2019-2020 WAEA School Performance Ratings English Language Proficiency (ELP)

For English Language Proficiency (ELP) for elementary and middle schools, seven schools maintained or increased their proficiency rating, three schools decreased their ratings but are still meeting expectations.

The ELP ratings for secondary schools, remaind the same.

Needs Assessment

1. Based on all Sweetwater#1 school state and federal accountability reports, which area(s) (growth, equity, achievement, graduation rate, participation rate etc....) is the lowest for your district?

The lowest indicator for Sweetwater #1 schools is growth. The School Performance Reports for Sweetwater #1 indicate that seven schools are below target in the growth category.

On the ESSA reports,

- 10 of the 17 schools are average or above in Growth
- 8 of the 13 schools rated on Equity are average or above
- 7 of the 11 of the schools rated on ELP are average or above in the English Learner category
- All schools met the WAEA and ESSA participation rate (95%) requirement
- 2. Which schools are partially or not meeting expectations on the WAEA School Performance Report?
 - The schools partially meeting expectations are Desert Elementary, Farson-Eden Middle School, Overland and Northpark.
 - The schools not meeting expectations are Rock Springs High School,
 Eastside Elementary, Walnut Elementary and Desert View Elementary.
- 3. What other data sources could give you more information about this area of need? What is that additional data telling you needs the most attention?

On the WY-TOPP state assessment, the district scored below the state average in 5th grade, 6th grade, 7th grade, 9th grade and 10th grade in ELA. In Math, 5th grade, 6th grade, 7th grade, 8th grade and 10th grade scored below the state average. In Science, 10th grade scored below the state average.

The ACT data at 11th grade indicates that all students are scoring below the state average in English, Reading, Math, Science and on the composite score. Many data reviewers are concerned about the ACT scores being stagnant.

The 9th grade credits earned data indicates that RSHS and BBHS have about 20% of freshman that are not earning ¼ of credits required to graduate. FEHS has all students earning ¼ of the credits needed.

On the WAEA and ESSA reports, seven of the eleven schools are meeting targets/at or above average in the English Language Proficiency category.

All schools met the participation requirement for both WAEA and ESSA.

Eleventh grade ELA increased achievement levels of students 11% last year while math increased 8.8%. Both third and fourth grades increased their achievement levels in both ELA and Math.

On the 2019-2020 WAEA School Performance Ratings English Language Proficiency (ELP) for elementary and middle schools, seven schools maintained or increased their proficiency rating, three schools decreased their ratings but are still meeting expectations. The ELP ratings for secondary schools, remained the same.

GOAL #1: Growth & Achievement

The district will increase the number of schools in the "Meets or Exceeds Target" in the growth category from 10 to 17 (all) and increase achievement by 10% as measured by the spring 2021 WYTOPP ELA, Math and Science summative assessments.
