Our Principal's Message



Dear Parents/Guardians,

I want to share with you some important information regarding the upcoming PARCC. You had been previously informed PARCC is replacing the NJ-ASK. In 2010, New Jersey adopted the Common Core Curriculum Standards (CCSS). The assessment which measures student's knowledge of the Common Core Curriculum Standards is the PARCC.

Since 2010, many curriculum changes and enhancements have been made in order to meet these new standards. Along with the curriculum changes in Mathematics and English Language Arts, we needed to step up our Technology curriculum as the PARCC is an on-line assessment. Further, our teachers have received several hundred hours of professional development to gain a full understanding of the CCSS and deliver instruction with the new curricula.

PARCC has been a hot topic for debate and discussion. Although vastly different in terms of standards and how standards are assessed, I would say to you the premise of the PARCC is no different than the NJ-ASK. All departments of educations have to adopt standards. New Jersey opted to adopt the CCSS. Curriculum (work of the teachers and students) must be based on the standards. The PARCC is testing the student's knowledge of the standards.

Do not feel bad if you are one of numerous parents who are having trouble helping their children with homework, especially mathematics. In anticipation of this, last year one of your Parent Council meetings was dedicated to this issue. Unfortunately, attendance was very low. I would be willing to conduct grade level workshops for parents if there is interest. I will send out another correspondence shortly.

PARCC has two assessments and two testing windows. With the exception of illness, it is imperative children be in school during testing. This is a tentative schedule and is subject to changes;

Making Inferences is "In the Bag" for Fourth-Graders

Recent literacy lessons have focused on the ability to draw an inference while reading text. Students have learned that writers leave readers clues to combine with their own knowledge to make an

"educated quess." Readers may need to infer such things as a character's traits or motivation, what they are thinking feeling, and the reafor son choosing actions. Students understand that writers reauire them to make inferences to make the story more interesting engagand ing.

Getting started with our focus on inference-making included working

working in teams to examine clues about unknown objects. Each group received a sealed paper bag containing an ordinary object – items including a pack of gum, plastic cup, and a golf ball – with three clues on an index card attached. Students spent a few minutes with each bag discussing the clues, thinking about what they


knew, and arriving at an educated guess and a reason for it, which they recorded in a notebook.

After each group had examined the clues on each bag about twelve in all - certain students from each group were asked to share their group's guess and open the bag to reveal the object. Indicating their prowess at making inferences, students correctly guessed objects!

Fifth Graders Master Challenging Concepts

The fifth graders have been busy mastering challenging concepts this year. During the month of December, the students studied the area of a triangle and decimals to the thousandths place. They practiced skills such as identifying different types of triangles using side lengths, degrees in angles, and the base and height. They have also learned how to compare, round, add and subtract decimals. Now that we are equipped with these prerequisite skills, we are ready to apply them in our upcoming, indepth study of decimals.

There are many things that parents can do to reinforce what is being taught at school. For example, ask your child to name places where they see decimals or have seen decimals. Have your child accompany you shopping and help you estimate or calculate the exact cost of multiple items before checkout. Also, encourage them to add, subtract, multiply, and divide numbers with decimals in the thousandths place such as 1.225 + 3.275. Most importantly, encourage your children to use the skills they learn at school when they are out in the real world.


