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
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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

PURPOSE

Sweetwater County School District #1 conducts a comprehensive Community Assessment during each five-year period, and annually reviews and updates the Assessment to reflect any significant changes affecting infants, toddlers, preschoolers, and their families, as well as eligible expectant mothers throughout Sweetwater County. This Community Assessment Update has been developed as an addendum to the original Community Assessment. Quantitative data have been compiled from local, state, and federal data resources, including 2020 Census Bureau data.



Sweetwater County School District #1's 2023 Head Start Community Needs Assessment Update identifies strengths, challenges, and barriers to self-sufficiency of families with young children that are at-risk and/or living in poverty in Sweetwater County, Wyoming. The Assessment is intended to guide program planning, to implement programming that meets community needs, to build on strengths and resources of local communities, and to assist in reducing identified barriers to self-sufficiency for families in poverty—particularly in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic and growing economic concerns. The quantitative and qualitative data gleaned from the Community Assessment process will be used by leadership and governing bodies to inform decisions including, but not limited to:

- Determination of long- and short-range program goals, objectives, and priorities;
- Types of services most needed for pregnant women, children, and families living in poverty;
- Gaps in service and geographic areas to be served, if additional funding is available, or if limitations
 in the amount of resources make it impossible to serve the entire service area;
- Locations of Head Start and/or Early Head Start services;
- Criteria to define special populations to be prioritized for recruitment and selection for services;
- Community collaborations to develop or strengthen to provide needed services; and
- Identification of and reduction of inequity issues in communities.

METHODOLOGY

The Community Needs Assessment has been developed per the requirements of the Head Start Program Performance Standards (HSPPS). HSPPS Standard 1302.11 Determining Community Strengths, Needs and Resources (right) outlines the information that must be included and analyzed about each grantee's Head Start and/or Early Head Start funded service area.

Methods utilized for the collection of data included:

- family and community stakeholder surveys;
- local, state, and federal data resources;
- internal data (Program Information Reports);
- data reflecting COVID-19 impacts;
- 2020 Census Bureau data; and
- American Community Survey, 2020 Five Year estimates*.

*The American Community Survey (ACS) collects and produces information on social, economic, housing, and demographic characteristics about the U.S. population. The ACS is an official Census Bureau survey that is part of the decennial census program. Every year, the Census Bureau contacts over 3.5 million households nationwide to participate in the ACS. The survey is sent to a percentage of households monthly. This data is used to track shifting demographics and learn about local communities.¹

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, some data may have been impacted or are missing in the Community Assessment.



KEY FINDINGS

Throughout the Community Assessment process, data trends, strengths and challenges have been identified. Below are key findings and data trends that most impact services for at-risk children/families and those living in poverty in Sweetwater County.

ADVOCACY

Key challenges in 2023 include, but are not limited to, the following: inflation on goods and services and families being forced to prioritize their greatest necessities; the need for more jobs with "livable wages"; limited quality, and affordable child care—particularly infant/toddler center-based care—for working families; and mental health challenges. These and other issues are interwoven, meaning families must remove a multitude of barriers to move towards self-sufficiency. Sweetwater County School District #1 Head Start's continued role in community advocacy and collaboration are crucial. The School Board, Policy Council, leadership, family service staff, and staff can collectively focus on increased engagement in partnerships, community groups, and coalitions which strive to break down barriers for children and families in poverty. Further, the continued utilization of and the building of advocacy skills in Policy Council members and parents are critical to expressing the needs of their children and families. (e.g. speaking out at a community meeting to discuss affordable housing or expanded transportation routes).

ECONOMIC WELL-BEING

Wyoming's 2024 state minimum wage rate remains at \$7.25/hour. A full-time minimum wage worker earns \$15,080 per year. The 2023 Federal Poverty Level (FPL) for a family of two people is \$19,720 per year; therefore, a single parent with one child who is working full-time at minimum wage (\$15,080) falls below the FPL. Post-pandemic, many employers have struggled to hire and retain employees. Therefore, some employers have increased entry-level pay to \$9-\$12 or more.

While rising wages can be positive, a single parent with one child who is working full-time at \$9.50/hour (\$19,760) or more is considered above the FPL. A head of household of four who is working full time at \$13.50/hour (\$28,080) or more is above the FPL. Head Start staff will continue to be an invaluable support for struggling families who may now be ineligible for assistance. Living wage is the hourly rate that a full-time working individual must earn to adequately support the family and cover daily expenses. The living wage needed to support one adult and one child is \$31.95 in Sweetwater County.

Further, the U.S. inflation rate was 3.24% for the 12 months ended October 2023 after rising 8.2% in Sept. 2022—a 40-year high. In contrast, inflation was 7.7% in October 2022 and 6.2% in October 2021. The rising costs of food (10.9%), energy (17.6%), shelter (6.9%), transportation (15.2%), apparel (4.1%), and medical services (5.4%) have put a further cost burden on individuals and families.

QUALITY CARE FOR CHILDREN (BIRTH-FIVE)

There are nearly 3,000 children under five years old in Sweetwater County, while the total capacity of preschools and child care licensed by the Wyoming Department of Family Services is less than 1,000. That qualifies Sweetwater County as a child care desert, defined as an area where child care is available to less than one out of every three children under age five.

The poverty rate for children under 5 years old in Sweetwater County is 18.8%, higher than WY (15.4%) and the U.S. (19.1%). An estimated 2,613 children under age 5 reside in the county, with 491 children (295 infants/toddlers and 196 preschool-aged children) living in poverty.

Sweetwater County School District #1 is funded for 100 Head Start children. Locations with the highest numbers and percentages of poverty for children under age 5 are as follows: Rock Springs (318 children, 19.2% poverty), North Rock Springs (76 children, 35% poverty), and Green River (52 children, 7.9%). There are an estimated 127 preschool-aged children in poverty in Rock Springs, 30 in North Rock Springs, and just 21 in Green River.

There is a tremendous need for quality, affordable infant/toddler care and Early Head Start center- based care in Sweetwater County. Sweetwater County School District #1 may consider applying for future Early Head Start funding or supporting another organization's funding application.

POVERTY

Sweetwater County's general population poverty rate is 10.5% (4,396 people), compared to Wyoming (11.4%). 9% of the non-Hispanic White population (2,967 people), 19.6% of the Black population (95 people), 18.5% of the Asian population (89 people), 16.1% of Native Americans (81 people), and 6.6% (188 people) of the Multi-Racial population are in poverty. Of the Hispanic/Latino population, 17.1% (1,161 people) are in poverty.

Head Start can continue to support all races/ethnicities, as well as help reduce inequities by: Providing services which build financial capability such as financial services; financial coaching; financial counseling; credit counseling; credit building; access to affordable financial products; free tax preparation assistance; assistance with accessing federal/state benefits; incentivized savings programs; and asset building/asset ownership programs; supporting individuals as they re-enter the workforce or interview for new jobs by researching with them equitable wages and benefits in the corresponding career field; and Promoting career counseling to identify higher-paying jobs/careers, including the trades.







