## **Life at Franklin Avenue**





The children actively engage in group reading activities with purpose and understanding. They have been practicing reading for meaning and monitoring whether or not a word looks right and sounds right while reading. The Kindergarteners will continue to retell stories in sequence using appropriate language, vocabulary and character names.

The Kindergarteners have been working so hard on their handwriting and it shows! The children use a combination of drawing, dictating, and writing to compose texts in which they name what they are writing about and supply some information about the topic. It is encouraged that children continue to phonetically sound out words when writing.

Students have begun to harness their practiced counting abilities, knowledge of the value of numbers, and work with embedded numbers to reason about and solve addition and subtraction expressions and equations. The culminating task asks students to demonstrate their understanding of addition as putting together, adding to and subtraction as taking apart, taking from. Students mathematical models and equations to show an understanding about composition and decomposition to 20.

## **Makerspace**

This past month has been very exciting for the Makerspace at Franklin Avenue. We introduced the new room with its wonderful projects and gadgets to all the classes at Franklin Avenue. The Makerspace is a new classroom in the school that provides an environment where students can **Create**, **Invent**, **Make** and **Do**. It is a place where students can explore **Science**, **Technology**, **Engineering**, **Arts** and **Math**.

The Makerspace is equipped with many activities. Some are guided and some are open-ended. It includes items such as Lego Robotics, Dash Robots, Little Bits Circuits, Snap Circuits, sewing machines, Keva blocks, Marble Run, Broadcasting equipment, carving machine, 3D Printer, hand tools and many supplies for amazing and educational projects.

The Makerspace will officially launch next September and will be visited by students during the school day. Students will sometimes visit the classroom when the school curriculum lends itself for this environment, during flex time, and at other teacher designated times.

For our soft opening, all the grades started with the Gigantic Bubble Machine project. The students designed a net between two sticks then dipped it in a bubble solution to make gigantic bubbles. They learned what designs make bigger bubbles, and how wind conditions affect the size and shape of the bubbles.

The 4th graders also did a Lego Robotics project at the Makerspace. They built a robot arm that would pick up objects detected from the robot's sensors. They worked in teams where they planned what they were going to do. They then collaborated with each other and adjusted their robot when things did not go according to plan.

We look forward to many more amazing projects in the coming academic year.

Without the PTA and the endless hard work of our principal, teachers and parents, this endeavor would not have been possible! A BIG thank you to them for raising \$21,000 through PTA efforts and grants to fund the Makerspace! A very special thank you to the Makerspace committee! This exciting room will be appreciated and used by our children for many years to come.



#### **Preventing Summer Slide**

Now that the school year is coming to an end, your children are being reassessed by their classroom teachers to determine their independent reading levels at year-end. Find out that level from the teachers and use this guided reading level chart to determine where your child falls.

Many children, especially struggling readers, forget some of what they've learned during the summer months. Scholastic.com suggests three simple strategies to help your child improve his/her reading during the summer:


- Six books to summer success: Research shows that reading just six books during the summer may keep a struggling reader from regressing. When choosing the six, be sure that they are just right not too hard and not too easy. Take advantage of your local library. Ask for help selecting books that match your child's age, interests, and abilities. Libraries often run summer reading programs that motivate kids to read, so find out what's available in your area.
- Read something every day: Encourage your child to take advantage of every opportunity to read. Find them throughout the day: comics, schedules, menus, maps, magazines, online resources, Storiaschool.com, along with their book reading.
- 3. Keep reading aloud to your child: Reading aloud benefits all children and teens, especially those who struggle. One benefit is that you can read books your child can't, so he/she will build listening comprehension skills with grade-level and above books. This will increase his/her knowledge and expand his/her experience with text, so that he/she will do better when she reads on her own.

Can 20 minutes of daily reading make a difference? Research shows that students who scored 90% better than their peers on reading tests, read for more than 20 minutes a day – exposing them to 1.8 million words a year.

On a final note, children need free time in the summer to relax and enjoy the pleasures of childhood. So, summer reading should be fun!

The summer season is approaching quickly, and while that tends to inspire a carefree lifestyle in all of us, we shouldn't forget our health in the process.

#### 1. Use sunscreen—but not just any sunscreen.

Wearing sunscreen, especially when the sun is at its peak between 11 a.m. and 2 p.m., is an important first step. But choosing the right sunscreen makes a big difference. Opt for a "broad spectrum" sunscreen that protects from both UVB and UVA rays. Try to plan ahead by applying sunscreen before you leave the house (at least 15 minutes before you go outside). It takes this long to absorb into your skin and to provide full protection.

#### 2. Drink plenty of water and avoid dehydrating foods.

It's a common question: Just how much water should I be drinking? The answer varies for each person, depending on your diet, weight, level of exercise, and a variety of other factors. In regular temperatures, the general consensus is at least three liters per day. This number goes up during hot months when you are losing more water through perspiration. While water is an excellent baseline, you can also incorporate other hydrating liquids that are low in sugar and high in electrolytes and eat water-rich foods like fruits and veggies.

#### 3. Choose your timing wisely.

During the summer months, the height of the day is the hardest on your body. With solar rays at their peak, you are more susceptible to dehydration, sunburns, and fatigue. If possible, plan your outdoor activities for the morning (before 11:00 a.m.) or later in the afternoon (after 2:00 p.m.). This practice will help you avoid long-term sun exposure when the sun is at its peak.

#### 4. Avoid direct sun exposure when possible.

When it's hot out, we tend to pull out tank tops, shorts, and anything else that gives our skin some breathing room. But light, breathable clothing that covers more can often keep you cooler while protecting your skin from the sun. Recommended fabrics for hot days include linen, rayon, and cottons, because they're "breathable" and allow for air circulation but still protect your skin from absorbing heat from the sun. Plan to wear a hat too. It will protect your scalp, and if it has a wider brim, your face and eyes will be covered as well. Listen to your body and look out for signs of overheating or too much sun exposure. Headaches, muscle aches, and general fatigue are all signs that it's time to take a break, drink some water, and rest in the cool shade.




## **Student Council Announcement**
