

Make sure to inform the main office if your son or daughter will be missing class (Saturdays too) for any school visit related reasons.





Up, Up and Array!

Submitted by the Central Campus objects. **Third Grade Team**

The students in 3rd grade at RTA Central have begun their stimulating journey through multiplication facts. First students learned that the numbers you multiply are factors and the result is the **product**. Next, students learned that an arrangement of objects, pictures, or numbers in equal columns and rows is called an array. Students went on to learn that the first number stands in a multiplication sentence stands for the rows and the times symbol (x) stands for rows of. The second factor stands for the objects in each row. Finally, the product is the total number of

Since students can more readily develop an understanding of multiplication concepts if they see visual representations of the computation process, students worked in pairs to come up with their own arrays and multiplication sentences. The students noticed that all the arrangements have something in common; they are all in rows and columns. They also noticed that the rows in each array are equal. The students presented their arrays to the class with the multiplication sentence it demonstrated. After this lesson the students were eager to continue to learn more about multiplication facts!



A Trip of a Lifetime!

The trip to our nation's capital was sponsored by the Morris Rubell Holocaust Remembrance Journeys Fund headed by his son, Michael Rubell. It was established in June 1997 to honor the memory of his father, a Holocaust survivor. The Fund aims to "perpetuate Morris's legacy and further his goal of fostering tolerance, by teaching the lessons of the Holocaust through school trips and educational opportunities for young people of all races and religions." We were very fortunate that our application, submitted by Ms. Roemer, was selected among hundreds of others because the Foundation does not usually sponsor groups of high school, or even junior high school students.

Mr. Michael Rubell was immediately impressed with our students' knowledge of the Holocaust and their relevant questions. That was the result of many weeks of preparation including reading, viewing videos, and class discussions. When students presented him with a tzedaka box, which contained money students gave for his fund, he was touched by their good deed and gesture of charity. He considered the gift beautiful and pledged to keep it in his office to "always remember this trip."

As we cruised down the New Jersey Turnpike toward our destination, the bus became a classroom on wheels as we heard first-hand stories and learned lessons from two Holocaust survivors. Peter and Fred told us of their boyhoods spent in and Czechoslovakia and Poland under Nazi occupation. We were amazed at their courage as they figured out how to evade death. In turn they were impressed at how well-versed our student were in the reasons for their struggle.

Our visit to the museum touched our hearts and left us speechless. Various artifacts helped tell the terrible tale of inhumanity. From a pile of hundreds of confiscated shoes to an actual railroad car used to transport victims to concentration camps; from a three-story tall photo gallery of all who died in one small Polish village to disturbing images of inhumane experimentation, the exhibits seemed to emphasize that the Holocaust took individual lives that totaled in the millions.

"When I passed by the shoes of real people, it was very emotional," said A'mya Braswell. "If you were in those shoes, how would you feel? I embraced the meaning of the exhibit and will never forget that."

Side trips included the Lincoln Memorial and Martin Luther King Memorial. Mr. Rubell had students gather outside the Lincoln Memorial and had two students read the Gettysburg Address. He then led them in a discussion to emphasize how important it is to protect freedom and rights for all in order to prevent the occurrence of future holocausts and genocides.

"My favorite part of the trip was the Martin Luther King Memorial," said JaVon Anderson. "It made me feel like I can do anything. He stands up straight and I started to stand up straight when I saw him."



The ABCs of Reading

futures are determined by how well they learn to read. You can help your child succeed in the classroom and beyond by helping him or her develop the reading skills they need. Experts have identified five key elements of

reading instruction to ensure students learn to read:

- **1. Phonemic awareness**: The awareness of the sounds that make up spoken words.
- **2. Phonics instruction:** Teaches the relationship of the letters of written language and the individual sounds of spoken language.
- 3. Fluency: The ability to read text accurately and

auickly

- **4. Vocabulary:** Knowledge of words and their meaning.
- **5. Text comprehension:** The ability to under stand or get meaning from text.

According to the National Institute for Literacy, this means that teachers are:

- Teaching the sounds of language. Teachers provide opportunities for children to practice with the sounds that make up words. Children learn to put sounds together to make words and to break words into their separate sounds.
- Teaching the letters of the alphabet. Teachers help children learn to recognize letter names and shapes
- Helping children learn and use new words.
- Reading to children every day. Teachers read with expression and talk with children about what they are reading.

Students Explore the Season

The second graders have been excited about reading and exploring the Fall season. We gathered leaves and went on a nature walk in the past two weeks. The students read an expository text called "Tell Me, Tree" and they learned about all the different types of trees that belong to the Evergreen and Broadleaf family. They were able to identify the different types of leaves by size, shape, and color, depending on what type of tree the leaves came from. Both classes learned the scientific word chlorophyll: the green pigment found in plant cells and the word Photosynthesis: the making of food by plants. Some students learned how to use binoculars and magnifying glasses to explore pine cones, a wasp nest, and bark from a tree.


