The enjoyment of reading is the central goal of the Pearl River Middle School Summer Reading Program. With your cooperation, recreational reading can be a top priority at home.

Along these lines, parents, teachers, and students are in a partnership regarding the success of student education. For students to maximize their progress in this area, reading should continue throughout the summer. Research states that children who engage in recreational summer reading achieve higher academic success in the following school year. Directions:

1. Read **three** books; **one book from the recommended summer reading list** and two books of choice (they can be from the list too). All three books should be enjoyable and have a **minimum** of 100 pages.
2. Keep a list of the three books read this summer on the **attached summer reading log** (page 8).
3. We recommend students complete **one activity below** based upon the book from the summer reading list:
 - Create a fictional interview video with the protagonist or antagonist where you play the character. Write a complete script and include specific details about the character based on information from the novel. The video should be at least 2 minutes long. **Please note that students may submit the video once school begins on the due date.**
 - Create a new paper book jacket for the novel. The front cover should include the title, author, and an eye-catching, colorful image. The back cover should consist of a summary written in your own words and include: the main characters, setting, plot events, problem, or conflict (but don't give anything away).
 - Create a comic strip retelling the story in your own words. Include all important events, including characters, setting, plot events, problem/conflict, and resolution.
 - Complete one graphic organizer; organizers are in the packet.

The boring ones, the mean ones, the ones who try too hard, the ones who stopped trying long ago. The ones you'll never remember and the ones you want to forget. Ms. Bixby is none of these. She's the sort of teacher who makes you feel like school is worthwhile. Topher, Brand, and Steve know this better than anyone. So when Ms. Bixby unexpectedly announces that she won't be able to finish the school year, they come up with a risky plan—more of a quest, really—to give Ms. Bixby the last day she deserves.</p>	<p><i>Night of the Howling Dogs</i> by Graham Salisbury</p> <p>Dylan's Camp Group goes camping in Halape, a remote spot below the volcano on the Big Island of Hawaii. The only thing wrong with the weekend on a beautiful, peaceful beach is Louie, a tough older boy. That night, an earthquake rocks the camp, and then a wave rushes in, sweeping everyone and everything before it. Dylan and Louie must team up on a dangerous rescue mission.</p>
<p><i>Save Me a Seat</i> by Sarah Weeks</p> <p>Ravi has just moved to the United States from India and has always been at the top of his class; Joe has lived in the same town his whole life and has learning problems—but when their lives intersect in the first week of school, they are brought together by a common enemy (the biggest bully in their class) and the need to take control of their lives.</p>	<p><i>The War That Saved My Life</i> by Kimberly Brubaker Bradley</p> <p>A young disabled girl and her brother are evacuated from London to the English countryside during World War II, where they find life to be much sweeter away from their difficult, not-so-caring mother. <i>*This is also an Award Winning book.</i></p>
<p><i>The Thing About Jellyfish</i> by Ali Benjamin</p> <p>After her best friend dies in a drowning accident, Suzy is convinced that the true cause of the tragedy must have been a rare jellyfish sting. Things don't just happen for no reason.</p>	<p><i>Full of Beans</i> by Jennifer Holm</p> <p>Grown-ups lie. That's one truth Beans knows for sure. He and his gang know how to spot a whopper a mile away because they are the savviest bunch of barefoot conchs (that means "locals") in all of Key West. Not that Beans really minds; it's 1934, the middle of the Great Depression. With no jobs on the island, and no money anywhere, who can really blame the grown-ups for telling a few tales?</p>

But Melody refuses to be defined by cerebral palsy. She actually thinks Millie is cool. This world is on the brink of war, and Gregor's arrival is no accident. A prophecy foretells that Gregor has a role to play in the Underland's uncertain future. Gregor wants no part of it -- until he realizes it's the only way to solve the mystery of his father's disappearance. <i>*This is part of a series.</i></p>

Ally's greatest fear is that everyone will find out she is as dumb as they think she is because she still doesn't know how to read. Milo visits the Island of Conclusions (you get there by jumping), learns about time from a ticking watchdog named Tock, and even embarks on a quest to rescue Rhyme and Reason! Somewhere along the way, Milo realizes something astonishing. Life is far from dull. In fact, it's exciting beyond his wildest dreams.</p>