DATA SUMMARY

Throughout the Community Assessment process, both strengths and challenges have been identified. Below is a summary of demographic information and data trends from the Community Assessment. For detailed information regarding any statistic, refer to the full narrative. Not all Community Assessment data have been included in this summary. As available, data sources reflecting the 2020 Decennial Census and impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic have been included. Due to the pandemic, some data may have been impacted or are missing in the Community Assessment.

Notes: Unless explicably stated otherwise, a referenced year refers to a calendar year. A Program Year (PY) is reflective of 12-month data collected on the Program Information Report (PIR) that is submitted to the Office of Head Start annually in August. A School Year (SY) refers to the public-school year. Fiscal Year (FY) and Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) may also be utilized.

DEMOGRAPHICS

- While the U.S. population grew by 7.1% and Wyoming's population grew by 2.4% between 2010 and 2020, Sweetwater County's population declined by 3.5% (-1,534 people). Between 2010 and 2020, nearly all cities, towns, and Census Designated Places declined in population including Green River (-5.5%, -690 people), Superior (-45.2%, -152 people), and Wamsutter (-55%, -248 people). North Rock Springs (+10.5%, +232 people) and Rock Springs (+2.1%, +490 people) were the only locations that experienced population growth between 2010 and 2020. Places with the highest populations include the city of Green River (11,825 people) and the city of Rock Springs (23,526).
- Sweetwater County has an estimated 0-4 age population of 6.6% or 2,870 children, compared to Wyoming (6.1%) and the United States (6%).
- Following are the racial/ethnic demographics of Sweetwater County: Non-Hispanic White (78.8%); African-American (1.1%); Asian (.8%); Native American/Alaskan Native (1%); Other Race (.2%); and Multiple Races (2.2%). The Hispanic population is 16% (6,917 people), higher than WY (10.1%).
- Following were the racial demographics of enrolled Head Start children in Sweetwater County during PY 2022-2023: White (90.3%); Bi-racial/Multi-racial (0%); African-American (3.5%); Native American/Alaskan Native (1.7%); Native Hawaiian or other Pacific Islander (0%) and Other (4.3%). Of enrolled children, 28.9% or 33 were Hispanic/Latino.
- Following are the most significant changes in Sweetwater County's racial/ethnic demographics between 2010 and 2020: White population decreased by 8.7% (-3,070 people) and Multiple Races increased by 231.9% (+1,294 people). The Hispanic population increased by 4% (+268 people).
- Of Sweetwater County's population, 5.2% or 2,255 people are foreign-born, more than Wyoming at 3.3% and significantly less than the national average of 13.5%. Of Sweetwater County's foreign-born population, 36.3% have become naturalized U.S. citizens and 63.7% are non-citizens. Of Sweetwater County's foreign-born population 69% or 1,556 were born in Latin America, 14.7% or 332 were born in different parts of Europe, 12.1% or 273 were born in Asia, and 4.2% were born in Canada or African countries.

- Of Sweetwater County's population, 89.5% speak English only, 8.4% speak Spanish, 1.4% speak Indo-European languages, .5% speak Asian/Pacific Islander languages, and .2% speak Other Languages.
- During PY 2022-2023, 85% of enrolled Sweetwater County HS families spoke English and 15% spoke Spanish.
- Of households in Sweetwater County, 64% are family households, slightly less than Wyoming at 67.2%. Of Sweetwater County's households, 36.7% have children—more than Wyoming (29.3%). Of the 36.7% of households with children, 21.6% are married family households. Of children, nearly 16% are estimated to be living in a single-parent household.
- During PY 2022-2023, 39% of Sweetwater County Head Start families were two-parent households and 61% were single-parent households.

EARLY CARE AND EDUCATION

- Sweetwater County School District #1 is funded for 100 Head Start children. There is no Early Head Start funding in Sweetwater County.
- New this 2023-2024 school year, Sweetwater County School District #1 opened three Pre-K classes. These three Pre-K classes, the Head Start program and a daycare for District employees are housed in one building; Overland Elementary Early Childhood Education Program.
- In Sweetwater County, there are:
 - 13 Child Care Centers serving children between ages 0-5;
 - 7 Child Care Centers accepting child care subsidy;
 - 5 Child Care Centers serving infants;
 - 8 Child Care Centers serving toddlers; and
 - 13 Child Care Centers serving preschoolers.
- In Sweetwater County:
 - o 11 of 15 (73.3%) Family Child Care Homes provide infant care;
 - 1 of 2 (50%) Family Child Care Centers provide infant care;
 - o 1 of 2 (50%) Family Child Care Centers provide toddler care; and
 - 5 of 12 (41.7%) Child Care Centers provide toddler care.

In Wyoming:

- o Child care for a 4-year-old costs \$9,009 (\$751/mo.) and infant care is \$10,647 (\$887/mo.);
- Child care for an infant and a 4-year-old costs \$19,657, 48.2% more than average rent in Wyoming. A family would have to spend 27.4% of its income on child care.
- Infant care for one child would take up 14.9% of a median family's income in Wyoming. Child care is affordable if it costs no more than 7% of a family's income. By this standard, only 8% of WY families can afford infant care.

BIRTH OUTCOMES AND PREGNANT WOMEN

- In 2021, there were 449 babies born in Sweetwater County, a decrease from 512 babies born in 2019 (pre-pandemic). Between 2017 and 2021, births decreased by -18.5%. In 2021, the birth rate in Sweetwater County dropped slightly to 10.8 births per 1,000 population from 12.1 births per 1,000 in 2019. The 2021 Wyoming birth rate was also 10.8 per 1,000 population.
- Of 2021 births in Sweetwater County, 5.1% or 23 were to teens ages 15-19, compared to 4.7% of births in Wyoming. The 2021 teen birth rate in Sweetwater County decreased to 15.2 per 1,000 teens from 25.3 per 1,000 teens in 2019. Sweetwater County's 2021 teen birth rate (15.2 per 1,000) was slightly less than Wyoming (16.1 per 1,000).
- In 2021, 31.4% or 141 women in Sweetwater County utilized Medicaid as the principal source of payment for their babies' births, slightly higher than 29.6% of new mothers in Wyoming. These numbers represent pregnant women who would be income-eligible for Early Head Start services.

DISABILITIES

- During FFY 2020, 114 children in Sweetwater County were served in Early Intervention. During 2019-2020, 191 children ages 3-5 received special education services.
- During PY 2022-23, 9.6% or 11 of Sweetwater County HS children had diagnosed disabilities, compared to 29.2% of HS children in Wyoming and 13.2% of HS children nationwide. Of enrolled Sweetwater County HS children, 12.6% or 14 were diagnosed with noncategorical/developmental delays and 7.2% or 8 were diagnosed with speech/language impairments.

ECONOMIC WELL-BEING

• Due to the COVID-19 pandemic and temporary and/or permanent closures of businesses, unemployment claims in Sweetwater County peaked at 10% in May 2022. As of September 2022, Sweetwater County's unemployment rate had dropped to 3.8%, compared to the state of Wyoming at 3.1% and the United States at 3.3%.

