Our Principal's Message



Dear Parents and Guardians,

This is to remind you Parent/Teacher Conferences are being held from Tuesday, October 15, 2013 through Monday, October 21, 2013. Wednesday, October 16, 2013 is the late night. The sign up books are now available to you in the office.

All parents/guardians are required to attend these conferences as Progress Reports will be distributed. Progress Reports will **not** be sent home with students.

I review with teachers the kind of information they should be sharing with parents and guardians. Your child's(ren's) strengths and areas of difficulty should be clearly communicated to you. Teachers should also be sharing with you ways you can assist your children at home.

As indicated in my letter to you, our teaching staff is always available to you if/when you need a conference other than the designated months. The only exception is during instructional time. However, if it cannot be avoided I will make arrangements for the classroom.



The communication between our parents/guardians and the school is a pillar of the strength of the Academy. It is my sincerest desire to strengthen these communications, and to keep them positive and productive. I will always be available to you if there are any difficulties in communication with our staff.

Along the same lines, we have been experiencing a significant issue with students not completing homework. We have instituted interventions to assist our students. Homework club is available on every grade level, teachers are available from 3:30-4:00 to have students begin their homework before going to other activities. The most dramatic intervention is my Homework Hotline. Students who are having chronic issues with homework are required to call me when they complete their homework.

It is a parental responsibility to ensure their children complete homework. Depending on the grade/teacher, parents are required to sign the Student Planner or individual homework assignments.

Students have told me their parents don't ask them if they have homework. While I find this highly questionable, the way to ensure they are doing their homework is to look at the Student Planner and sign it.

You know I will do whatever it takes to assist our students in becoming more responsible. However, I am getting up there in years and I need my sleep. The older students have caught on - if they call me after 10:00 p.m. they know they are waking me from a sound sleep and deriving pleasure in doing so.



ents and friends many times this year.






