Five Candidates Running for Two Seats

Dear Pelham Residents.



On Tuesday, May 16, I encourage you to vote in the 2017-18 school budget referendum and Board of Education election. I believe that the school budget,

adopted by the Board, will allow the District to continue the great strides we have made toward fulfilling the goals of our Strategic Plan. In addition to the budget vote, you will also have the opportunity to select two of five candidates running for the Board of Education who will be charged with continuing to carry out the important work we do to provide the best possible education for our students.

This year's school budget continues the Board's emphasis on improving our curriculum and programming through a well thought-out and fiscally responsible budget. The proposed tax levy increase of 1.98 percent is once again under the statemandated cap of 2.14 percent and will allow the District to make substantive strides towards 21st Century Learning and Social-Emotional Wellness, as well as continue to maintain and upgrade our facilities.

One important highlight of this budget is the addition of Spanish instruction for all second and third graders starting next year through

The implementation of the International Baccalaureate Middle Years Programme took off in earnest this year at the middle school. Teachers have shown a robust interest in professional development opportunities and the results are showing in the classroom. In the next year we expect to see the program make similar progress in grades 9 and 10 as well.

students the chance to tinker, play and innovate and have quickly become an essential element of our S.T.E.A.M. programming.



HOW TO CALCULATE PROJECTED SCHOOL **TAXES FOR 2017-18**

Residential Homeowners: Using your property's 2016 assessed value:



1. Divide your total assessed value* for 2016 by \$1,000 to get your value on a per \$1,000 basis.



2. Multiply by \$18.88, the projected tax rate.



3. Deduct Basic STAR savings of \$1,739 or Enhanced STAR savings of \$3,483, if applicable.

ASSESSED VALUATION

Assessed valuation has an impact on the amount of taxes a homeowner pays. As of April 2017, the homestead assessed valuation increased by \$116,311,141 from the prior year and the nonhomestead increased by \$7,139,419.

BUDGETED REVENUE

Property Taxes

\$60,427,331

The majority of the School District's revenue comes from property taxes. The increase is below the cap allowed by NYS law for the Pelham Schools.

State Aid

\$7,335,958

This amount is based on the State's adopted budget and reflects an increase of \$413,692. This is due primarily to an increase in Foundation Aid and modest increases from other funding sources.

Miscellaneous Receipts \$2,369,931

This includes money from categories such as tuition and health services from other districts, shared town maintenance, interest on deposits, county sales tax revenue, rental of real property, and small miscellaneous revenue items.

Appropriated Fund Balance \$810,000

This includes an appropriation of fund balance generated from favorable operating results.

Appropriated Fund Balance - Non-Recurring Contractual Expenses \$586,780

This includes an appropriation of fund balance for non-recurring contractual payments to teachers.

Appropriated Fund Balance -**ERS Pension Reserve Fund** \$725,000

This money is an appropriation from the Reserve Fund established by the Board in 2008 to fund State-required pension contributions to the NYS Employee Retirement System (ERS).

Appropriated Fund Balance -**Debt Service Fund** \$325,000

This money is an appropriation from the Debt Service fund, which includes excess proceeds from past bonded capital projects.

Appropriated Fund Balance -Capital Reserve \$200,000

This money is an appropriation from the Capital Reserve established in 2016 to fund improvements and repairs to District athletic fields. Specifically, these funds will be used to bring Friendship Field up to regulation standards.

^{*} Pursuant to Section 2023 of NYS Education Law, a contingent budget must be adopted by the Board of Education after the proposed budget has been defeated twice by the voters. A contingency budget may not result in a tax levy greater than the tax that was levied for the prior school year. It is the Board of Education's authority to determine what to include in the contingency budget; however, costs related to non-contingent expenditures must be eliminated. Some examples of non-contingent expenditures include: new equipment; public use of school buildings/grounds except where there is no net cost to the District; non-essential maintenance; capital expenditures; and salary increases for certain unrepresented, non-certified staff. The contingency budget figures noted above represent the following assumptions: removal of all new equipment purchases (\$173,000); elimination of capital projects (\$950,000); and reductions (beyond elimination of new equipment and certain salary increase) of \$250,000 in the Administrative component in the budget in order to meet the Administrative cap per contingent budget law.

the implementation of the Foreign Language Elementary School (FLES) program. The FLES program, which was recommended by our World Language Task Force, would have Spanish teachers work alongside our regular classroom teachers to incorporate the Spanish language into the regular curriculum. Over the next few years, we hope to expand this program so that it is eventually in place for grades 2-5.