- The labor force is the sum of employed and unemployed persons. Between Sept. 2019 (prepandemic) and Sept. 2022, the labor force decreased by 9.4% (-1,963) in Sweetwater County.
- Wyoming's 2023 state minimum wage rate remains at \$7.25 per hour. A full time (2,080 hours) minimum wage worker earns \$15,080 per year (gross pay). The 2022 Federal Poverty Level (FPL) for a family unit of two people is \$19,720 per year; therefore, a single parent with one child who is working full time at minimum wage (\$15,080) falls below the FPL.
- The living wage (the rate a full-time working individual must earn to adequately support the family and cover expenses) for one adult and one child is \$31.95.
- Sweetwater County's median household income is estimated at \$73,384, higher than Wyoming (\$65,304) and the U.S. (\$64,994). Of Sweetwater County households, 16.4% earn under \$25,000. The median incomes of Native American (\$66,063) and Hispanic/Latino households (\$61,224) are \$11,000-\$16,000 lower than non-Hispanic, White households (\$77,281).
- The U.S. inflation rate was 3.24% for the 12 months ended October 2023 after rising 8.2% in Sept. 2022—a 40-year high. In contrast, inflation was 7.7% in October 2022 and 6.2% in October 2021.
- The Consumer Price Index (CPI) measures the average change in prices paid by consumers for goods and services needed for daily living (e.g., food, clothing, shelter, gas).

Locations with the highest numbers and percentages of poverty for children under age 5 are as follows: Rock Springs (318 children, 19.2% poverty), North Rock Springs (76 children, 35% poverty), and Green River (52 children, 7.9%).

PUBLIC ASSISTANCE

- Of Sweetwater County's population in 2020, 6.4% was receiving SNAP, compared to WY at 5.9%. Between 2016 and 2020, the number of SNAP recipients in Sweetwater County increased by 1.7%. In 2022, 19.2% of Sweetwater County Head Start families were receiving SNAP upon enrollment, lower than HS families across Wyoming (28.2%) and HS families nationwide (47.7%). Sweetwater County HS families receiving SNAP decreased by 15.8% between 2019 and 2022.
- During PY 2022-2023, 6.2% of Sweetwater County Head Start families were receiving SSI upon enrollment, compared to 3.6% of Wyoming HS families and 5.9% of HS families nationwide.
- During PY 2022-2023, 2.6% of Sweetwater County HS families were receiving TANF upon enrollment, compared to HS families in Wyoming (3.3%) and HS families nationwide (5.8%).
- Between 2018 and 2021, the number of children receiving WIC in Sweetwater County declined from 138 to 116 (-10.7%).
- In 2022, 41.2% of Sweetwater County Head Start families were receiving WIC upon enrollment, more than HS families in Wyoming (31.2%) and less than HS families nationwide (43.8%). Sweetwater County HS families receiving WIC increased by 4.8% between 2019 (prepandemic) and 2022.

EDUCATION

- The rate of adults aged 25 and older without a high school diploma is 7.4% in Sweetwater County, compared to 6.4% in Wyoming and 11.5% in the U.S. Of Sweetwater County's Hispanic population, 17.2% do not have a high school diploma. Of Sweetwater County's population, 21.2% have a Bachelor's Degree, less than WY (28.2%) and the U.S. (32.9%).
- In PY 2022-23, 80% of Sweetwater County Head Start families had a high school diploma or higher degree, less than Wyoming HS families (90.9%) and HS families nationwide (89.5%).
- Sweetwater County School District #1's 2021-2022 four-year cohort high school graduation rate was 76.3%. At-risk populations in the district experienced significantly lower graduation rates, as follows: students with disabilities (49.1%); English Language Learners (75%); economically disadvantaged students (61.3%); and those experiencing homelessness (53.8%).
- Sweetwater County School District #2's 2021-2022 four-year cohort high school graduation rate was 84.5%. Economically disadvantaged students experienced a lower graduation rate (68.3%).⁵²

FOSTER CARE

• During PY 2022-2023, 3.5% of Sweetwater County Head Start children were in foster care, compared to 8.6% of Wyoming HS children and 3.3% of HS children nationally.

HEALTH AND WELLNESS

- Of Wyoming's 23 counties in 2022, Sweetwater County is ranked 18th—among the least healthy— for Health Outcomes (length of life, quality of life). The county is ranked 15th—in the lower middle range—for Health Factors (health behaviors, clinical care, social & economic factors, environment).
- Low poverty rates, low graduation rates, low rates of physical inactivity (25%), and low excessive drinking (18%) are areas that positively affect the health of people in Sweetwater County. Adult obesity (34%), adult smoking (17%), and a high uninsured population (14%) are areas that most negatively affect the health of people in Sweetwater County.
- WY reported the highest suicide rate since 2004—the year that the state health department started publishing data. In 2021, the state recorded 189 suicides—or 32.8 suicides per 100,000 individuals. The suicide rate is more than double the nationwide rate of 13.5 suicides per 100,000 people. The 2021 suicide rate is up from the 30.6 rate recorded by the health department for 2020. State health data also shows that 108 WY residents died from drug overdoses in 2021 65 involved opioids, 44 involved methamphetamine, and 43 involved fentanyl; this is up from 108 deaths in 2020

- Following are COVID-19 data from the Wyoming Department of Health, as of Dec. 5, 2022:
 - There have been 1,938 COVID-related fatalities reported in Wyoming since the beginning of the pandemic in 2020 (318 deaths in 2022). Comorbidity data is unavailable. Of deaths, 85% were people over age 60. There have been 0 reported deaths of Wyoming children due to COVID-19.
 - Of Wyoming deaths, 91% were to the non-Hispanic White population, 8.4% to the Hispanic population, 5% to the Native American population, and 4% to Other or Unknown.
 - In Sweetwater County, there have been 134 deaths among patients with confirmed cases of COVID-19 since the beginning of the pandemic in March 2020.
 - Of Sweetwater County's population, 45.5% have received the primary vaccine series, slightly lower than 47.2% in Wyoming. This includes 13.2% of children ages 5-11, 34.8% of adolescents ages 12-17, adults 18+, and 76.1% of seniors over age 65.
- Sweetwater County has areas/populations designated as Health Professional Shortage Areas, Medically Underserved Areas, and/or Medically Underserved Populations (refer to narrative).
- During the pandemic, the national obesity rate among children ages 2 to 19 increased to 22.4% in 2020, up from 19.3% in 2019. Of WY youth ages 10 to 17, 11% have obesity, giving the state a ranking of 47. Of Wyoming children ages 2 to 4 in the WIC program, 10.6% have obesity; this is a decrease from 11.8% in 2010.
- Wyoming is ranked 33rd in the nation with a 30.7% adult obesity rate. The adult obesity rate rose from 25.4% in 2010. The 2020 adult obesity rate was estimated at 34% in Sweetwater County, higher than Wyoming at 30.7%.
- During PY 2022-2023, 52.6% of Sweetwater County HS children were at a healthy weight and 20% had obesity, less than Wyoming HS children (14.1%) and HS children nationwide (18.2%). Further, 12.2% of Sweetwater County Head Start children were underweight and 8.7% were overweight.

