensure that everyone is indeed following the given procedures? Because if those few interactions are an indicator, I am concerned to say the least. I am not comfortable putting my health in the hands of other people who are not willing to follow rules and regulations.

And to expect them to wear masks is laughable, we can barely get them to use tissues!! <p>I would like a plan to be in place for young children in full time daycare if we have to go out again. I had 8 students in full time daycare during the closure. The home daycare providers were quickly overwhelmed dealing with multiple grade levels and schools. These students did very little work. They rarely attended our class meetings, and when they did, their environment was chaotic. It was very stressful to be held responsible for these students when there was little I could do to connect with them. Their parents were also extremely frustrated.</p> <p>I would like a plan in place for assessments and grades.</p> <p>I would like consistency between schools. I would prefer not to be 100 percent online if at all possible. Having a plan soon so I can plan as a teacher and as a parent of young children. Thanks for everything you are doing!

Flexibility is going to be key to the whole thing. I believe school should start as "normal" as possible but have a plan to react swiftly and decisively. I also feel every school should be treated as a stand alone unit, one size does not fit all.

I want to say thank you for the time and effort you have all given towards this task force. I do have a few questions. I hope that we will be able to come to a unified district where students learn, teachers teach and our students have the opportunity to be kids
I don't feel that it is feasible for our schools to reopen until we have a steady decrease in cases of COVID-19. Student and staff safety should be the top priorities. I understand that online learning poses difficulties and that people may not be happy if that is what is decided, however returning back to school this fall will put all of us at risk to contract this potentially deadly virus. If we return to the classroom we will need to make sure that extreme preventative measures are put into place and are strictly adhered to for the duration of the pandemic. I am concerned that adherence to these measures will wane as the year goes on, and that we will all be put at higher risk than necessary as a result. At one of the earlier Board meetings, a number of parents expressed an interest in continuing the online program. Keeping that in mind, would it be possible to allow those students to continue their learning at home (based upon their success during the 4th quarter)? This might create smaller class sizes naturally which would make it easier to spread desks out if necessary. Teachers who are interested, or even those who normally do Extended Day, could then be assigned a small group of students to check in with each day to make sure that they are completing their assignments, answer questions, etc.
Similar to the Block Schedule, there was word going around at the end of the school year that suggested that we do 1/2 days; half of the class in the morning and the other half in the afternoon. Class periods would be shortened and some work would be expected to continue at home.

Please do everything possible NOT to return to 100% virtual learning-extremely hard on some of my 1st graders emotionally and very stressful for some parents. Kids unraveled and fell apart right in front of me and I couldn't do anything about it. Also understand the importance of human connection especially for our young children. Virtual learning was socially and emotionally damaging to many of my students. I do not want them to live in fear isolated from each other and having to wear a mask at school either. Educating them of proper handwashing, coughing, not coming to school if sick, etc. is important like it is to prevent any other illness. Last, please DO NOT group us together with Rock Spring schools and make it all the same. Our community is very different so our conditions should be different. We all live spread out from each other, and are outside majority of the time. Our community is healthy as of right now so don't treat us like Rock Springs that has several cases. We have small class sizes around 10 students per class so can natural spread out. I only have 3 students next year so social distancing and learning can look very different than if I had a class of 25-30. As a specialist, block scheduling sounds maybe doable for the classroom teachers maybe, but I want to know what it would look like for the specials. I'm a little concerned about the number of students that I personally would be in contact with during a week- for my health and theirs.

Are there going to be substitutes available if a teacher is out and sick? Can we designate subs to a building to again cut down on contact with our kids?

I worry a lot about the mental health of students and teachers.

