






# Scale Drawings and Proportions-Scaling the World!

It is reduced or enlarged by the Scale Factor. The students have looked at drawings and determined through math exactly what the actual dimensions of rooms in blueprints were. They examined maps and determined the mileage from one town to the next. They set up ratios of the scale drawings to the actual drawings to determine each measurement. After testing, the students will be designing replicas of their homes, classroom, or famous sites such as the George Washington Bridge, the City of Newark, or Disneyland all through scale drawings.

# Advice from the Third Grade Teachers





Our third graders are the youngest NJASK testers here at RTA. We know the importance of preparation for this exam. There are many things that parents and caregivers can do at home in order to provide solace for children participating in this test.

# Ways to help at test time!

- 1. Get plenty of rest each night before testing.
- 2. Eat breakfast each morning before testing. It's hard for students to think when they are hungry.
- 3. Avoid rushing on the days of testing. Be sure to have clothes and books ready the night before so that students can arrive at school on time each morning.
- 4. Try not to be absent or tardy during testing days.
- 5. Listen carefully to instructions and do not spend too much time on any one question.
- 6. Encourage your child to do his or her very best.
- 7. Close your eyes, breathe deeply, and count to ten if you feel stressed or nervous. By working together, we can ensure your student's academic success!!

# Ways to help your child at home all year long:

- Encourage reading.
- Your child should read for at least 20 minutes a day
- Talk with your child about what they read. Ask guestions.
- Provide all kinds of print materials nonfiction and fiction books, magazines, etc.
- Encourage your child to write
- Try to expand their vocabulary, including math and science
- Use money with your child so they know the denominations and values.
- Get an analog clock and practice time concepts.
- Practice measuring with a ruler.

Use cooking to practice fractions.


# Second Graders Use Thermometers?


Four students from St. Benedicts Preparatory School are completing a five-week Community Service Project here at the school. As a part of the project,