HOMELESSNESS

- In 2022, twenty-nine Wyoming agencies counted 584 homeless men, women, and children in shelters and 64 individuals representing 57 households in unsheltered conditions. Of the total of sheltered and unsheltered individuals, 106 of them were under the age of 18. These numbers do not include people who are doubled up with others due to financial constraints.
- During 2020-21, Sweetwater County School District #1 enrolled 5,141 students; of these, .5% (26 students) were identified as experiencing homelessness per the McKinney-Vento Act. Sweetwater County School District #2 enrolled 2,359 students; of these, .5% (12 students) were reported as homeless.
- During PY 2022-23, 2.6% of enrolled Sweetwater County Head Start children were experiencing homelessness, compared to 8.3% of Wyoming HS children and 5.6% of HS children nationwide.

HOUSING

- Cost burdened households are those with costs exceeding 30% of total household income. Of Sweetwater County's housing units, an estimated 18.2% (2,869 households) are cost burdened, lower than Wyoming (23.4%). Cost-burdened rental households in Sweetwater County are higher (33.4%) than owner-occupied households with mortgages (16.2%).
- The 2022 monthly Fair Market Rent for a two-bedroom rental in Sweetwater County is \$802. The 2022 housing wage for a 2-bedroom rental is \$16.12/hr. and the 2023 housing wage will be \$17.14/hr. For monthly rent to be affordable for a minimum wage worker, it must be \$377 or less.

FOOD INSECURITY

• Sweetwater County's 2020 child food insecurity rate was 15.4%, higher than Wyoming (12.9%) and the U.S. (16.1%). Sweetwater County's 2020 *overall* food insecurity rate was 11.5%. While the overall food insecurity rate among the White, non-Hispanic population was 10%, the food insecurity rate was 14% for the Hispanic/Latino population. Data is not available for other races.

TRANSPORTATION

• Of Sweetwater County's households, just 1.9% are estimated to not have a vehicle, compared to 3.8% in Wyoming and 8.5% in the U.S. Of *renter-occupied* households in Sweetwater County, 3.9% are without a motor vehicle, compared to 1.3% of *owner-occupied* households.

COMMUNITY PROFILE

Located in the mountain region of the western United States, Wyoming is bordered on the north by Montana, on the east by South Dakota and Nebraska, on the south by Colorado, on the southwest by Utah, and on the west by Idaho and Montana. The 2020 population of Wyoming was 576,851. Covering 97,818 square miles, Wyoming is the 10th largest state by area, the least populous, and the second most sparsely populated state in the country. Cheyenne is the state capital and the most populous city, with a 2020 population of 65,132.

Wyoming's mineral commodities include coal, natural gas, coal bed methane, crude oil, and trona. Wyoming ranks highest in mining employment in the United States. The mineral extraction industry and the travel and tourism sectors are the main drivers behind Wyoming's economy.

Sweetwater County is located in southwestern Wyoming with a 2020 population of 42,272. It is the largest county in the state with a total area of 10,491 square miles, of which 10,427 square miles are land and 64 square miles (.6%) are water. Its county seat is Green River. Sweetwater County is bordered by Fremont County to the north; Carbon County to the east; Moffat County, Colorado to the south; Daggett County, Utah to the southwest; Summit County, Utah to the west/southwest; Uinta County to the southwest; Lincoln County to the west; and Sublette County to the northwest. Sweetwater County comprises the Rock Springs, Green River, Wyoming Micropolitan Statistical Area.

Sweetwater County's economy is driven by a variety of industries including oil and gas extraction, innovative coal-mining practices such as coal gasification and clean-coal technology, health care & social assistance, and educational services. Sweetwater County is also home to the world's most massive and easily mineable deposits of Trona. Trona is the raw material for soda ash and used to make glass, paper, and many other products, as well as used in the manufacturing of chemicals such as baking soda and detergents. Minerals extracted in the county account for 67% of the area's total revenue.²



DEMOGRAPHICS

POPULATION

While the U.S. population grew by 7.1% and Wyoming's population grew by 2.4% between 2010 and 2020, Sweetwater County's population declined by 3.5% (-1,534 people).

Between 2010 and 2020, nearly all cities, towns, and Census Designated Places declined in population including Green River (-5.5%, -690 people), Superior (-45.2%, -152 people), and Wamsutter (-55%, -248 people). North Rock Springs (+10.5%, +232 people) and Rock Springs (+2.1%, +490 people) were the only locations that experienced population growth between 2010 and 2020.

Places with the highest populations include the city of Green River (11,825 people) and the city of Rock Springs (23,526).³

FOREIGN-BORN POPULATION

The foreign-born population includes anyone who was not a U.S. citizen or a U.S. national at birth. This includes any non-citizens, as well as persons born outside of the U.S. who have become naturalized citizens. The native U.S. population includes any person born in the United States, Puerto Rico, a U.S. Island Area (such as Guam), or abroad of American (U.S. citizen) parent or parents.

Of Sweetwater County's population, 5.2% or 2,255 people are foreign-born, more than the State of Wyoming at 3.3% and significantly less than the national average of 13.5%. Of Sweetwater County's foreign-born population, 36.3% have become naturalized U.S. citizens and 63.7% are non-citizens.

Of the foreign-born population in Sweetwater County, 69% or 1,556 were born in Latin America, 14.7% or 332 were born in different parts of Europe, 12.1% or 273 were born in Asia, and 4.2% were born in Canada or African countries.¹⁰

HOUSEHOLD COMPOSITION

According to the American Community Survey subject definitions, "A family household is any housing unit in which the householder is living with one or more individuals related to him or her by birth, marriage, or adoption. A non-family household is any household occupied by the householder alone, or by the householder and one or more unrelated individuals."

Of households in Sweetwater County, 64% are family households, slightly less than Wyoming at 67.2%. Of Sweetwater County's households, 36.7% have children—more than Wyoming (29.3%) and the U.S. (30.7%). Of the 36.7% of households with children, 21.6% are married family households. Of children in Sweetwater County, nearly 16% are estimated to be living in a single-parent household.

PRE-K

Beginning in the 2023-2024 school year, Sweetwater County School District #1 opened Overland Elementary Early Childhood Education Program (OEECEP). OEECEP is the home to Head Start and new for the 2023-2024 school year, three District funded Pre-K classrooms and a daycare for district staff and teenage mom's and dad's who are finishing up high school. The three District Pre-K classrooms are funded for 20 students each. Sweetwater County School District #1 Administrators and Board of Trustee's have watched the Head Start program's waiting list over the last several years, and saw the need for additional Pre-K education in Sweetwater County. In collaboration with the Head Start Management team, the additional Pre-K classrooms were able to enroll students on our Head Start waiting list as well as others who did not quite qualify for Head Start.

