## The Sixth Grade Journeys in their Imagination

Have you ever heard of that feisty redheaded orphan Anne Shirley? Perhaps you have, but if you haven't, we encourage you to talk to one of the $6^{\text {th }}$ graders and get to know all about her. This spring, the $6^{\text {th }}$ graders are reading Lucy Maud Montgomery's classic novel Anne of Green Gables and are engaging in some thought provoking lessons about adoption, creating a family, how to find a best friend and what a gift an imagination truly is.

The heroine of their novel is one Miss Anne Shirley, a 12 year old orphan in Canada who is set to live with spinster Marilla Cuthburt and her brother Matthew Cuthburt. Anne is bright and quick, eager to please and talkative, and extremely imaginative. She does not see herself as beautiful, but is interesting-looking, with a pale countenance dotted with freckles, and long braids of red hair.

The rest of the book recounts Anne's adventures in the country school, where she quickly ex-
cels in her studies; her friendship with Diana Barry (her best or "bosom friend" as Anne fondly calls her); her budding literary ambitions; and her rivalry with classmate Gilbert Blythe, who on her first day in school teased her about her red hair. For that he earned her instant, ongoing hatred, although he apologizes many times for it. Anne and Gilbert compete in class, and Anne one day realizes she no longer hates Gilbert, but cannot bring herself to admit it; at the end of the book, they finally become friends.

The book also follows Anne's misadventures in quiet, old-fashioned Avonlea. These episodes include imaginative play time with her friends (Diana, Jane Andrews and Ruby Gillis), her run-ins with the unpleasant Pye sisters (Gertie and Josie), and domestic mishaps such as dyeing her hair green (intending to dye it black) or accidentally getting Diana drunk (by giving her what she thinks is raspberry cordial but is in fact currant wine).

At time sentimental and at time hilarious, this book has stimulated the minds of each of the $6^{\text {th }}$ graders, and they arrive to class each day eager to read about Anne's latest trials and tribulations. As an extra incentive, once the book is finished, students will view the Emmy Award Winning Miniseries of Anne of Green Gables and have a book club forum within the classroom, comparing and contrasting the novel and miniseries.

It's a great spring to be in the $6^{\text {th }}$ grade, with so much reading going on!

## RTA Central Second Graders Ease into Storytelling

"Once upon a time, in the beginning, "long, long ago." We all know what these words signal. A story is coming.

This past month, RTA Central's second graders have been learning the name for this genre of storytelling - folk tales. Although they come in many flavors, ranging from fairy tales to myths, legends, tall tales, fables, and ghost stories, our students have discovered that all folktales share common characteristics. They're our oldest form of story, handed down orally by a community at a time when most community members couldn't write. They permitted the community to preserve its cultural beliefs about how the world works. And each generation added its own special touches, so the "modern," written version of the story was composed by many unknown authors.

Reading "How Guinea Fowl Got her Spots" gave our students an opportunity to revisit some of the concepts we learned about in our prior Unit on Community, while learning new facts about animal camouflage and exploring the culture of the community that created this folk tale the Maasai of eastern Africa. Learning a little about Masaai culture permitted our students to discover firsthand how a culture's values are embedded in their folk tales.

Folk tales also proved a perfect bridge for switching our classroom writing focus from persuasive and descriptive writing to narrative writing. What better
way to ease into crafting our own story narratives than tapping into the stories handed down in our own families? Our students asked their parents to tell them a story about an occasion during their parents' childhood when they learned a lesson "the hard way." Then, in classic folktale fashion, our students "retold" their parents' moral-driven story by writing it up as a narrative.

After drafting their narrative and revising it with the help of their peers, our students gathered in a circle on the rug around our "virtual campfire" and shared their stories with each other. Listening to each others' stories and hearing their classmates' feedback helped them learn the importance of orienting their listeners in time from the very first sentence (there's a reason folk tales begin with "once upon a time") and that if you "add more details, your story [will] be more interesting." (Jibril Shumate-Edwards) Of course, we also learned valuable life lessons, for example, that sneaking out of your grandmother's house in the middle of the night to play tennis is overrated.

So the next time your children beg you to tell them a story, don't counter with "The pig fell in the mud. The end." We're all storytellers with hidden narratives just begging to be shared.

## How many times in a year?

Have your child make a list of three activities that he or she does more than once but less than ten times in a week. Then challenge your child to determine how many times each activity occurs in a year by multiplying by 52 .

## How old are you in days?

Then, multiply the years by 365 and the extra months by 30 then add 1 day for each 31-day month since his or her birthday and subtract 2 days for February (or 1 for leap years). Finally, add 1 day for each leap year your child has experienced. Bring in your correct calculation to Ms. Bobadilla and Ms. McCarthy and receive a prize!

## Descriptive Adjectives in Kindergarten?

In April the kindergarten learned many ways to describe themselves. They even learned what it is called. They learned that when we use words to describe ourselves they are called adjectives.
