**Unit 2: Influences of Musical History and Culture (1.2)**

**Overview:**

Chorus is a course in which students learn musicianship, theory, and vocal technique through a variety of choral literature chosen from different genres and time periods. Students learn the basics of proper vocal production through breathing, posture, phonation, and diction. Students spend time developing their command of basic music theory and sight singing as well as the importance of melody, harmony and how a chorus is built upon the blending of each, unique voice. Musical performance is a unique and continual process. All levels of talent and experience are welcomed. Through concentrated practice, they will progress naturally to the next level of mastery. This progressive method rewards the student for personal effort and for contribution to the accomplishments of the Chorus. In this unit, students will be exposed to the richness of musical history and how it has deeply influenced culture. By the examination and performance of key composers, students will not only become better musicians but more

Formative and summative data will be used to monitor student success at first signs of failure student work will be reviewed to determine support.
