What is a Learning Café?


- A community conversation on a complex issue



We believe that as school District leaders, it is our responsibility to:


- ▶ Promote and support open and honest discussion about issues of intolerance.

- ► Their emotions impact their learning


Round One



What we've learned from "experts" and our own practice...

- Acknowledge the news. Better for children to hear from a trusted, reliable, compassionate source than somewhere else (i.e. the internet)
- Take your cues from the children. Don't tell them more than they need to know, and don't ignore their need to know something. Recognize that each child's needs can be different.
- Model calm.
- Be reassuring.

Continued...

- Help children express their feelings.
- Encourage children to express, listen to, and empathize with varying perspectives.
- Be developmentally appropriate.
- Be available.
- Help children think about ways to move forward.
