What is on the Ballot?

Proposition 1: 2023-2024 Budget

Shall the Board of Education of the Mahopac Central School District be authorized to expend the sum of \$137,960,937 for the 2023-2024 school year for school purposes and levy the necessary tax?

Proposition 2: Purchase of School Buses

(a) That the Board of Education of the Mahopac Central School District, in the County of Putnam, New York (the "District"), is hereby authorized to purchase various school buses and vans and related equipment for use by the District and to expend \$1,300,000 therefor; (b) that a tax is hereby voted in the aggregate amount of not to exceed \$1,300,000 to pay such cost, said tax to be levied and collected in installments in such years and in such amounts as shall be determined by said Board of Education; and (c) that in anticipation of said tax, bonds of the District are hereby authorized to be issued in the principal amount of not to exceed \$1,300,000 and a tax is hereby voted to pay the interest on said bonds as the same shall become due and payable.

School Bus Purchase Details

The District plans to purchase eight (8) 65-passenger buses and related equipment.

Absentee Ballot Information

Registered voters can complete an absentee ballot application which can be downloaded from the District Clerk page at Mahopac.org, obtained by email from District Clerk Melody LaRocca at laroccam@mahopac.org or picked up from Ms. LaRocca at the District Office during regular business hours from 8 a.m. and 4 p.m.

Absentee ballot applications should be submitted at least seven days before the vote/election if the ballot will be mailed to the voter and by the day before the vote/election if the ballot will be personally picked up by the voter. Absentee ballots must be received by the District Clerk by 5 p.m. on the day of the vote/election (May 16, 2023) in order to be counted.

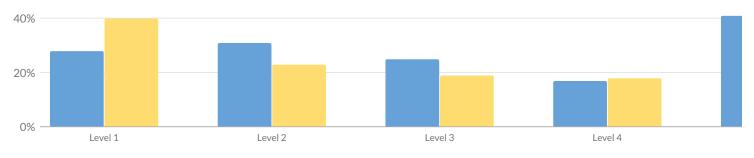


Percentage Scoring at Levels

ANNUAL REGENTS EXAMINATION IN GEOMETRY (2021-22)

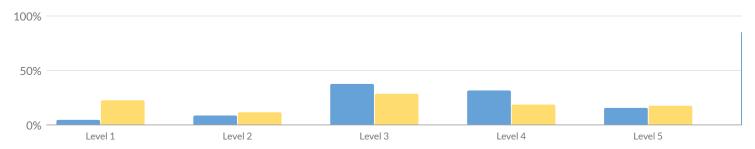

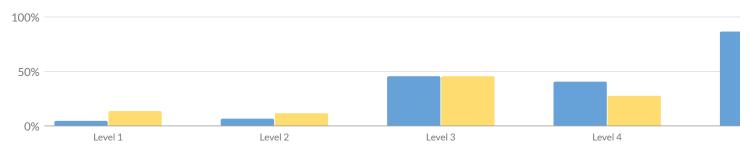
ANNUAL REGENTS EXAMINATION IN ALGEBRA II (2021-22)

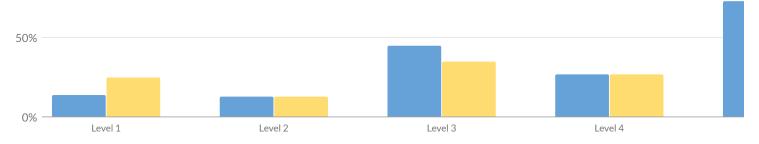

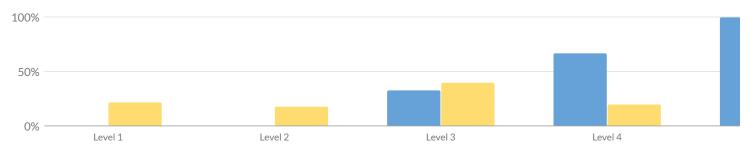

ANNUAL REGENTS EXAMINATION IN PHYSICAL SETTING/CHEMISTRY (2021-22)



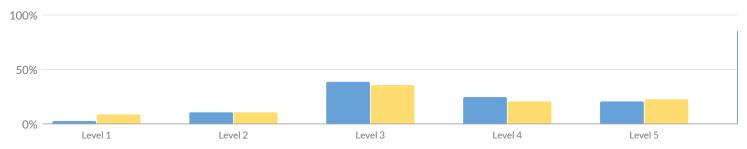

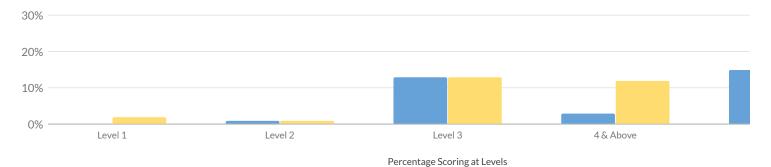
TOTAL COHORT REGENTS EXAMINATION RESULTS

A High School Cohort consists of all students who first enter grade 9 anywhere or, in the case of ungraded students with disabilities, reach their seventeenth birthday in a particular school year (July 1 - June 30). The "year" used to identify the cohort is the year in which the July 1 - December 31 dates fall. Results are reported four years after these students first enter grade 9.

Due to COVID-19 and changes to New York State testing requirements, Regents examinations in June 2020 through January 2022 were canceled, with the exception of the June 2021 Regents Examinations in ELA, Algebra I, Living Environment, and Physical Setting/Earth Science. The U.S. History & Government (Framework) June 2022 examination was also canceled. Due to the ongoing impacts of COVID-19, it may not be appropriate to compare 2018 Total Cohort Regents Examinations results with results from prior years.

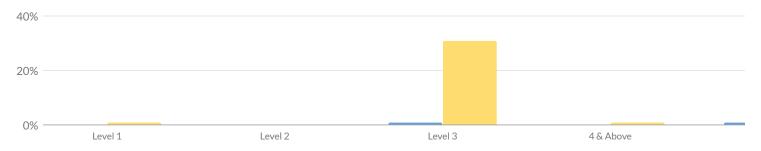

2018 TOTAL COHORT REGENTS IN GLOBAL HISTORY & GEOGRAPHY



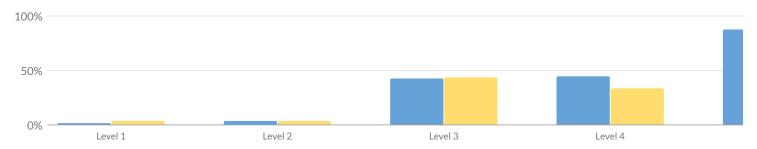

2018 TOTAL COHORT REGENTS IN SCIENCE



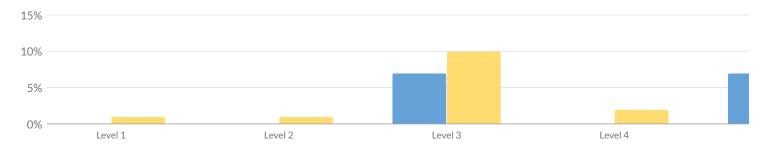