This budget also continues to expand our mindfulness and social-emotional wellness programming by continuing and expanding the School Yoga Project, which has proven to be successful this year, and starting a pilot of a Responsive Classroom at Hutchinson School. Additionally the budget would fund new course offerings at PMHS such as Applied Statistics, Calculus, Transitional Algebra, Mandarin 3, AP Computer Science Language, Instruction and Coding as well as the purchase of new social studies textbooks for grades 5 and 6.

As we have in previous years, the Board has also included funds for specific upgrades to our facilities and infrastructure through our operating budget. Included in the 2017-18 plan is approximately \$200,000 from our capital reserve to bring Friendship Field up to regulation standards by installing a turf infield, which is expected to also reduce long-term maintenance costs.

We encourage you to review this issue of FOCUS and take an in-depth look at this budget. Please do not hesitate to contact any one of us on the Board of Education with questions. We look forward to seeing you all on May 16th and thank you for your continued support.

Dear Community Members,

For those of you who remember the television series "The Naked City," you will recall that the series closed

with the narrator sharing, "There are eight million stories in The Naked City. This has been one of them." There was always a compelling story of intrigue and suspense. In many ways, budgets are similar. They tell stories about our values and our future and we believe that the 2017-2018 budget adopted by the Board of Education tells a compelling one designed to support our students through the careful balance of academic achievement and their social-emotional development.

The overarching theme of our budget this year is a reaffirmation of our mission- Inspiring a Standard of Excellence for All Students. This commitment is reflected in the four pillars of our Strategic Plan: 21st Century Learning, coordinating networks of support and targeted learning, social-emotional development and wellness of the whole child, and a professional culture of learning, effective feedback, and growth.

I am pleased to report that despite growing enrollment, this budget maintains favorable class sizes and all existing general and special education programs remain in place. It is also my pleasure to share that we have several substantive additions to the budget, including:

- The addition of the Foreign Language Elementary School (FLES) program for 2nd and 3rd grade students. The FLES program will supplement the regular elementary school curriculum with Spanish instruction starting next school year.
- The continuation and expansion of the School Yoga Project and the piloting of the Responsive Classroom framework at Hutchinson;
- The continuation of our research, study, planning, and implementation of the International Baccalaureate Programme in grades 6-10 at Pelham Middle School and PMHS;





- The establishment of a varsity boys' swim team, the hiring of an assistant cross country coach, and a plan to use approximately \$200K from the capital reserve to bring Friendship Field to regulation standards for girls' softball.

Voter Qualifications

To vote in a School District election/vote, vou must:

- Be a U.S. citizen
- Pelham resident for at least 30 days prior to the election and vote
- Be at least 18 years of age by Election Day
- Not claim the right to vote elsewhere
- Be registered with either the County Board of Elections or with the School District Board of Registration.

Absentee Ballot - If You Cannot Get to the Polls:

This is a two-step process of filling in and returning an application and filling in and returning the ballot:

STEP 1:

Fill in the application and return to the District Clerk in person or by mail by:

- 4:00 pm on May 9 if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter,
- 4:00 pm on May 15 if the ballot will be delivered in person. Note: Only Original Signatures will be accepted.

STEP 2:

Fill in the ballot* and return it to the District Clerk no later than 5:00 pm on the day of the vote, May 16. Ballots received after that date and time will not be counted.

*IMPORTANT NOTE:

Absentee ballot applications are available immediately. However, absentee ballots will not be available until May 5 due to this year's extended deadline for receiving prospective candidate nominating petitions.