Learning from our spring experience I have a few thoughts: Math department!!! And yes, I am a part of it. I teach the intervention math class. I reteach/reinforce what they learn in their core math classes and they were given so many assignments, and my students struggle in their math comprehension and class work normally so with the online process they struggled even more and I found myself and them working harder than ever to try to get their work done with all of us feeling frustrated. All students need to have some understanding of the content to do the assignments and they were not getting that with the online teaching as it was. In all areas We cannot just assign things without any/ or little instruction. Some was purely online where the student had to take the notes posted and do the work. Most students do not have the reading level or comprehension to make this work. Google hangouts/meets/zoom and recorded lessons were great but here's my next concern, internet access for all students. I had many that did not have it at all, even when it was free they did not get it. I also know of many that were embarrassed to be on camera be their own insecurities or not wanting peers to see their home, so they did not attend any online meetings in any of their classes and most teachers made that apart of their grade so they failed that part so again I had to advocate for them and speak to teachers and explain the situation, and sadly many teachers kept this mandatory, so something for our poor insecure teens. I'd let mine have the camera off until they were more comfortable. The next concern is I feel we took it easy on them in the spring in order to be fair to them and COMPLETELY agree with how that was done, but now many think online learning is "easy" so when we follow our standards more this time around and have higher expectations they're going to struggle more. I think everyone needs to understand that many of our kiddos come from homes where it is not conducive to learning. Many of my students have some tough situations and those in loving homes are taking on more expectations,

responsibilities at home in this unprecedented time where parents who are fortunate enough to have their jobs leaves the students with the responsibility of babysitting, cleaning, ect... There's a lot to think about! We are ALL very dedicated to our students, families and on another. We will support and encourage each other and will get not only get through this but get out better! At this point I just really want to get them and their parents out of this emotionally, and through the teen years in one piece. Oh! The poor parents! One last thought! They are not teachers, even the ones that are struggled because they need to be the parent! Yes, help their kids but we should be giving enough instruction that the parent does not feel like the teacher!

I feel that it is a high concern to send kids back with too many precautions in place. Meaning that if kids have so many things that they are required to do such as wear masks, stay 6 feet from teachers and peers etc. That we will cause stress and potential harm rather than good.

As a teacher I need to have time to build relationships with my students. This is difficult to manage over virtual schooling.

I think that preventative measures for kids at school is a great thought, but what happens when students aren't following the restrictions? Are teachers going to have to spend more time on making sure students follow these new guidelines than they are actually teaching material? What happens if this continues for an extended period of time and students aren't complying with online learning should we go that route? Last year I had students who didn't do a single assignment during quarantine despite many efforts to contact both the student and parents. Teachers' hands are tied. How would block scheduling work? Would teachers be required to do double lesson plans each day (one for students at school, and a plan for students at home)?

I believe it is imperative this task force consider re-entry may look different at the K-4, 5-6, Jr. High, and High School. It may even look different within a K-4 school, as on-line learning is especially difficult for primary (K-2) students. Although pre-cautions may need to be taken for re-entry into school, please consider having it be as "normal" as possible. Having young students wear masks all day is very impractical. (They likely will become blindfolds, hats, necklaces, slingshots, etc. even with outlined expectations and constant reminders.)

Having students remain six feet apart at all times is also impractical. We do not have the classroom space to achieve this and, regardless of class size, it would be impossible to do this with young children who are constantly moving and inquisitive little people.

Also, students must have their specials classes and recesses for both physical and mental health as well as academic and social growth in these areas.

Our district followed Governor Gordon's guidelines upon school closures, we too should follow his guidelines upon reopening. If groups of 50 are now being allowed to gather with no restrictions, it seems that covers classrooms. We may need to adjust some recess / lunch times to having just two classes at a time in the lunchroom or out at recess at any given time (depending on class sizes) and we may not have whole school assemblies / gatherings for a time, but it seems achievable to re-open schools with a sense of normalcy that will benefit students, teachers, and parents.

I am all for going back with preventative measures. I struggled during the 4th quarter with enjoying my job because it was not what I was used to. I am Afraid teacher burn out is going to be a concern for lots of teachers. I know that if I only teach by virtual learning I will dislike my job every single day. I miss the kids, I miss helping them and reteaching in the moment, I miss the socialization, I miss knowing that the kids are okay. I only saw one kid 2 times during the entire quarter and I meet with my class for two hours everyday. I worry about how far Behind kids are going to get and how I am Supposed to teach them when I am Told

to only teach the essential curriculums. I do not think That there was any consistency between schools or even grades at schools for what people did and I worry that this might be the case again. I know parents will not be as available to help Support virtual learning which makes it really hard for some kids to learn. I want and need to go back for my mental well being because like I said before virtual learning is not what I went to school to do.

