# Steger School District 194 Welcomes Marion Blumenthal-Lazan

Marion Blumenthal-Lazan visited Columbia Central on December 7th. Mrs. Blumenthal-Lazan is a Holocaust survivor of the Bergen-Belsen Concentration Camp. Students in 5th through 8th grade were able to hear her story of survival. Blumenthal-Lazan highlighted the historical changes that took place in Europe leading up to her imprisonment. Her message included telling students that ideas will have consequences and that it is important to understand where those ideas might take you. She discussed the hardships she faced while in Bergen-Belsen which included being burned by hot soup accidentally spilled as her family attempted to cook a meal on her bunk. "I could not cry," Blumenthal continued, "to cry meant that they would kill us. You see, we were doing something that wasn't allowed." She spoke to students about hardships and understanding that everyone has hardships but that no matter the hardship, one also has hope. "Never, ever give up hope." Blumenthal-Lazan discussed the ways she was able to find hope while in the midst of so much hardship and death. "I played games to make myself feel better. I used to look for pebbles. I thought that if I could find four



perfect pebbles that were the same shape and size, that it would mean that my parents and my brother and I would live."

Mrs. Blumenthal held up the Star of David that she had been forced to wear, highlighting the mistreatment that Jews suffered at the hands of the Nazis. She asked that the students of District 194 be kind to one another. "Let kindness be your guide." After a standing ovation from the students of Columbia Central, Mrs. Blumenthal-Lazan shared hugs and pictures with countless groups of students. Many were moved to tears and the staff and students of District 194 were forever changed by her visit.

### Intermediate Center Students Enjoy Cultural Learning Experience

Miss Wendt's class at Steger Intermediate Center had a special learning experience on November 13th. Miss Pamela Austin came to visit from Tanzania, Africa. The students created interview questions for Miss Pam, who works with an orphanage in Tanzania. She taught the students about the Tanzanian culture, taught the students a little Swahili, and then did a canvas painting project with the students. The students enjoyed Miss Pam's visit and learned a lot about the similarities and



differences between the Tanzanian culture and our own.


### Chicago Sports Radio Voice Comes Home to District 194

- Read ten minutes each night with your child or use math flash cards to work on math facts.



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### A Word From Superintendent Hahto

Dear Community Members,

In October, Ted Griffin, a teacher in the Steger 194 school district for 37 years, from 1961 to 1998, passed away. This article is about Ted and his legacy to Steger schools.

As many of you may know, I am a K-8 graduate of Steger 194. That was over 50 years ago. Since early 2016, when I was appointed Superintendent here, I have been vocal about the fine education I received in 194. Mr. Griffin played a big part in that.

We all have favorite teachers – there's nothing surprising about that. But, what is surprising is that more than five decades later, I find myself in the position to have the opportunity of writing an article of appreciation about Mr. Griffin and why he was an inspirational teacher and a role model for his students.

In my junior high school-aged brain, Mr. Griffin was simply my chorus teacher who taught his students lots of cool songs to sing and who made learning fun. Now, looking back as a teacher and administrator, it is apparent that Ted Griffin was indeed somebody special. He had that solid combination of qualities -knowledge in his field, confidence, humility, humor, kindness, and most of all, an optimism in his students' capabilities, all of which resulted in students who respected him and were eager to learn.

I have a feeling there are legions of others who experienced Mr. Griffin's music and choral classes that feel the same way I do. One reason is because I have seen generous donations come in to the District Office to help fund a music scholarship in his name. The funds will help send middle school students to summer music camp. At this writing, we have collected more than \$2500.00, a wonderful legacy.

Additionally, I'd like the community to know that today's Steger 194 teachers are developing their own legacies, many, I suspect, without fully realizing it. The same characteristics that Ted had are being replicated time and time again in all three of our schools by teachers who see their teaching careers not only as a job, but as a calling, whose dedication to their students and their academic and emotional empowerment is their life's work. I'd like to say to them, "I cannot thank you enough for the good that you are doing for Steger 194 students. Just like Ted Griffin, you are building a wonderful legacy."





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
