Through the School-wide Title 1 program, federal funds are used to support supplemental instruction in reading for students in grades 1st through 4th. The targeted reading program provides early assessment of reading skills for all students in each class as a support to classroom instruction. Students identified as needing interventions and supports in literacy are provided pull out supports where they receive small group instruction. Students in needed of further intervention are provided with targeted services in a one-on-one setting. Title 1 funds pay for a full-time Title 1 certificated teacher and a part time paraprofessional. The intervention program runs concurrently with the school day program.

The School-wide Title 1 program aligns services with other supplemental and remediation programs that are provided to 1st-7th grade students during and after school. Summerville Elementary School District is a single school district located in the easter foothills of central California. Overall district and site enrollment has averaged 400 students for the last 10 years. Unduplicated pupil counts average between 40-50% of the school population. Despite efforts to better identify student groups and student need in the district, the school community still perceives that this average may not represent the true student need. As a result, Title 1 funding is used school-wide.

Parents are encouraged to volunteer in their child's classroom, attend parent conferences, student study team meetings and parent classes, as well as communicate with the teacher through email, phone, classroom and school communication platforms (like Remind) or through the PowerSchool Parent Portal. The school benefits from a very active Parent Teacher Student Association (PTSA) that meets monthly and holds regular parent engagement events. The school partners with his organization to solicit parent feedback and participation in understand parent impressions and needs.

The school site holds a parent site council meeting that meets monthly to review and provide input for all school plans and initiatives. The school site council is made up of a diverse representation of the school community including parents, teacher, and other staff members.

The Summerville Elementary Indian Education Committee meets quarterly and provides programatic input and support for the Indian Education Program. The school administration consults with this committee to engage with parents from this specific group to understand their impressions and needs for the school.

The School-wide Title 1 program supports supplemental instruction in reading. The funds pay for a full-time Title 1 teacher and a part time paraprofessional that work with small groups of students in the Title 1 program.

Transitions plans are made for all incoming students at the beginning of the school year in order to assess best placement. Students who arrive to the school mid-year meet with school adminstraiton and grade-level team leads to learn about their transition to the school, determine best placement, and discover if additional supports will be needed to support learning.

The priority of the district is to use Title II, Part A funding to pay for the 2-year induction program for new teachers through the Stanislaus County Office of Education. When there are no teachers who require an induction program the funding is used in conjunction with the LCAP to provide staff development in math, science, social studies or language arts.

THIS ESSA PROVISION IS ADDRESSED BELOW:

A comprehensive, year-long professional development model has been adopted by the consortium members to focus attention on the needs of classroom teachers to effectively meet the needs of their students. This professional development model has been delivered in partnership with the county office of education experts and includes a focus on developing an understanding of English learners by providing comprehensive instruction, which includes integration of ELD standards; developing lessons that include structures such as contextualization, structured interaction, and academic vocabulary; and working with colleagues to identify opportunities to provide appropriate structures for teaching English learners. The professional development model occurs over the year to allow teachers to apply lessons learned in their classroom and then reflect upon the implementation. The goal of the professional development is to provide consortia members the tools needed to improve the instructional program for English learners.
