New York State Budget Pledges to Fully Fund Foundation Aid Formula

 This year NY lawmakers agreed to funnel \$1.4 billion more annually towards Foundation Aid, New York state's main source for public school funding, over the next three years

 The children of our state won a crucial victory with this historic commitment to fully fund Foundation Aid for our public schools

RACIAL AND ECONOMIC EQUITY

Full funding of Foundation Aid over the next three years represents a major step toward racial and economic equity in education.

Our current dollar investment per child is NOT equitable

What does a budget cut of \$1M look like?

- 1. This would cause a permanent loss of \$1M from budget base that grows percentage wise yearly
- 2. Future annual increases in aid are based a percentage of the budget base, which has been permanently reduced
- 3. Recovering these funds to restore the budget base requires exceeding the 2% tax cap and a 60% voting majority in an election
- 4. Saves 22 cents per \$1,000 of a home assessed value
- 5. Saves the average homeowner (\$500K home) \$110 per year

School Spending Raises Property Values

- A \$1 increase in per pupil state aid increases aggregate per pupil housing values by about \$20, indicating that potential residents value education expenditure.

NYS FOUNDATION AID

The state's plan is to fund all districts to 100% in the next three years

(46% funding)

2021-22 INCREASE OF \$6,730,399 (60% funding)

2022-23 INCREASE OF \$9,452,803 (80% funding)

FEDERAL FUNDING TIMELINES

- New York State receives CRRSA and ARPA funding April 2021
- District plans for spending federal funds submitted to state on or before July 1, 2021

2021-22 BUDGET FEATURES

- New funding sources provide the means to restore and add programs and services our children need and deserve, thereby increasing the investment per child ratio
- This budget does not exceed the tax levy cap, thereby protecting the school tax freeze credit for qualifying homeowners
- Every homeowner expected to receive a 9.16% reduction on their 2021-2022 school tax, due to the lowest school tax rate since 2011-12

- Districtwide

 - Replace district phone system
 - Replace and add security camera systems

 - Install vape detection devices in MS and HS lavatories
 - Add and replace musical instruments
 - Install storage sheds at PCMS for district storage



- Thomas Edison School
 - Replace boiler (due 2022)

 - Upgrade Outdoor Public Address System
 - Replace JFK lower building boiler (due 2021)

 - Replace boiler (beyond its useful life 2017)

 - Parking Lot Roof and Solar Panels
- Park Avenue School
 - Replace outdoor safety surface
 - Complete brick and roof repairs
 - Upgrade electrical panels



- Port Chester Middle School
 - Replace lockers
 - Rehabilitate classroom floors
 - Rehabilitate Auditorium (seating, floors, and stage)
 - Install ADA compliant handrails
 - Replace interior stairwell doors
 - Modify CPSE/CSE meeting room for ADA compliance
 - Provide high-speed color laser printer
 - Provide 3-D printer
 - Refinish existing gym floors
 - Upgrade elevator
 - Parking Lot Roof and Solar Panels



- Port Chester High School
 - New Auditorium sound system and stage lighting system
 - New Auditorium A/C & heating system
 - Install football field exterior lighting (underground wiring conduits already installed)
 - Replace windows (installed in 1970 and reached the end of their useful life in 2000)
 - Install ADA compliant handrails
 - Replace security golf carts
 - Replace one of three boilers (due 2024)
 - Provide high-speed color laser printer
 - Provide 3-D printer
 - Refinish existing gym floor
 - Refurbish baseball and softball fields



RESTORATIONS AND EQUITY ENRICHMENTS FOR 22-23 AND BEYOND Funded by NYS Foundation Aid

- Provide Pre-K to ALL 4-year-olds using our teachers
- Expand Pre-K to include 3-year-olds
- Department Supervisors to provide support, content expertise, and program development in specific areas like fine and performing arts (music, dance, drama, theatre), ELA, Math, Science, Enrichment, Social Studies, Bilingual/ELL
- Provide space and staff to provide high quality special education programming for children currently served out-ofdistrict
- Reduce elementary class sizes to regional average of 18-22
- Provide staff to reduce elementary class sizes, including teacher and special area teachers



RESTORATIONS AND EQUITY ENRICHMENTS FOR 22-23 AND BEYOND Funded by NYS Foundation Aid

- Provide space and staff for career and technical education electives in the district currently provided off campus (i. e. building trades, graphic arts, auto, electronics) Students could participate in a full ½ day program or take courses as lab electives (some grant funding like Perkins)
- Develop library media services lead by library media specialists as the center of each school with reading rooms, Mac and Microsoft labs, audio and research centers, and multi-media supports. Build space as needed.
- Institute dance and drama electives at PCHS
- Increase Advanced Placement and International Baccalaureate options
- Create a studio-space to institute a film, recording & media production program at PCHS
- Institute engineering and/or architectural program at PCHS with advanced 3-D printers and software
- "Drop in" counseling/advisement centers at PCHS
- Newcomer Centers at multiple sites
