## The High School Placement Office

As the first round of application deadlines draws near and various testing begins for student applicants, the High School Placement Office offers these friendly reminders and tips for parents of $8^{\text {th }}$ grade students.

- The COOP test will be on Friday, November 8, 2013 for parochial school applicants. RTA will take students to and from the test. Please be at RTA at 7:10am on that day.
- The ISEE test will be given at Robert Treat Academy on December $4^{\text {th }}, 2013$ for day and boarding school applicants. Please make sure your child is in school on that date.
- The SSAT test will be given at Robert Treat Academy on December 10th 2013 for day and boarding school applicants. Please make sure your child is in school on that date.
- All November Open House dates for day and Catholic schools are listed on the High School Placement page at www.roberttreatacademy.org. Please remember that you must attend at least one Open House for every school to which you are applying.
- Parents, remember to sign your child up for a Student for a Day visit at a day or Catholic school. The High School Placement Office cannot make this appointments for you. Please let our office and the RTA main office know when visits have been scheduled.
- For boarding school applicants- try to visit as many boarding schools on your list as you can. Some schools welcome visitors at any time and some have specific visiting days.
- Please visit the High School Placement page at www.roberttreatacademy.org to link to each boarding school's individual website for that information.
- The COOP test fee is $\$ 60$ and is due to RTA in November. Please give all payments to Ms. Xanthia in the High School Placement Office.
- Students are coming home with application assignments almost daily; please take a few moments each night to review their assignments and to offer them any assistance they might need.

We are enjoying working with all of your children and we are available to answer questions.

## Paragraphs?

The students in 3rd grade are learning all about writing paragraphs. They have been working on developing a first, second, and final draft using the RACEER strategy. The RACEER strategy helps students organize and include the important parts to make a full and complete paragraph. First, students must restate the question. They must then answer all parts of the question. Next, it is crucial to cite from the text by either paraphrasing or pulling a direct quote from the reading. This is the evidence to support their answer. Explaining how the citation connects with the answer is the next step. Finally, students must be able to connect the writing to themselves, another text, or something going on in the world. This is called a text-to-text, text-to-self, and text-to-world connection. The students are enjoying getting their feet wet in this writing process. They can't wait to see how much their writing and paragraphs will improve in the next few months!

## Do You Remember Working With Fractions?

This month, the fifth graders at RTA North have been learning about fractions and mixed numbers. They have mastered adding and subtracting unlike fractions and mixed numbers. Also, they were also introduced to expressing fractions, division expressions, and mixed numbers as decimals. We have noticed that this skill has changed their understanding of money. They now can see how $1 \frac{1}{4}$ is equivalent to $\$ 1.25$.

Parents encouraged to give their child a chance to verbalize what he or

she has learned about fractions. For example, show your child two fractions such as $3 / 4$ and $4 / 5$ and ask them to compare the fractions and tell you which is greater. You should make sure they are using one of the following methods. Method 1 : Making their denominators equal and then comparing their numerators $(3 / 4=15 / 20)$. Method 2: Rewrite each fraction as a decimal and then compare decimals ( $3 / 4=0.75$ and $4 / 5$ $=0.80$ ). The more your child talks about math, the more likely they will be to apply it to their everyday lives.

4. Promoting community and public awareness of all children with disabilities by providing information.
5. Assisting local school district boards of education to identify unserved children from age three through twenty-one who are in need of special education and related services, including those students who are migrant or homeless.
