
From Around the District

Jim Nesci is an experienced expert in the reptile industry. He is the pioneer of Reptile Education Programs and Parties. He has owned and worked with reptiles his entire life, starting as a young boy fascinated with dinosaurs. He was invited to his first school to give a reptile presentation by a teacher-friend. He has since educated and entertained groups of all kinds at all levels of schools, daycare facilities, preschools and universities.

Jim and his group of reptiles have appeared on The Oprah Show, Animal Planet, The Tonight Show, HGTV, Regis & Kelly, and The Today Show. Locally, they have appeared on Eric & Kathy, 190 North, Don & Roma, Wild Chicago, and Early Edition. Jim

has also guest lectured at The Shedd Aquarium, Lincoln Park Zoo, The Field Museum, and The Academy of Sciences.

Jim's love for reptiles is infectious and apparent throughout his presentation. Students are invited to touch or hold various reptiles including snakes and tortoises. But the grand finale to every show is the unpacking of Jim's best friend, an 8 foot long alligator named Bubba.

Student Safety Information

School District 194 is fully committed to providing a safe learning environment for all students. This includes students' everyday travel to and from school. District 194 has worked extensively with local law enforcement in both Steger and South Chicago Heights to improve safe

travel while crossing streets near each of our three schools. District 194 utilizes crossing guards paid by the South Chicago Heights and Steger Police Departments. It is also important that parents and community members are cognizant and aware of changes in speed limits near school zones. The following ordinances are currently in place in both Steger and South Chicago Heights:

Sec. 82-342. - Special speed limit while passing schools.

(a) On a school day when school children are present and so close thereto that a potential hazard exists because of the close

proximity of the motorized traffic, no person shall drive a motor vehicle at a speed in excess of 20 miles per hour while passing a *school zone* or while traveling upon any public thoroughfare where children pass going to and from *school*.

- (b) For the purpose of this section a *school* day shall begin at 7:00 a.m. and shall conclude at 4:00 p.m.
- (c) This section shall not be applicable unless appropriate signs are posted upon streets and highways. Such signs shall give proper due warning that a *school zone* is being approached and shall indicate the *school zone* and the maximum speed limit in effect during *school* days when *school* children are present. (Code 1969, § 71.602)

State Law reference— Similar provisions, Ill. Rev. Stat. ch. 95½, § 11-605.

District 194 asks that everyone observe these ordinances in order to ensure the safety of our students.

Curriculum and Instruction Corner

Many months prior to that warm August day when the sun comes up in the east and our students rise and shine for their first day of school, the district was hard at work creating the school calendar with the instructional day in mind. The Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) requires every school district to provide 176 instructional days for our students, which is roughly 36 weeks of school.

It is within these instructional days where the magic happens. Typically, when one thinks of an instructional day, a couple of critical questions may come to mind such as, "What do we want our students to know (standards)" and "How will we know they have learned (assessments)?" These are definitely at the forefront for teachers. However, teachers don't stop with these questions. They are also thinking about, "What do I do if my students didn't learn it?" and "What do I do if my students already learned it?" The teachers use their expertise in collaborating with colleagues, studying and analyzing student data, writing meaningful assessments, and developing and preparing engaging lessons. The descriptions above and much more are included in instructional days as well as school improvement days.

A school improvement day is embedded in the instructional day because we ask our teachers to make smart and resourceful decisions when it comes to our students' learning. Some wonder what teachers do during those school improvement days. Teachers are provided with the necessary time and tools to equip them with the knowledge and resources to improve student learning. With a student-centered approach, we focus our efforts on the right kind of questions so we can raise achievement for our students. Oftentimes, school improvement is synonymous with professional development; thus, we tailor our school improvement time to maximize the potential for teachers to grow professionally.

In the end, we are all learners and through that learning, we work together to best utilize the instructional day. While we often don't refer to schools as a business, we do make it our business to ensure that the students of Steger School District 194 are provided with rich curriculum.

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A Word From Superintendent Hahto

On July 1, 2019, Dr. David Frusher, currently Principal of New Tech High School in Zion-Benton, Illinois, will take his place at Steger School District 194 as Superintendent of Schools. Dr. Frusher was confirmed for the position by the Steger Board of Education in December after a five-month in-house superintendent search.

After determining the qualities desired in a new superintendent, in June 2018, the Board of Education commissioned a team to create and conduct a formal superintendent search. That team consisted of Board President Michele Helsel, Board Vice President John Geraci, Transition Consultant Anne Luering and me, ably assisted by my Administrative Assistant Claudia Brennan.

Our first step was to use the Board's requirements to put together a brochure that included a summary of the district, a listing of both the professional and personal qualities the Board was seeking for the position, and information on how to apply. The brochure went out to districts in our region and beyond. Of the more than thirty applications received, nine of them earned high marks on a standardized rubric and these individuals were invited for interviews with a small team consisting of the four search team members as well as selected district administrators. Of those, the top three were invited back for a set of two back-toback interviews, one of which was with the Board of Education and selected district administrators, and the other made up of a team of district and building administrators and teachers from all three schools.

Using the combined recommendations from both interview teams, the Board of Education named Dr. Frusher as the top candidate. He was duly offered

the position and the Board approved his hire in December.

Since the start of the new year, the Steger District Office has been preparing for Dr. Frusher's arrival. This spring, Dr. Frusher will begin visiting the district to attend Board meetings, tour the schools, meet certified and classified staff members and get to know the Steger and South Chicago Heights communities. He will be introduced to the rich history of the district and provided with the Board of Education's plans and expectations for moving the district forward in the years to come. The community will be invited to get to know Dr. Frusher at a Meet and Greet on a date to be determined.