Cory knows that football could be his ticket out. At her old school, everyone in Cece's class was deaf. Here she is different. She is sure the kids are staring at the Phonic Ear, the powerful aid that will help her hear her teacher. Too bad it also seems certain to repel potential friends. Then Cece makes a startling discovery. But one day, Adrienne starts hanging out with Jen, the most popular girl in class and the leader of a circle of friends called The Group. Everyone in The Group wants to be Jen's #1, and some girls would do anything to stay on top . . . even if it means bullying others. Now every day is like a roller coaster for Shannon. <i>*This is also realistic fiction.</i></p>
<p align="center"><i>Heat</i> by Mike Lupica</p> <hr/> <p>Michael Arroyo has a pitching arm that throws serious heat along with aspirations of leading his team all the way to the Little League World Series. Newly orphaned after his father led the family's escape from Cuba, Michael's only family is his brother Carlos. If Social Services hears of their situation, they will be separated or sent back to Cuba. Together, the boys carry on alone. But then someone wonders how twelve-year-old, Michael could possibly throw with so much power. With no way to prove his age, no birth certificate, and no parent to fight for his cause, Michael's secret world is blown wide open, and he discovers that family can come from the most unexpected sources. <i>*This is also realistic fiction.</i></p>	<p align="center"><i>Mighty Jack</i> by Ben Hatke</p> <hr/> <p>In this series, Jack might be the only kid in the world who's dreading summer. It's a lot of responsibility, and it's boring, too, because Maddy doesn't talk. Ever. But then, one day at the flea market, Maddy does talk—to tell Jack to trade their mom's car for a box of mysterious seeds. It's the best mistake Jack has ever made. What starts as a normal little garden out back behind the house quickly grows up into a wild, magical jungle with tiny onion babies running amok, huge, pink pumpkins that bite, and, on one moonlit night, that changes everything. <i>*This is also fantasy.</i></p>

Until the day new student Betty Glengarry walks into her class. Betty quickly reveals herself to be cruel and manipulative, and while her bullying seems isolated at first, things quickly escalate, and reclusive World War I veteran Toby becomes a target of her attacks. While others have always seen Toby's strangeness, Annabelle knows only kindness. Lowery proved that young adults can be heroes. For starters, Merci has never been like the other kids at her private school in Florida, because she and her older brother, Roli, are scholarship students. They don't have a big house or a fancy boat, and they have to do extra community service to make up for their free tuition. So when bossy Edna Santos sets her sights on the new boy who happens to be Merci's school-assigned Sunshine Buddy, Merci becomes the target of Edna's jealousy. Things aren't going well at home, either: Merci's grandfather and most trusted ally, Lolo, has been acting strangely lately — forgetting important things, falling from his bike, and getting angry over nothing. The action begins in October of 1875, as Secret Service agents raid the Fulton, Illinois, workshop of master counterfeiter Ben Boyd. Soon after Boyd is hauled off to prison, members of his counterfeiting ring gather in the back room of a smoky Chicago saloon to discuss how to spring their ringleader. Their plan: grab Lincoln's body from its Springfield tomb, stash it in the sand dunes near Lake Michigan, and demand, as a ransom, the release of Ben Boyd --and \$200,000 in cash. From here, the action alternates between the conspirators, the Secret Service agents on their trail, and the undercover agent moving back and forth between the two groups.</p>

In America, Hà discovers Alabama: the coldness of its strangers, the dullness of its food . . . and the strength of her very own family. <i>*This is also an Award Winning book.</i></p>	<p><i>The Wild Robot</i> by Peter Brown</p> <p>When Robot Roz opens her eyes she discovers that she is alone on a remote, wild island. She has no idea how she got there--but she knows she needs to survive. After battling a fierce storm and escaping a vicious bear attack, she realizes that her only hope for survival is to adapt to her surroundings and learn from the island's animal inhabitants. <i>*This is also science fiction.</i></p>
<p><i>Booked</i> by Kwame Alexander</p> <p>Twelve-year-old Nick loves soccer and hates books, but soon learns the power of words as he wrestles with problems at home, stands up to a bully, and tries to impress the girl of his dreams. <i>*This is also realistic fiction.</i></p>	<p><i>Ghost</i> by Jason Alexander</p> <p>Ghost wants to be the fastest sprinter on his elite middle school track team, but his past is slowing him down. Ghost. Lu. Patina. Sunny. Four kids from wildly different backgrounds. But they are also four kids chosen for an elite middle school track team—a team that could qualify them for the Junior Olympics. <i>*This is also realistic fiction and an Award Winning book.</i></p>
