


In 2008, Ms. Regina DiNunzio passed away. That year's yearbook was dedicated to her and her contributions to the Academy.




In 2010, Ms. Mary Rossi passed away. The next year's yearbook was dedicated to her and her contributions to the Academy.



Negative Numbers

This month the fifth grade has been working with negative numbers. Adding subtracting, comparing and ordering were some of the topics we have covered. One important concept we learned was negative coordinates. In one of our activities students were broken into groups and created coordinate planes using masking tape all around the classroom, we then plotted those points and were able to demonstrate negative and positive coordinate pairs. Students had to make sure their x and y axis was labeled as well as negative and positive numbers in the correct place on their number lines. Stay tuned for more exciting activities from room 23!




Making Glue

The third grade students are becoming little chemists. In our new science section students are designing mixtures to create a substance. Our first substance is glue. Students used a combination of baking soda, flour, salt, corn starch, and water to see which combination would create a sticky substance. By understanding the properties of each, students

created their mixtures, then put some on a card and placed beans on it to see if their creations where sticky enough to be called glue. They recorded their results and will use them for the next experiment. They all did a really good job and the results were encouraging.





Second Grade Learns About Soil!

Students in the second grade at our Jackie Robinson Campus weren't afraid to get their hands dirty this May! Our science lessons were about the ubiquitous substance that covers the Earth.. soil. Our students learned the functions of soil and how soil helps living things survive. They had the opportunity to not only investigate through observations and hands-on activities, but read many non-fiction texts such as: Life is a Bucket of Soil, Into the Soil, A Handful of Dirt, and Jump into Science - Dirt. All of these picture books were selected with each reading level in mind so every student received interesting and challenging books. 
dent's hard work and dedication throughout the year. Each year we are growing and see a bright musical future.



Bullfrog At Magnolia Circle?

The students in the third grade are learning how experts gain and build knowledge as they discuss what makes a frog a frog and how these creatures adapt to their environment. Students read *Bullfrog at Magnolia Circle* and practice close reading to find the gist and main idea of a section. They also identify the key details from the text and illustration that support the main idea. Finding unfamiliar words and looking for context clues is also essential during a close read. Students generate questions, build vocabulary, and locate information in the text about the bullfrog. They are excited to learn more about adaptation, habitat, predators, prey, and the overall physical characteristics of frogs. As we move forward into our study, students will have the chance to write an informational paragraph that synthesizes their learning about the bullfrog.

its natural habitat. Claryssa and her family attended the awards ceremony on May 29, 2014 where Claryssa received



RTA Debate Team Finishes Season in Second Place

One of the smallest RTA debate teams ever came up big winners at the annual awards luncheon held at the Robeson Center on the Rutgers Newark campus on May 19. A dozen RTA team members were recognized in just about every category and all contributed points that added up to RTA finishing second among 18 competing schools.

Awards for individual speakers and pairs were based on accumulation of points during the entire 2013-2014 season.

In the beginners speaker division fifth-grader Massa Godbold earned a medal of Merit, while Nicholas Carerro (seventh-grade) picked up a Speaker of Excellence medal, and seventh-graders Amber Rua and Alejandro Toledo received speaker of distinction awards. Team of Excellence awards in the beginner division went to seventh-graders Nicholas Carrero/Alejandro Toledo and Amber Rua/Mia Toledo (sixth-grade).

In the experienced division, Speaker of Excellence awards were earned by seventh-graders Raymond Alvarez, Amari Charles, and Elisha Godbold. Balthazar Sheehan, seventh-grade, took top honors with a Speaker of Distinction award. Godbold and Sheehan partnered for a Team of Excellence award and the Alvarez/Charles duo received top honors as a Team of Distinction.

Other team members who worked hard during the season but did not receive recognition at the awards program are: eighth-grader Jesse Bernardo, seventh-grader Sebastian Santiago, and fifth-grader Amelie Bobadilla.

Having finished the season within the top eight, or "Elite Eight" schools, RTA earned a berth in a final tournament to determine the top school within the Newark Debate Academy, formerly known as the Jersey Urban Debate League.

Crawlers!

In the month of May, a special delivery of hornworms arrived to rooms 308 and 310. Hornworms are the larva stage of the hawkmoth, which lives in most of the United States. They moth goes through 4 distinct lifecycle stages as it makes a complete metamorphosis. When the larva first arrived, it was about the size of a grain of rice. Within 2 weeks, our larva grew enormously, increasing its weight by 10,000 times! During this time, the students made several observations using scientific tools, journaling, and graphing to chart its growth. Currently, our hornworms are about 5 inches long and are almost ready to enter their next phase in the life cycle: pupa. As seen in the pictures, students were not shy to cuddle with our classroom crawlers! It has been awesome raising these hornworms



and we can't wait to see them transform into the magical hawkmoth!