HOME VISITATION PROGRAMS


"Studies show that maternal, infant, and early childhood home visiting can be effective at improving maternal and child outcomes and yielding strong returns on investment for states and communities. Voluntary home visiting strengthens families with young children by meeting with families in their homes and directly providing or connecting families with health, mental health, parenting, and other supports and services, depending on each family's unique needs." ¹⁵

There are 5 primary home visiting programs in Wyoming:

- Early Head Start (Home-Based Model)
- Family Spirit
- Nurse Family Partnership (NFP)
- Parents as Teachers (PAT)
- Wyoming Hand in Hand (WHH)

The **Wyoming Hand in Hand** Home Visitation Program is currently offered in all 23 counties, including Sweetwater County. Wyoming *Hand in Hand* is available at no cost to all women, during pregnancy and/or following the birth of the baby for assessment, information, and referral to community agencies. Each family served by WY Hand in Hand is partnered with a trained registered nurse during pregnancy or after birth and receives ongoing nurse home visits that continue through the child's second birthday. This program consists of at least 25 home visits. Each family has an opportunity to receive a variety of toys and activity items that help with developmental milestones.¹⁶

Parents as Teachers: As of 2021, the Health Resources and Services Administration's (HRSA) Maternal, Infant, and Early Childhood Home Visiting (MIECHV) program served 5 counties in Wyoming including Sweetwater County. Across the state, 243 households and 587 children under age 5 and pregnant women were served for a total of 3,418 home visits. Of these, 60% of households were low income and 4.1% included a pregnant enrollee under age 21.¹⁷



CHILD CARE

Child Care Homes

In Sweetwater County, there are:

- 15 Family Child Care Homes with capacity for 128 children ages 0-12;
- 2 Licensed Family Child Care Homes with capacity for 27 children ages 0-12; and
- 12 Group Child Care Centers serving children ages 0-12.¹⁸
- 11 of 15 (73.3%) Family Child Care Homes provide infant care.
- 1 of 2 (50%) Family Child Care Centers provide infant care.
- 4 of 12 (33.3%) Child Care Centers provide infant care.
- 12 of 15 (80.0%) Family Child Care Homes provide toddler care.
- 1 of 2 (50%) Family Child Care Centers provide toddler care.
- 5 of 12 (41.7%) Child Care Centers provide toddler care.

There are nearly 3,000 children under five years old in Sweetwater County, while the total capacity of preschools and daycares licensed by the Wyoming Department of Family Services is less than 1,000. That qualifies Sweetwater County as a child care desert, defined as an area where child care is available to less than one out of every three children under age five.


- The average annual cost of infant care in Wyoming is \$10,647, or \$887 per month.
- Child care for a 4-year-old costs \$9,009, or \$751 each month.
- Infant care for one child would take up 14.9% of a median family's income in Wyoming. According to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, child care is affordable if it costs no more than 7% of a family's income. By this standard, only 8% of WY families can afford infant care.
- Child care for two children—an infant and a 4-year-old—costs \$19,657. That's 48.2% more than
 average rent in Wyoming. A typical family would have to spend 27.4% of its income on child care
 for an infant and a 4-year-old.
- A minimum wage worker in Wyoming would need to work full time for 37 weeks, or from January to September, just to pay for child care for one infant.

Child Care Subsidy


The Child Care Subsidy Program helps low-income families pay for the cost of care when the parent(s) are working or in school or training. Based on the family's income, the parents may be responsible for paying for part of the cost of care. The Department of Family Services' (DFS) Child Care Subsidy Program uses a combination of state and federal funds to assist eligible families in paying for the cost of child care while the parent(s) is working or attending an approved educational activity. If the family meets the eligibility criteria, the Department of Family Services pays a portion of the cost of care. Parents are free to choose a child care arrangement that best fits their needs as long as the chosen provider meets certain health and safety requirements. DFS bases its maximum reimbursement rates for licensed facilities on a Market Survey which is conducted at least once every three years. The most recent survey is the 2022 Market Survey.

BIRTH OUTCOMES AND PREGNANT WOMEN

In 2021, there were 449 babies born in Sweetwater County, a decrease from 512 babies born in 2019 (pre-pandemic). Between 2017 and 2021, births decreased by -18.5%.21




In 2021, the birth rate in Sweetwater County dropped slightly to 10.8 births per 1,000 population from 12.1 births per 1,000 in 2019. The Wyoming birth rate was also 10.8 per 1,000 population.²²




Birth Rate Per 1,000 Population, Sweetwater County

Of 2021 births in Sweetwater County, 5.1% or 23 were to teens ages 15-19, compared to 4.7% of births in Wyoming. The 2021 teen birth rate in Sweetwater County decreased to 15.2 per 1,000 teens from 25.3 per 1,000 teens in 2019. Sweetwater County's 2021 teen birth rate (15.2 per 1,000) was slightly less than Wyoming (16.1 per 1,000). ²³



In 2021, 31.4% or 141 women in Sweetwater County utilized Medicaid as the principal source of payment for their babies' births, slightly higher than 29.6% of new mothers in Wyoming. These numbers represent pregnant women who would be eligible for Early Head Start services.²⁴

DISABILITIES

Early Intervention and Education Program (EIEP)

Wyoming's early intervention program is the Part C system of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), designed to meet the needs of infants and toddlers with disabilities and developmental delays. The Sweetwater County Child Developmental Center (SCCDC) is a non-profit organization that is mandated by the state of Wyoming to provide early intervention services to children birth through age five with a variety of delays and disabilities. The SCCDC is the only organization in Sweetwater County to serve children ages birth through three. During FFY 2020, 114 children in Sweetwater County were served in Early Intervention.²⁵

Children Ages 3-5

In Wyoming, special education for children ages 3-5 is provided by regional programs across Wyoming, under the direction of the Department of Health's Early Intervention and Education Program. These programs offer a full continuum of educational services for children with disabilities, aged birth through 5, as part of an Early Childhood Special Education (ECSE) program. This continuum may include speech, occupational and/or physical therapy, outreach and consultation support with families. Services are provided through regional preschool programs, private and community early childhood settings, district preschools, and/or Head Start programs. ECSE services are available to all eligible children within the district, at no cost to families. During 2019-2020, 191 children were served.²⁶

During PY 2022-23, 9.6% or 11 of Sweetwater County HS children had diagnosed disabilities, compared to 29.2% of HS children in Wyoming and 13.2% of HS children nationwide. Of enrolled Sweetwater County HS children, 12.6% or 14 were diagnosed with non-categorical/developmental delays and 7.2% or 8 were diagnosed with speech/language impairments.²⁷

Students K-12

In 2021-2022, Sweetwater County District #1 enrolled 17.1% of students with disabilities and Sweetwater County District #2 enrolled 16.7% of students with disabilities. Learning disabilities, speech/language disabilities, and other health impairments were the most common types of disabilities.²⁸

ECONOMIC WELL-BEING

LABOR FORCE AND UNEMPLOYMENT

Labor Force

The labor force is the sum of employed and unemployed persons. Between September 2019 (prepandemic) and September 2022, the labor force decreased by 9.4% (-1,963 people) in Sweetwater County.²⁹

Unemployment

According to the U.S. Department of Labor, "People are classified as unemployed if they do not have a job, have actively looked for work in the prior 4 weeks, and are currently available for work. The remainder—those who have no job and are not looking for one—are counted as 'not in the labor force.' Many who are not in the labor force are going to school or are retired. Family responsibilities keep others out of the labor force."

