


Money, Money, Money

Everyday in class, we measured, recorded, and compared how much our caterpillars had grown. We compiled all our information to create our very own butterfly journal. On May 7th, the first graders released our butterflies as a special gift to the Earth.











Lima Bean Science Experiment at Central

This month the students in Room 13 were introduced to the theme, "Things that Grow". In Reading, students enjoyed listening to the story, "A Tree Is a Plant". Students learned about the various parts of a plant; roots, leaf, stem, and flower. They created their very own flower art project using their handprints and thumbprints to create the different parts of the flower. When the projects dried, students labled each part of the plant. But the most exciting part of this whole theme has been the lima bean science experiment. Students germinated lima bean seeds in plastic bags, then once roots grew planted their seeds in some soil and a cup. Students observed their plants everyday and recorded their observations in their Plant Observation Journal. Throughout the unit, students will learn LEFT TO RIGHT: about other things that grow other than plants; like butterflies and people.



Star Crossed Lovers in the 8th Grade

The 8th grade literacy classes began to study West Side Story in May. After learning about different star crossed lovers in literature, history, onstage and onscreen, the students started to examine the play scene by scene, and compare and contrast in detail the play's staging and directions with the coordinating scenes from the film. Daily lessons

full of song and dance filled the classroom, but the music was not the only thing being discussed. Students examined the deeper themes of the play, such as violence, prejudice and injustice and engaged in many class discussions about how these types of actions can be prevented in society today.

As if that was not enough for the young men and women in the 8th grade, they decided to undertake a serious acting project as well. Working in groups of two, partnerships began to memorize a scene between Maria and Tony, Maria and Anita, or Tony and Riff. Daily rehearsals took place and some afternoon periods were also used for staging. The students will perform their scenes in June for their classmates and teachers. In addition to fine tuning their acting skills, extra credit was offered to each student who agreed to work in a group to learn to sing and dance a song from West Side Story. Amazingly enough, almost every

student joined in a group. One only has to look out on the back lawn of the school to see boys snapping their fingers to "When You're A Jet" and girls twirling their skirts to "I Feel Pretty." Students gave up their lunch periods and remained after school in order to perfect these song and dance numbers, which will also be performed for their classmates in June.

So, spring is in the air in the 8th grade and the students are learning not only the story of a timeless romance, but how to sing, dance, speak in public, and perhaps most importantly work together in a group toward a common goal. The 8th grade will go out into the world of high school, singing and dancing and having a good time!


