Return to School Protocols

According to CDC, people with COVID-19 have had a wide range of symptoms, resulting in mild to severe illness. Symptoms may appear 2-14 days after exposure to the virus. People with these symptoms may have COVID-19:

- Fever 100 degrees or more
- Chills
- Cough
- Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing
- Fatigue
- Muscle or body aches
- Headache
- New loss of taste or smell
- Sore throat
- Congestion or runny nose
- Nausea or vomiting
- Diarrhea

Students who exhibit any one of these symptoms **may not** come to school. If a student develops or exhibits one or more of these symptoms in school, he/she will be placed in a monitored isolation room and a parent or emergency contact will be called to pick up the student. Once a student is sent home, return to school protocols must be followed.

Pearl River Schools will follow NYSDOH and local Health Department guidelines for returning to school.

Children who have had a fever of 100 degrees or more, or <u>any symptom of COVID-19</u> will be required to have a note from their health care provider, a negative COVID – 19 test (not rapid antigen test*) be fever free without fever reducing medication, and have a resolution of symptoms, or they must isolate for 10 days and be symptom and fever free in order to return to school. <u>Rockland County DOH Information</u>

School Nurses, in consultation with our Chief School Physician, will work with families whose children have known, documented conditions (i.e. migraines) to determine a Return to School plan in the event they are sent home. Minimally, this plan will require a doctor's evaluation, a note to return to school, and a resolution of symptoms.

*From Rockland County DOH- "Rapid tests provide results in under an hour, though they have a <u>high rate of false negatives</u>. Negative rapid antigen tests, which are the most commonly performed rapid COVID-19 tests, cannot rule out COVID-19 and should be followed up by a laboratory-based test.