My answers may be different depending on what some of those scenarios will look like.

Band and Guitar are very difficult to teach online, so being able to meet in person ( even if only a few days a week) would be ideal.

Students need teachers, teachers need students.

I have taught for over 30 years and the last quarter of 2020 was the hardest teaching experience of my life. I missed the daily personal contact with my students greatly! In my last Google meeting, I was a blubbering basket case! I just wanted to HUG them goodbye! Having said that, we are seeing a surge in Covid 19 cases in our county due to poor social distancing and lack of understanding as to how this disease can rapidly spread and affect our community. Until restrictions for social distancing, face coverings, and proper precautions are mandatory state wide, I don't see how we can reopen with student contact. Online teaching is not easy, certainly not ideal, but it may be the only way we can get a handle on helping to slow the spread.

Everyone needs to know that it's not an option to get on or not that it is required for there child to attend class even if it is online.

I think you are being very creative. Glad it's not my job!

I am wondering if we will be receiving personal protective gear? Will masks, etc be made available for staff and students? What will happen if staff are required to quarantine in terms of sick days. What will happen if students are sick or in quarantine in terms of attendance policies? Also, I think it will difficult to do both in person and online learning at the same time. For example, the way my classroom technology is set up, it would be difficult for me to use my promethium board and record via my laptop at the same time. My fear is that if both are required at the same time, the students at home may get the short end of the stick. So, perhaps a flipped classroom where the teacher instructs for 15 min (even prerecorded if necessary) and then everyone asks questions and is given help online (both those in the room and online) if possible... I am not 100% sure how that might look but I personally would need more technology or help because of my own individual classroom set up and am sure others are in the same boat. Additionally, if we do move to a completely online platform could we require that students are online daily, even if for only ten minutes, and take attendance using Powerschool? So, at the secondary level students must check in for each period even if for just a brief period of time say the first ten minutes of class? It may add some accountability and alleviate students who just disappeared. I don't think it feasible to require them to be there for a whole 60 or 75 minute block but they could check in at specific times and if they don't be marked absent? Just a thought. Finally, I know this is an almost impossible task because you don't have all the answers and even those answers are changing but, thank you for volunteering your time.

I appreciate everyone's hard work. I know it will be difficult to figure out how to meet the needs of all students, staff and the community.

I am great with whatever you decide. I do hope I get to go back to at least get to know my group and train them on a few things before possibly going back to online learning for the flu season. I think this helped make this last group so successful was that I had already showed them a few things in google and we were already doing some things online. If we do not get to go back I fear that my kids will feel a disconnect with me.

I am worried about out students who are living in unsafe environments. Some of these kids are living with predators now all day instead of getting a break. I would like to see our most at risk-students at school as much as possible.

I feel that it,Äôs necessary for all staff and students to wear masks and/or face guards. There are several individuals on staff with compromised immune systems and this will be in the best interest of everyone to do so.
Students will have to be held accountable and not just given a free pass.
If we continue online learning in the fall equity between all schools needs to be something the district is on top of. During the spring all schools were conducting things so differently. The amount of work some schools and teachers were putting in was far less than the expectations given to others teaching the same grade. We also need to realize that if an AB schedule were to be implemented teachers with their own who age children could be put in a bind for childcare along with other parents. Siblings would also need to be put into the same group because it could be very difficult for parents to have one child for example in group A and another in group B.

I miss school very much and seeing the teachers, staff, and students, but I want to make sure everyone is safe and following preventative measures.
Thank you for working through this difficult process.

I,Ãm scared as hell about being back in the high school environment! I don,Ãt see how we can maintain supervision all over the school, have adequate space in rooms, provide proper airflow, and control safety. There are kids who will create unsafe situations on purpose.

Many suggest that there will be another wave of Covid-19, that is a scary thought when dealing with a class full of students whom have potentially have been around someone exposed.

Students need face to face, in person instruction. Regardless of Google Classroom assignments, Google Meets, instructional videos, and books/resources uploaded, young students (k-4) need to have a parent/adult sit with them daily to work through the instruction and assignments. Unfortunately, not all families are able to do this for a variety of reasons. There is so much learning that is lost when teachers are not with students daily. Schools also provide students the ability to learn proper social skills and peer interaction. When students are not in the classrooms daily, these skills are not developed.