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic and temporary and/or permanent closures of businesses, unemployment claims in Sweetwater County peaked at 10% in May 2022. As of September 2022, Sweetwater County's unemployment rate had dropped to 3.8%, compared to the state of Wyoming at 3.1% and the United States at 3.3%.³¹

WAGES

Minimum Wage

Wyoming's 2023 state minimum wage rate remains at \$7.25 per hour. A full time (2,080 hours) minimum wage worker earns \$15,080 per year (gross pay). The 2023 Federal Poverty Level (FPL) for a family unit of two people is \$19,720 per year; therefore, a single parent with one child who is working full time at minimum wage (\$15,080) falls below the FPL.³²

Living Wage

Living wage is the hourly rate that a full-time (2,080 hours annually) working individual must earn to adequately support the family and cover day-to-day expenses. The living wage needed to support one adult and one child is \$31.95 in Sweetwater County. A full-time working adult with one child who is making minimum wage (\$7.25/hour) earns just 24.1% of the living wage. A full-time working adult with a family of four who is making minimum wage earns just 21.6% of the living wage (\$33.54). 33

INCOME

The median household income in Sweetwater County is estimated at \$73,384, higher than the state of Wyoming (\$65,304) and the U.S. (\$64,994). Of Sweetwater County households, 16.4% earn under \$25,000. The median incomes of Native American (\$66,063) and Hispanic/Latino households (\$61,224) in Sweetwater County are \$11,000-\$16,000 lower than non-Hispanic, White households (\$77,281).34

INFLATION

The U.S. inflation rate was 3.24% for the 12 months ended October 2023 after rising 8.2% in September 2022—a nearly 40-year high. In contrast, inflation was 7.7% in Oct. 2022 and 6.2% in Oct. 2021.³⁵

CONSUMER PRICE INDEX

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) measures the average change in prices paid by consumers for goods and services needed for daily living (e.g., food, clothing, shelter, gas). Prices are collected monthly in 75 urban areas nationwide from approximately 6,000 housing units and 22,000 retail establishments (e.g., department stores, supermarkets, gas stations).³⁶ The annual inflation rate was 3.24% for the 12 months ended October 2023. Between September and October 2023, there was a .4% increase in "all items."³⁷

POVERTY

Sweetwater County's poverty rate for the general population is 10.5% (4,396 people), compared to Wyoming at 11.4% and the U.S. at 12.8%. Of Sweetwater County's population, 9% of the non-Hispanic White population (2,967 people), 19.6% of the Black population (95 people), 18.5% of the Asian population (89 people), 16.1% of Native Americans (81 people), and 6.6% (188 people) of the Multi-Racial population are living in poverty. Of the Hispanic/Latino population, 17.1% (1,161 people) are in poverty.³⁸

The poverty rate for children under 5 years old in Sweetwater County is 20.9%, higher than WY (15.4%) and the U.S. (19.1%). An estimated 2,613 children under age 5 reside in the county, with 491 children (295 infants/toddlers and 196 preschool-aged children) living in poverty.³⁹

Locations with the highest numbers and percentages of poverty for children under age 5 are as follows: Rock Springs (318 children, 19.2% poverty), North Rock Springs (76 children, 35% poverty), and Green River (52 children, 7.9%).⁴⁰

PUBLIC ASSISTANCE

SUPPLEMENTAL NUTRITION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) in <u>Wyoming</u> enables low-income families to buy nutritious food with electronic debit cards called ebtEDGE cards. Wyoming SNAP EBT cards can now be used at Walmart and Amazon.

Of Sweetwater County's population in 2020, 6.4% was receiving SNAP, compared to Wyoming at 5.9%. Between 2016 and 2020, the number of SNAP recipients in Sweetwater County increased by 1.7%.⁴¹

In the 2022-2023 school year, 19.2% of Sweetwater County Head Start families were receiving SNAP upon enrollment, lower than HS families across Wyoming (28.2%) and HS families nationwide (47.7%). Sweetwater County HS families receiving SNAP decreased by 15.8% between 2019 and 2022.⁴²

SUPPLEMENTAL SECURITY INSURANCE (SSI)

SSI pays monthly benefits to people with limited income and resources, including those who are disabled, blind, or age 65 or older. Children who are disabled may also get SSI. The 2022 monthly maximum federal amounts are \$841 for an eligible individual, \$1,261 for an eligible individual with an eligible spouse, and \$421 for an essential person; this represents a 5.9% increase from 2021.⁴³

During PY 2022-2022, 6.2% of Sweetwater County Head Start families were receiving SSI upon enrollment, compared to 3.6% of Wyoming HS families and 5.9% of HS families nationwide.⁴⁴

TEMPORARY ASSISTANCE FOR NEEDY FAMILIES (TANF)

Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) provides temporary cash assistance for families in need. There are two forms of TANF in Wyoming:⁴⁵

- The POWER Work program helps individuals find employment or other forms of financial stability based specifically on their needs. The program provides free Child Support assistance. POWER Work Program for a family of three, with no income, could receive monthly TANF/POWER cash assistance in the amount of \$781.
- The POWER Caretaker Relative program provides cash assistance to family members, such as grandparents, aunts or uncles, who are the primary caregiver to children whose parents are not in the same home and are responsible for the daily care and control of the children. The program provides free Child Support assistance. The monthly benefit for the POWER Caretaker Relative Program for one child with no income or resources is estimate at \$259.

In the 2022-2023 school year, 2.6% of Sweetwater County HS families were receiving TANF upon enrollment, compared to HS families in Wyoming (3.3%) and HS families nationwide (5.8%).⁴⁶

WOMEN, INFANTS, AND CHILDREN (WIC)


WIC is a supplemental nutrition program funded by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) and administered locally by the Wyoming Department of Health. WIC offices are located in Rock Springs and at Best Care Family Practice in Green River.

WIC provides nutrition education, breastfeeding support, and an eWIC card to purchase approved foods at authorized grocery stores (i.e., Smiths in Green River & Albertsons, Smiths, and Walmart SuperCenter in Rock Springs). Eligible recipients must be WY residents (not required to be a U.S. citizen), be pregnant or breastfeeding, and/or have a child younger than age 5 and a gross household income meeting eligibility guideline.

The average monthly 2022 WIC benefit per person in Wyoming was \$2,096.⁴⁷

Between 2018 and 2021, the number of children receiving WIC in Sweetwater County declined from 138 to 116 (-10.7%).⁴⁸





In 2022, 41.2% of Sweetwater County Head Start families were receiving WIC upon enrollment, more than HS families in Wyoming (31.2%) and HS families nationwide (43.8%). Sweetwater County HS families receiving WIC increased by 4.8% between 2019 (pre-pandemic) and 2022.

