Northpark Elementary: Kindergarten PLC



Principal Carrie Ellison and the Kindergarten teachers meet on a regular basis to review student data, analyze student work samples, set SMART goals and identify high yield strategies to improve reading proficiency. During a recent meeting the teachers were examining pre-assessment data aligned to a district assessment. They noted that many of the students were "almost there" and focused on the importance of

incorporating specific vocabulary instruction and working toward students knowing beginning, middle and end of the story. They selected a common strategy to improve instruction based on feedback from the administrator that guided them to select a similar focus as the 1st grade teachers in order to

work toward vertical alignment. teachers have students monitor their own goals through data notebooks which show a continuum of a student's progress.



PBIS at Stagecoach Elementary

At Stagecoach's PBIS October meeting we took time to drill down and discuss SWIS data. The team discussed problem behaviors between grade levels, times of days, and locations. The PBIS Team pulled out strategies from our Recess handbook and PBIS handbook to reinforce behaviors to bring down SWIS data at highest times of the day. Teams were emailed and follow-up reteaches will be given for the remainder of the month. The team then discussed our school-funded backpack program concerning the number of students, needs of our families, and donation of backpacks from Wyoming Work Warehouse. Team decided on the themes for our Harvest of Love food drive that will keep the backpack program running for the next few months. The PBIS team finished with the discussion of our Applebee's fundraiser that will fund teacher/student prizes for positive behavior supports within the classroom.

EL Division Meeting, Title I PD and Title III PD

Title I

Title I teachers have met twice this month once on October 15th and for ½ day professional development on October 18th.

Training was conducted by Tammy Macy on Acadience testing and also on reviewing data, and establishing groups. Title I teachers also received a review on Title I Crate which is our data warehouse for all Title I required material for the district. The Title I teachers are also involved creating a district Title I department through the PLC process and began this journey on October 18th by establishing their norms. In, December we will be working on the department vision statement.

English Language Learning



EL teachers have been involved in district, state, and national trainings and they met on October 18th for a ½ day training and on October 23 for full day district training. Trainings included presentations by Jess Binning from WDE to update teachers on changes in legislation with ESSA, testing updates for WIDA and provide a variety of resources to use with our English Language Learner population. Imagine Learning also provided training with a focus on having our Level I and II students taking the benchmark assessment by October 31, 2019. The EL teachers are also working through the PLC process and developing a district department. They completed their norms and will begin work a mission statement. EL teachers began working on their curriculum maps last year and will



Update on number of Active EL students in Sweetwater County School

Students who have exited the active EL status based on their ACCESS test scores are required to be placed on monitoring status. Monitoring status for our district is for four years and focuses on the students' academic progress, to ensure that they have not been prematurely exited and that they are meaningfully participating in the LEA's standard educational programs comparable to their other students

What's Going on With the District Department Chairs?




Celebrations: During the 2019-2020 school year, at each board meeting, teachers and students will be celebrated for the great things happening within the department. Contact your department chair for more information.

New Teacher Support: The district department chairs are tasked with supporting new teachers in the classroom. District department chairs will be reaching out to spend a day with their new teachers. The chairs can support instruction, give feedback and help with lesson planning and flow just to name a few. Also, new teachers can request support for a variety of things in their classrooms. Standards Referenced Grading: Also, secondary department chairs are piloting standards referenced grading. Secondary department chairs will be linking all assignments to benchmarks in their curriculum maps. Over time and with multiple opportunities, this will show student proficiency on benchmarks and standards. Teachers will not be including extra credit, attendance, behavior or effort.


Efficacy is the ability to produce a desired or intended result. Teacher efficacy means that a teacher believes that they can guide students to success. According to Hattie's *Visible Learning for Teachers*, collective teacher efficacy has the greatest impact (effect size of 1.6) on student achievement. Teachers who have a high self-efficacy are teachers who can push through failure, are more open minded and supportive with students. They are teachers who work together, feel valued, confident and successful. A teacher who lacks efficacy is less likely to try new teaching strategies, push through struggles in learning.

Ways to build and raise self-efficacy include:

- Being actively involved in the right work in your PLCs
- Be involved and reflect on your professional learning
- Recognizing teacher successes and achievements

Dr. Anthony Muhammad and PLC trainers will be addressing efficacy and how to build collective efficacy in upcoming trainings this winter. Also, a survey will be administered in the spring to evaluate and measure the impact of staff collaboration.