Thank you for asking for our feedback.

Concerns about returning to school with the current escalation of cover-19 cases, requiring and enforcement: students wearing masks, separation of 6 feet, disinfection of areas, and trying to get students to understand the severity of this situation.

1. Teachers (unless they are quarantined) should be allowed access to their classrooms to teach if we go into partial or full online learning. Not all of us have the ability to duplicate the classroom in our living room.
2. If partial online and partial in person learning happens, it needs to be understood that teachers will not have time to do BOTH during contract time. The online portion (at least at an elementary level) will be more review/homework (utilizing online programs like IXL) than new learning. If lessons are expected for both, consider having one teacher for each grade level provide the online learning portion, while the others do in person learning.
3. If full online learning occurs, make clear, consistent, and reasonable expectations across the district taking into account the age of the students and how much assistance they require from an adult when working on line or attending a Google Meeting (and realize that the teacher is not in the same room as they are).
4. If teachers are not supposed to mail things home or visit student homes (even for K graduation), this must be upheld by ALL BUILDINGS (in my school we were told under no circumstances could we visit or mail items home, we learned later that other buildings did visit and sent packets home each week; this led to comparisons in the community, which were wrong as there was not consistent rules being followed). The same for K graduation, the schools that followed the rules looked bad.



5. Attendance! There needs to be consideration about if a teacher has to be in quarantine due to exposure: sick days should not have to be used, because, let's be honest, there's a really good chance that you will be constantly going into quarantine. Second, student attendance for full online learning: after contacting parents twice and seeing no change in attendance, this needs to go on to the admin in the building to try to contact. If a parent flat out tells you they aren't going to do the work, this should be sent to admin and not have the teacher keep contacting each week. There needs to be a minimum a kid needs to be online (that we can tell) to avoid the absence call...ie 5 minutes on RAZ-Kids a week with no other work done does not mean that the kid is learning anything (they just figured out that it counted to keep the teacher from contacting them-as per admin).

6. Daycares cannot be asked to be teachers (and there will be students in day cares).

7. What if my classroom gets Covid? We have a tendency to "blame" the teacher. Am I going to be punished if my class goes down because of Covid? Will I be told I didn't do a good enough job keeping things clean and controlling the kids (which lets be honest again, masks and little kids is going to be crazy)? Will the admin and district back the teachers when Covid starts coming into the classrooms?

The main things I think are important is that there needs to be consistency across the district in communication and expectations. We also need to look at things through a realistic lens.

Please don't overload teachers. If teachers are teaching in the classroom they can't also do online as well. That's 2 jobs at once. They can do one or the other. Teaching in the classroom is a full time job. Once we went online, that was a major change and took all of our time and energy as well - I can say it would be very difficult to do both of them at once time. It would take all day to teach and into the night to set up the virtual learning platform for the the students.

If we do online teaching again, please consider giving teachers access to our classrooms and school internet. This would help with virtual learning. It took me a long time to upload videos do the speed of my internet at home. If I had the internet I had at school, I believe it would have been faster and easier to upload videos that you wanted me to do. I was able to read to my students but it took a long time to make those videos.

If we go virtual, a problem elementary teachers run into is attendance and students that are in day care. This effects how much work students are actually doing and turning in. In some students we do not see a lot of work from and we do not receive much work from. The work we do get, we don't know who is actually doing it. This is a problem of course I'm sure everyone is having.

<p>I understand that the safety of students and staff is the district's priority. However, returning to school with preventative measures such as wearing a mask and remaining 6 feet apart will be difficult for elementary aged students. Those children need hands-on learning, interaction with peers for learning and playing, and they need to be able to receive immediately feedback or one-on-one support with their teacher. Online learning does not provide those at all. I truly believe that the online learning option will hinder their success. I of course will do my part in ensuring masks stay on as much as possible, hand washing is continuous, and that my room is properly sanitized throughout the day. I feel school should return as normal in August without the online learning portion. I understand masks, social distancing as much as possible, regular hand washing, and sanitizing the room and materials will need to take place but the social distancing and masks will be a challenge for them. However, I don't believe online learning is the best or appropriate option for elementary students to succeed.</p>
