We are looking forward to a great start to 2023! Our students and staff are ready to continue to build on the learning that we did in the fall.




MISSION STATEMENT


Reading- We are going to become word detectives!

SOCIAL STUDIES


Our third graders will explore the culture and tradition of China.


ELA News

Students will continue to work on Details and Synthesis for the next few weeks. An important skill in reading and writing is learning to pay attention to characters and how they change or relationships they have. We also want to think about how authors teach us lessons in stories. We will use all this information to write literary essays. We will then move into reading about the American Revolution! Math News! We will be doing a mini unit on factors and multiples in preparation for division! We will then move onto division of multi digit numbers up to the thousands place by a one digit number. We will be using different strategies: standard algorithm, repeated subtraction, distributive method and partial quotients.

Social Studies

We will be wrapping up our unit on the Native Americans. We will now learn about how our state began to be settled by explorers coming to the new world from the European Countries. This will then lead us to learn about the

American Revolution.

Examples: Blanket of snow Meaning: an area covered by snow Sentence: After the blizzard, the place was covered with a **blanket of** snow except the dog and his leash.


Break the ice

Phonemic awareness is the ability to identify and manipulate sounds. A phoneme is the smallest possible unit of sounds in a word.

5 Ways to Practice Phonemic Awareness at Home

- I) Read rhyming books to and with your child.

- 4) Repeat activity number 3, but in reverse!
- 5) Play Guess My Word.


