White Plains Bake Shoppe, White Plains Nominated by St. Matthew's Educational Building





Ms. Michele Dunne


Irvington High School Nominated by Irvington MS/HS staff

Katherine "Kassie" Keehn


Chef, Pocantico Hills School Nominated by Pocantico Hills staff

Regina Mignogna has been on the frontlines of the movement to reduce the achievement gap for 40 years. For 25 years, she was a reading specialist in White Plains Schools, working with at-risk teens. She is the founding president of the Foundation for the Public

Schools of the Tarrytowns, now in its 26th year. Through her efforts, millions of dollars have been raised to support students there. She helped bring in the Parent Child Home Program, supporting parents of young children. The Tarrytown Sleepy Hollow Basics campaign is her newest endeavor. Its mission is to ensure all children enter kindergarten ready to learn. She is grateful for the partnership with Tappan Hill School for the help in preparing materials for the Basics.



Regina has contacted us for a variety of tasks for the program. Tasks such as folding papers, placing them in brochures, placing stickers on materials and filling Ziploc baggies with blocks can be cumbersome. For our students, though, these jobs provide the opportunity to develop pre-vocational skills and eventually job skills. Students learn to follow routines to complete jobs. They also learn the value of teamwork when completing multi-step tasks as well as pride in a job well done. They learn their skills will be valued in the workforce, because Regina believes in them and goes out of her way to provide these opportunities for them.

Volunteer New York! RISE group from Arc Westchester Choices Program Nominated by the Tappan Hill Faculty and Staff

The RISE: Readiness thru Integrated Service Engagement program, of Volunteer New York! engages young adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities, supporting their transition into the adult world and engaging them in volunteer opportunities where they can build skills. We value our partnership with the Tappan Hill School. RISE volunteers have the opportunity there to mentor students who will be transitioning out of school themselves. This project allows students to make social connections with older peers who have already transitioned into the adult world. This RISE group was selected from The Arc Westchester's Choices program, an educational, community-based day program for young adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities. This assignment gives them an opportunity to develop leadership skills through volunteerism. It's a win-win for all involved, says Patti Colombo, manager of the RISE Program.

Samantha Makris has been a part of Choices Program at the ARC Westchester for 12 years. She loves volunteering as a peer mentor.



She is proud to be a project leader for all of their community service projects. She loves giving back to her community. Her other volunteer roles include being a lunch assistant at The Grace Soup Kitchen in White Plains and performing clerical tasks at the Boys & Girls Club of Northern Westchester. She helps out at the Ronald McDonald House in Valhalla, where she was selected

as the Arc Pull Tab Ambassador for their Tab Recycling Collection Program. Samantha introduced the program at Tappan Hill, and students participated in a fundraising project for Valentine's Day, helping her raise money to underwrite the cost of a night's stay for families in need. 
