



Debate Team Garners Top Ten Results in Season Opener

A small but hardworking contingent of RTA debaters entered its first tournament of the 2013-2014 season on Saturday, November 16 at West Side High School. Facing down middle-school challengers from a dozen Newark schools, nine participants debated the resolution: The United States government should lift the economic embargo on Cuba. They had prepared to debate either for the affirmative or negative position as required by spending weeks of time during team meetings learning about the history of Cuban relations and sifting through pages of evidence in order to form arguments they could use on both sides of the issue.

"The Cuban embargo has been in place for more than 50 years now," explains Alejandro Toledo-Navarro, a 7th-grade debater. "It has prevented the U.S. and Cuba from doing business or trade with each other. It was created to get rid of the communist government in Cuba, however it has failed to do so. This leaves the U.S. wondering 'should we lift the embargo?'"

RTA saw success in both the beginner and experienced divisions. In their first-ever tournament, the following beginners received a speaker medal: Alejandro Toledo-Navarro for 18th, Amber

Rua (grade 7) for 8th, and Mia Toledo-Navarro (grade 6) for 5th place. Alejandro's partner, Riayan Reyes, was sick and unable to attend the tournament, so he debated as a "hybrid" which means he was paired with another single student from Speedwell. In spite of that, he and his partner finished 15th of 37 other teams! Amber Rua and Mia Toledo-Navarro had an impressive top-ten finish coming in tenth.

"I had a rush of excitement and I was nervous while participating in my first round, but I soon got the hang of it," recalled Amber Rua.

In the experienced division, RTA only fielded one team: Balthazar Sheehan (grade 5) and Elisha Godbold (grade 7). They finished 9th.

During his first debate in the experienced division, Balthazar Sheehan noticed the difference saying, "As a first-year experienced debater, you may compete against experienced debaters who have been three or more years in that division. This presents the kind of challenge that most debaters want: doing well against a capable opponent."

RTA debaters are now reflecting on their score sheets and judges' comments to prepare even better for their next tournament to be held on Saturday, December 14.
