

Ingredients

*3/4 cup sugar

*1 1/2 teaspoons pumpkin pie spice

*1/2 teaspoon salt

*I can (15 oz) pumpkin (not pumpkin pie mix)

*I I/Y cups evaporated milk or half and half

*2 eggs, beaten

*I crust from I package (12 oz) frozen Deep Dish Pie Crusts (2 Count)

*Heat oven to 425°F.

*In large bowl, beat sugar, pumpkin pie spice, salt, pumpkin, evaporated milk and eggs with wire whisk until well blended.

*Place frozen pie crust onto cookie sheet.

*Pour filling into pie crust. Place filled pie crust on cookie sheet into preheated oven. .

*Bake 15 minutes. Reduce oven temperature to 350°F; bake 40 to 50 minutes longer or until knife inserted near center comes out clean.

*Cool on cooling rack at least 2 hours. Serve or refrigerate until serving time. Store in refrigerator.






Thinking like a Computer Scientist