We the People—Civics Training



Teachers in the 5th grade and 9th through 12th grades participated in a training on a civics education program called "We the People" during the October 18 Professional Development day. Presenters, Matt Strannigan, Eric Freeman and Jillian Fanning shared information about the history of the program, benefits for students, their teachers and the schools that participate.

Throughout the training, presenters shared strategies to introduce civics education to students, text walk-throughs and simulated hearings the students will experience. Teachers engaged in a writing exercise, panel simulation and received feedback from peer judges. All of these activities were aligned in providing a more engaging and complex understanding of civics in an authentic setting.

Teachers interested in learning more about the program are encouraged to attend future panel competitions held across the state in Casper on December 16, 2019 and in Cheyenne on January 13th, 2020.

Northpark Elementary- 4th Grade field trip to the Museum of the Mountain Man

Tuesday, October 22, 2019 the 4th grade classes from Northpark visited the Museum of the Mountain Man to view artifacts from Native American exhibits, and exhibits about the Mountain Man way of life. Students participated in a scavenger hunt to locate, sketch, and write details about various exhibits in the museum. Students and parents alike enjoyed and shared details from this field trip with their parents at conferences on the 24th and 25th.

This field trip aligns with the fourth-grade social studies standards of SS.4.4 – Students will analyze events (past & present), people, problems, and ideas within their historical context.

Students will continue to learn more about the mountain men and the indigenous tribes of Wyoming and will conduct research and write reports with the culminating activity of Frontier Days in the spring where students dress as the person that they researched.



Westridge Elementary: Wacky Science Night



Westridge Elementary held their Wacky Science Night on October 9th. This event was an opportunity for parents to participate with their child while learning about the scientific process. There were seven different stations which included dancing raisins, snakes and spiders, make your own trail mix, creepy feel boxes, building structures with candy corn pumpkins and popsicle sticks, I see orbs, and airplane building with straws and paper. Students and parents selected the stations they wanted to go to. Each station was planned by a grade level teacher. Depending on the station, the students and their parents made predictions, conducted the experiment and then discussed their conclusions. For example, at the Snakes and Spiders station, the parents and the children saw and touched a variety of snakes and spiders. They discussed their habitat and interesting facts about the snakes and spiders that were on display. At the snack station, each student selected the ingredients to make their own trail mix. This was a very interactive and fun evening.

District Assessment System

By state statute, the district must have a District Assessment System (DAS) in place. The requirements of the DAS are to ensure that the content and performance standards are aligned both content and cognitive complexity, being taught, assessed and levels of proficiency assigned and reported to students and parents. Sweetwater #1 must have a policy in place to meet or exceed minimum graduation requirements established in Chapter 31. Lastly, there must be a process in place to review and update the assessment system as state standards change.

The DAS in Sweetwater #1 has been evolving and changing over the past few years. Following the long-range plan, the district will continue the process of curriculum mapping, validation, common assessment writing and resource adoption. The district has fully implemented the curriculum maps aligned to the state standards and will have common assessments in place next year for all grade levels and content areas.

The district will be collecting the common assessment data during the 2019-2020 school year. The data will be entered by PLC groups in each building. More information to come.

School Improvement Plans/District Improvement Plans

For the 2019-2020 school year the district improvement goals are:

- The district will increase the number of schools in the <u>"Meets or Exceeds Target"</u> in the growth category from 10 to 17 (all) and increase achievement by 10% as measured by the spring 2020 WYTOPP ELA, Math and Science summative assessments.
- The district will strengthen school safety measures across schools and the community through continuous training, open communication and clear, rehearsed protocols.


The district will be supporting the work of these goals by providing a guaranteed and viable curriculum, providing time and training on professional learning communities, providing professional development opportunities for all staff via academies with targeted ELA PD for kindergarten and 5th grade this year and in science grades 4th-12th. Also, the district will support PBIS and student advocacy as well as ongoing safety training. One safety emphasis is the implementation of a cloud-based content filter to support the 1:1 computer adoption. To support student achievement and growth, the district will proactively support the physical, mental and emotional needs of staff and students.

Formative Assessment: Modular WY-TOPP

There have been over 1000 ELA modular assessments given in grades 1-10 and about 850 modular assessments in Math in grades 1, 3, 4, 5, 6 and 8. Modular assessments are short assessments that assess specific topics or skills. The purpose of modular assessments is to inform instruction in the classroom based off of immediate student results.