EDUCATIONAL ATTAINMENT

The estimated rate of adults aged 25 and older without a high school diploma is 7.4% in Sweetwater County, compared to 6.4% in Wyoming and 11.5% in the United States.⁴⁹ Of the Hispanic population in Sweetwater County, 17.2% (634 people) do not have a high school diploma. The rate of those with a Bachelor's Degree in Sweetwater County is 21.2%, less than WY at 28.2% and the U.S. at 32.9%.⁵⁰

In PY 2022-23, 59.6% of Sweetwater County Head Start families had a high school diploma or higher degree, less than Wyoming HS families (90.9%) and HS families nationwide (89.5%).⁵¹

- Sweetwater County School District #1's 2021-2022 four-year cohort high school graduation rate was 76.3%. At-risk populations in the district experienced significantly lower graduation rates, as follows: students with disabilities (49.1%); English Language Learners (75%); economically disadvantaged students (61.3%); and those experiencing homelessness (53.8%).
- Sweetwater County School District #2's 2021-2022 four-year cohort high school graduation rate was 84.5%. Economically disadvantaged students experienced a lower graduation rate (68.3%).⁵²

FOSTER CARE

During PY 2022-2023, 3.5% of Sweetwater County Head Start children were in foster care, compared to 8.6% of Wyoming HS children and 3.3% of HS children nationally.⁵³

HEALTH AND WELLNESS

COUNTY HEALTH RANKINGS

Of Wyoming's 23 counties in 2022:

- Sweetwater County is ranked 18th—among the least healthy counties—for Health Outcomes (length of life, quality of life).
- Sweetwater County is ranked 15th—in the lower middle range—for Health Factors (health behaviors, clinical care, social & economic factors, environment).

Low poverty rates, higher graduation rates, low rates of physical inactivity (25%), and low percentages of excessive drinking (18%) are areas that positively affect the health of people in Sweetwater County.

Adult obesity (34%), adult smoking (17%), and a high uninsured population (14%) are areas that most negatively affect the health of people in Sweetwater County.⁵⁴

MEDICALLY UNDERSERVED AREA/HEALTH PROFESSIONAL SHORTAGE AREA

According to the federal Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA), "Medically Underserved Areas (MUAs) are areas or populations designated by HRSA as having too few primary care providers, high infant mortality, high poverty or a high elderly population." Medically Underserved Populations are known as MUPs.⁵⁵

Some geographic areas (county or service area), populations (e.g., low income or Medicaid eligible), and facilities (e.g., federally qualified health center—FQHC or other state or federal prison) have too few primary care, dental, and mental health providers and services. HRSA works with state partners to determine which of these should have shortage designations known as Health Professional Shortage Areas (HPSAs), and are, therefore, eligible to receive certain federal resources.⁵⁶

COVID-19 PANDEMIC

Following are data from the Wyoming Department of Health, as of December 5, 2022:57

Deaths Attributed to COVID-19

- There have been 1,938 COVID-related fatalities reported in Wyoming since the beginning of the pandemic in 2020 (318 deaths in 2022). Comorbidity data is unavailable. Of deaths, 85% were people over age 60. There have 0 reported deaths of Wyoming children due to COVID-19.
- In Sweetwater County, there have been 134 deaths among patients with confirmed cases of COVID- 19 since the beginning of the pandemic in March 2020.
- Of deaths, 91% were to the non-Hispanic White population, 8.4% to the Hispanic population, 5% to the Native American population, and 4% to Other or Unknown.

COVID-19 Vaccinations

- There have been 9,289 First Pediatric Doses and 7,805 Second Pediatric Doses administered to children ages under 5 in Wyoming.
- Of Sweetwater County's population, 45.5% have received the primary vaccine series, slightly lower than 47.2% in Wyoming. This includes 13.2% of children ages 5-11, 34.8% of adolescents ages 12-17, adults 18+, and 76.1% of seniors over age 65.

MENTAL HEALTH CRISIS

"In addition to recording the greatest number of drug overdoses in a decade, Wyoming also reported the highest suicide rate since 2004—the year that the state health department started publishing data. In 2021, the state recorded 189 suicides—or 32.8 suicides per 100,000 individuals. The state's suicide rate is more than double the nationwide rate of 13.5 suicides per 100,000 people. The 2021 suicide rate is up from the 30.6 rate recorded by the health department for 2020."58

National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) found that 88,000 adults in Wyoming have a mental health condition, while about 40% of adults reported symptoms of anxiety or depression. According to data available in Feb. 2021, 19.3% of adults were unable to access essential counseling or therapy services and 561,187 people in Wyoming live in a community that lacks enough mental health professionals. The U.S. Census Bureau reported a population of 576,851 for Wyoming in 2020, meaning that about 97% of residents live in an area with a shortage of mental health professionals.⁵⁹

OBESITY

According to the Centers for Disease Control, "Body Mass Index (BMI) is commonly used to determine childhood weight status. BMI is calculated by dividing a person's weight in kilograms by the square of height in meters. For children and teens, BMI is age- and sex-specific and is often referred to as BMI-for-age. A child's weight status is different from adult BMI categories. Children's body composition varies as they age and varies between genders. Therefore, BMI levels among children and teens need to be expressed relative to other children of the same age and sex."⁶⁰

Wyoming is currently ranked 33rd in the nation with a 30.7% adult obesity rate. The adult obesity rate rose from 25.4% in 2010.⁶¹ The 2020 adult obesity rate was estimated at 34% in Sweetwater County, higher than Wyoming at 30.7%.⁶²

Nationally, 16.2% of youth ages 10 to 17 have obesity. Of youth from families in the lowest-income group, 23.1% have obesity, compared to 8.1% of those in families from the highest-income group. Of Wyoming youth ages 10 to 17, 11% have obesity, giving the state a ranking of 47.63 Of Wyoming children ages 2 to 4 in the WIC program, 10.6% have obesity; this is a decrease from 11.8% in 2010.64

During PY 2022-2023, 52.6% of Sweetwater County Head Start children were at a healthy weight. In contrast, 20% of Sweetwater County Head Start children had obesity, less than Wyoming HS children (14.1%) and HS children nationwide (18.2%). Further, 12.2% of Sweetwater County Head Start children were underweight and 8.7% were overweight.⁶⁵

HEALTH INSURANCE

Of children ages birth to five in Sweetwater County, 12.3% or 448 children were without insurance in 2020, a slight improvement from the 13.8% or 513 uninsured children in 2019. As of 2020, the percentage of uninsured children under age 5 in Sweetwater County (12.3 percent) is 4.5% higher than Wyoming (7.8%).⁶

HOMELESSNESS

Every January, states nationwide conduct the annual Point in Time (PIT) Count to identify all sheltered and unsheltered individuals in their state. In Wyoming, the next count is January 2024. The survey is a count of all people experiencing homelessness for a snapshot or a point-in-time count. This count is planned, coordinated, and carried out locally but reported to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and Congress every year. Because of HUD federal rules, the count does not include people who do not have a home of their own but were "doubled up," staying with friends or family due to financial constraints. In 2022, 29 Wyoming agencies counted 584 homeless men, women, and children in shelters and 64 individuals representing 57 households in unsheltered conditions. Of the total of sheltered and unsheltered individuals, 106 of them were under the age of 18. When looking at unaccompanied youth in the count, nine children under the age 18 were identified.⁶⁷

