
MEMORIAL TO HONOR FALLEN FIRST RESPONDERS

Police Chief Hector Rosario and Fire Chief Anthony Serna are spearheading local support for North Township's first ever Fallen Heroes Memorial dedicated to police officers, firefighters and emergency medical services personnel who died in service to East Chicago, Hammond, Highland, Munster and Whiting.

Eleven of the township's 32 fallen heroes are from East Lhicago.

"This is going to be a beautiful memorial garden," Serna said. "Everyone I have talked to is eager to help make this dream a reality. We need everyone's help."

Rosario said his officers are pitching in to help and talking to local businesses about donating. "Our area needs this tribute to those killed in the line of duty. We always need to remember."

Snow or ice: We've got you covered!

Long before the first flake falls, Public Works Director Keith Selvie is well into snow mode – planning for big snow.

By November, Selvie and his crews have prepared for the unknown – purchasing 5,000 tons of road salt – while prepping plows for the job ahead.

Snow removal is activated by a National Weather Service Advisory or notification from East Chicago police. First out the door are a minimum of 14 plows that target major roads.

"When we get the advisory, we begin applying beet juice to main thoroughfares, roundabouts and bridges," Selvie said. Beet juice is operational at lower temperatures than road salt alone and can last for two to five days.

"Since I've been here, we have never had to shut the city down," he said. "We work until the job is done and then prepare for what is going to hit us next."

TIPS FOR RESIDENTS


Snow no-no's keep motorists safe and trim the time to clear roadways.

SNOW PARKING SIGNS: Parked cars make it harder for the plows to do their jobs. Towing cars is the avenue of last resort — but is sometimes necessary.

SHOVELING: When digging your car out — don't throw snow into the street. Shovel it onto the parkway instead.


DRIVING: Stay off roads during the height of the storm unless it's an emergency.

A priority system takes into consideration public safety and efficiency. Streets are cleared in the following order:

- The most heavily traveled roads are the highest priority, including Kennedy, Main, Guthrie, Michigan, Cardinal and Euclid.
- 2. St. Catherine Hospital roads
- **3.** Streets by schools
- **4.** Police and fire stations along with Jeorse Circle
- 5. A minimum of 14 plows are dedicated to the city's seven zones to clear residential thoroughfares beginning with number streets and followed by name streets.





SHOUT OUT PROGRAM

Police Chief Hector Rosario is thrilled the federal government awarded the city \$234,323 as part of a safe schools grant that will be used for innovative programs for East Chicago children. "The East Chicago Police Department is taking a proactive approach to address teen issues through the SHOUT OUT program, which will allow us to begin a conversation about issues such as bullying, drugs and sexual abuse. Our goal is connect youth to services that will help protect them," Rosario said. "This program will benefit students, parents, school personnel and adults working with youth."

COMMUNITY POLICING DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

AUTISM SPEAKS

With a year of autism training and outreach under their belts, East Chicago officers will engage relationship-building with children and young adults on the autism spectrum. The plan is to increase education within the department to build a bridge between police and the autism community.

PEDAL POWER

Deploying police on bikes to combat crime allows officers to develop positive relationships with children. Bike officers will become more involved with schools, church groups and other members of the community. They will also provide hours for children to bring their bikes in to be fixed.

CHILD SAFETY

The best place to protect children is at the beginning of their young lives when they are most vulnerable. With officers trained as Child Passenger Safety Seat Technicians, the team will show the proper procedure for installation, then remove the seat and have the adult reinstall it.



WASHINGTON PARK ZOO SCULPTURES: There's a special gift under the trees at Washington Park just in time for Christmas. Parks and Recreation Director Mayra Acosta said a zoo-full of sculptures will be in place in December, replicas of the animals that were a popular source of entertainment for residents in the 1920s. Back then, the zoo – nestled between a playground, baseball field, band shell and a very popular ice cream parlor – featured a baboon, monkeys and a lion that roared seemingly on cue and lived to the ripe, old age of 23. NEW PARK SHELTERS:

October and November snows haven't hampered completion of new shelters at Roxana Park and the MacArthur Golf Course. Able to be used in any season, the expectation is that both shelters will be in constant use from Memorial Day through Labor Day for picnics, reunions and family parties. At MacArthur, individuals and families may find the shelter helpful during ice skating season, as well.

NEW PARK TRAILS:

The new trails at Roxana and Washington parks are equipped with strategically placed outdoor fitness equipment that add strength training, balance and aerobic activities to your fitness routine. Best of all, they are free and open to the public during regular park hours — dawn to dusk — every day.



LOLLIPOP SCULPTURE:

Eight gigantic lollipops are already in place at Washington Park, bursts of color against the winter landscape. Although they look good enough to eat, the oversized suckers on equally oversized sticks were created as part of a display that works with new lighting for the enjoyment of the young and young-at-heart. The lollipop sculptures are the city's first interactive educational projects in East Chicago.
