Perkins V Local Needs Assessment



Members of community businesses, Western Wyoming Community College staff, district directors, Sweetwater#1 CTE teachers and students met on Thursday, February 20th to provide input to the local needs assessment for the newly authorized Perkins V grant. The purpose of the needs assessment is to drive the writing of the Perkins V grant and guide future spending decisions. Also, the process helps forge partnerships with local businesses, the community and the college.

The Perkins V grant represents an opportunity to expand opportunities for every student to explore, choose, and follow career and technical education programs of study and career pathways to earn credentials of value. The United States Congress is committed to improving career and technical education by providing nearly \$1.3 billion annually for career and technical education (CTE) programs for nation's youth and adults.

This first meeting focused on evaluation of student performance and program quality. Future meetings, in March and April, will evaluate CTE programs of study, recruitment, retention and training of CTE educators as well as improving equity and access to all students.

How to Build Proficiency Scales Professional Development

On March 30, Jan Hoegh will be training Social Studies teachers on proficiency scales. Proficiency scales is a rubric used by teachers and students to determine students level of progress towards meeting the benchmark or standard. The four level proficiency scales indicate that the level 4 is going above and beyond the benchmark or standard, level three is proficiency at a skill/standard. Level 2 is an understanding of vocabulary and simple process while level one demonstrates partial understanding of vocabulary/simpler process with help. Social Studies teachers will begin writing proficiency scales and common assessments on March 31st and complete writing them in June. The draft assessments will be piloted and validated during the 2020-2021 school year. The assessments will be shared with all staff who teacher Social Studies at the beginning of the 2020-2021 school year. WY-TOPP News

- <u>Science</u>: The science practice WY-TOPP test is available at https://wyoassessment.org/training-tests.stml. Click on take the training test then the big green Sign In button. Choose a grade level (4th, 8th or 10th) and click on Start the Science Sample Test. Legacy released items for grades 4th and 8th are available by scrolling to the bottom of this page.
- Exemptions: All students are expected to participate in the
 Wyoming Assessment System. Please inform parents, guardians,
 and students of the testing WY-TOPP Testing Window (April 14 to
 May 5). The Sweetwater #1 assessment calendar is on the
 website and can be accessed by clicking here. Exemptions from
 participation in the WY-TOPP can be applied for and must meet
 the following criteria:
 - The student is expelled for the entire testing window.

- The student is an English Learner who has been enrolled in a U.S. school for less than one year. In this case, the student may be exempted from the ELA portion of the WY-TOPP only; however, the ACCESS test must be taken.
- The student is placed in an out-of-state facility for the entire testing window.

ACT

The ACT test will be given to all 11th grade students in the district April 7th-8th and 9th. The district will be giving the newsletter in the on-line format. IT has been working to load testing materials and lock-down browsers on student computers. Principals are working to reconcile student rosters, entering accommodations and creating test sessions. 
Winter Universal Screening Data

Universal Screening is a series of assessments that include Acadience Reading materials. The assessments are given three times a year; Fall (September), Winter (January) and Spring (April-May). The assessments are given by trained professionals that include retired teachers (Testing Assistants). Universal screening refers to testing all students within a school or grade three times per year for the purpose of screening the students to identify those who may be at risk. Universal screening is always conducted using grade-level benchmark assessment materials. The measures administered for universal screening vary by grade and time of year, and include those measures that are most relevant for making instructional decisions at that time. In addition, Universal Screening is mandatory in alignment with the District's Early Literacy Plan that is submitted to the State. More information on the District's Early Literacy Plan can be found here. The data from Universal Screening is used to calculate Annual Yearly Progress, student placement into interventions, school monitoring, progress monitoring, and flex groups. Winter Universal Screening showed an increase at Kindergarten, First Grade and a slight increase at Second and Third Grade. The data can be seen here. Spring Universal Screening will occur between April 20-May 5.

Survey Input Provides Valuable Information

As part of our budgeting for professional development and planning for Accreditation, the Curriculum, Instruction and Assessment Department gives annual surveys in February and March to certified staff, parents and administrators. The surveys include: the Certified Needs Assessment for both administrators and staff, Parent Needs Assessment and an Efficacy survey for both administrators and staff. The questions on the Certified Needs Assessment align to the Consolidated Grant and provide valuable information for planning and professional