During 2022-2023, Sweetwater County District #1 enrolled 5,052 students; of these, .50% were reported as homeless. Sweetwater County District #2 enrolled 2,406; of these, .50% were reported as homeless.⁶⁸

During PY 2022-2023, 2.6% of enrolled Head Start children in Sweetwater County were experiencing homelessness, compared to 8.3% of Wyoming HS children and 5.6% of HS children nationwide.⁶⁹

HOUSING

Cost Burdened Households

Cost burdened households are those with costs exceeding 30% of total household income. Of housing units in Sweetwater County, an estimated 18.2% (2,869 households) are cost burdened, lower than Wyoming (23.4%).⁷⁰ Cost-burdened rental households in Sweetwater County are higher (33.4%) than owner-occupied households with mortgages (16.2%) in Sweetwater County.⁷¹

Fair Market Rent

The Fair Market Rent rate (FMR) established by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) is used as a basis for paying federal housing assistance programs like the Housing Choice Voucher Program (often called "Section 8"). Fair Market Rent is determined by conducting a nationwide survey each year. FMR prices are gross rent prices, meaning they include utilities.

The 2022 monthly FMR for a modest two-bedroom rental in Sweetwater County is \$802.⁷² The 2022 housing wage for a 2-bedroom rental is \$16.12/hour and the 2023 housing wage will be \$17.14/hour.⁷³ For rent to be affordable for an adult earning minimum wage (\$7.25/hour), monthly rent must be \$377 or less.⁷⁴

FOOD INSECURITY

Food insecurity refers to the U.S. Department of Agriculture's measure of lack of access to a sufficient amount of food for an active, healthy life for household members, and limited or uncertain availability of nutritionally adequate foods. Food insecurity may reflect a household's need to make trade-offs between basic needs, such as housing or medical bills, and purchasing nutritionally adequate foods.

The 2020 *child* food insecurity rate was 15.4% in Sweetwater County, higher than Wyoming (12.9%) and the U.S. (16.1%). The 2020 *overall* food insecurity rate was 11.5% in Sweetwater County. While the overall food insecurity rate among the White, non-Hispanic population was 10%, the food insecurity rate was 14% for the Hispanic/Latino population. Data is not available for other races.⁷⁵

In June 2022, Congress passed the Keep Kids Fed Act (S. 2089), a bipartisan and bicameral bill to help mitigate the impact of the loss of the child nutrition waivers which were due to expire on June 30, 2022. This bill increases reimbursements to schools and child care centers, support access to summer meals, and streamlines access to healthy meals for children in family child care.

Following are the provisions of the Keep Kids Fed Act:⁷⁶

- Increases Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) Reimbursements by 10 cents for each meal and snack for childcare providers and afterschool programs to stem participation declines, support good nutrition, and provide relief for struggling child care to cope with supply chain and cost issues.
- Extends the area eligibility waiver allowing family child care homes to receive the higher Tier 1
 reimbursements through the (CACFP). Streamlines access to healthy meals for children in family child
 care homes by extending the area eligibility test waiver. This year, one of the most pressing
 problems is that schools do not have the income data needed to establish area eligibility. In
 addition, this test is not an effective mechanism; it misses many providers serving children from low
 income households, especially in rural and suburban areas.
- Extends non-cost nationwide waivers through school year 2022–2023.
- Increases school breakfast reimbursement by 15 cents and school lunch reimbursement by 40 cents.

OPIOID ABUSE

One hundred thousand (100,000) Americans died from a drug overdose between April 2020 and April 2021, a 30% increase from the prior one-year period (April 2019 – April 2020).⁷⁷ In 2021, more than 107,000 Americans died of drug overdoses, setting another tragic record in the nation's escalating overdose epidemic, according to the Centers for Disease Control. The provisional 2021 total translates to roughly one U.S. overdose death every 5 minutes, a 15% increase from the previous record in 2020.⁷⁸

In 2021, overdoses involving fentanyl and other synthetic opioids surpassed 71,000, up 23% from 2020. There also was a 23% increase in deaths involving cocaine and a 34% increase in deaths involving methamphetamine and other stimulants. Experts say the COVID-19 pandemic exacerbated the problem as lockdowns and other restrictions isolated those with addictions and made treatment harder to get. Further, there has been an increased presence of the synthetic opioid fentanyl in the country.⁷⁹

State health data shows that 108 Wyoming residents died from drug overdoses in 2021 — 65 involved opioids, 44 involved methamphetamine, and 43 involved fentanyl. The second-highest number of drug overdoses recorded since 2012 was in 2014, when the Wyoming Department of Health reported 107 deaths. In 2020, 100 residents died from drug overdoses, data shows. Wyoming's suicide rate also hit a record high in 2021.⁸⁰

TRANSPORTATION

Of households, just 1.9% in Sweetwater County are estimated to not have a vehicle, compared to 3.8% in Wyoming and 8.5% in the United States. Of renter-occupied households in Sweetwater County, 3.9% are without a motor vehicle, compared to 1.3% of owner-occupied households.⁸¹

Public transportation is limited in Sweetwater County. STAR – Sweetwater Transit Authority is public transportation serving Sweetwater County. There is a fixed route service with door-to-door service. STAR offers Deviated Fixed Route service on all of its regular routes. A deviated – fixed route service is a hybrid of fixed route and demand response services. With this type of service, a bus stops at fixed points and keeps to a timetable but can deviate its course between two stops to go to a specific location for a pre-scheduled request. After deviating from the route buses return to the same point to continue their run. Deviated Fixed Route service requires one hour advance reservation. Deviated service is offered within one-quarter mile of all regular routes. For those that live outside the one-quarter of a mile, STAR provides para-transit door-to-door service. Demand Response rides are still available to those outside the fixed route service area on a first come first serve basis, by appointment with 24-hour notice. This includes all areas outside the City of Rock Springs.



As part of the Community Assessment process, a survey was given to Head Start families. Thirty-two families responded.






Which of the following best describes your employment? (Please choose only 1 answer) 32 responses




Which of the following best describes your current housing situation? (Please choose 1 answer only)




To what extent has your stress level and/or wellness been affected in the past 2 years? (Choose ALL that apply)




Within the past year, has your family received different treatment due to your race, language, and/or religion? (treated differently than others, treated unfairly, or excluded from activities) 32 responses




Within the past year, has your family been afraid or concerned about your safety due to your race, language and/or religion?



What hours does the head of the household work? (Choose only one answer) 32 responses








Has your family been directly affected (past or present) by a drug problem in the community? $_{\rm 32\,responses}$




Which best describes your family? (Choose only one answer.)




Including yourself, how many adults in your home are currently employed 32 responses




Which race/ethnicity best describes you?






Are you familiar with the Head Start program in Sweetwater County School District #1? 23 responses
