

SUPPLIES

We have a uniform notebook policy on ALL grades. Each child is required to have six hard covered notebooks: 1) Reading /Spelling 2) Math 3) Science 4) Social Studies 5) Writing, and 6) Spelling.

Each grade teacher will inform children regarding any additional supplies which will be required for the year. Having an activity book for indoor recess is **IMPORTANT** in helping to maintain a safe, orderly lunchroom. These will need to be replaced when they have been completely used.

TECHNOLOGY/ INTERNET USE

Families, please actively supervise your child's use on the computer. Too many of our youngsters are going onto sites which are inappropriate for this age group.

TOWN HALL SAFETY MEETING

The town hall school safety meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, December 11, 2019 at 10:10a.m. All are invited to attend. This open meeting is conducted once a year.

READING

Research has shown that reading aloud to your child and having your child read to him / herself while you sit there reading, as well, has a MAJOR impact on success.

In addition, teach your child "active" reading strategies, such as:

- **Stop once in a while and think**. What are the main points? What has he learned? Is anything confusing? How does the material relate to real life?
- **Restate what the book says.** If your child puts things in his own words, it may reassure him that he understands.
- Make comparisons to another familiar book, or to previous chapters.

REPORT CARDS AND PROGRESS REPORTS

Report Cards will be issued at Parent/Teacher Conferences in November and March. As early as the November report card parents will be notified if their child is at risk and requires more support in school and at home. In addition, teachers will make out reach if particular areas of need are noted. The children will receive the following uniform, grade-wide assessments. Progress reports are issued September and January Report cards are issued November, March and June.

SCHOOL ASSESSMENTS

There will be periodic assessments during the year to provide teachers with additional information for planning and teaching purposes. Data from periodic exams will be analyzed to meet the learning needs of the children. Assessment results will be shared with families during parent engagement.

SCHOOL LEADERSHIP TEAM

Our school has a membership team comprised of an equal number of staff members and parents who have been <u>elected</u> by their constituencies.

This team reviews the Comprehensive Education Plan (CEP) in order to support our goals and objectives. The agendas and minutes of these meetings are posted on the bulletin board outside of the main office.

All staff members and parents are welcome to sit-in on SLT meetings.

ATTENDANCE

Daily attendance is very important as it allows for continuity of instruction. While we don't want your child to come to school if he/she is legitimately ill, he/she can not stay home for every little sniffle. Perfect attendance will be honored monthly. A special Recognition will be given in June for those students who have Perfect Attendance for the year.

BREAKFAST/LUNCH PROGRAM

Children who are part of the breakfast program should enter through Door 4 at 7:50a.m. After 8:10a.m. students enter through the main door and report directly to their class line. Doors for breakfast close at 8:10a.m. A lunch form must be turned in for each student even though there is no fee for meals. **Every parent must submit this form**. It can be done online as well www.myschoolapps.com. Students eating breakfast each morning should be prepared with their electronic meal card. Any questions can be addressed to Ms.Vasquez or Ms. DePinto 718-904-5570.

BUSES - Bus company customer service (718) 392-8855

Students who live on Casals, Cooper, Carver, Dreiser and Debs are only eligible for buses in **grades K-2**. The only 3rd, 4th and 5th graders who are eligible for bus service are those from Rombouts Street, Tillotson Avenue.

Bus service is determined by the Office of Pupil Transportation and is based on the family address which is noted in the official Dept. of Education (DOE) system.

Students need to be <u>consistent</u> in the way they come to and leave from school. If there is an **OCCASIONAL** emergency and necessity for a change, the child needs to come to school with a **NOTE** for the teacher. Please make every attempt to notify the school by 1:30pm of any dismissal changes.

CHILD ABUSE/NEGLECT

By law, suspicions of child abuse, maltreatment or neglect must be reported to the Administration for Children Services (ACS).

It is our hope that no child from P.S. 178 will ever be abused, maltreated or neglected. But in the event that information is brought to our attention, and/or there are physical or behavioral indications, we will follow the law.

Neglect also includes children who :

- continually arrive late;
- are dropped off on school grounds prior to 7:50a.m.,
- are continually picked up late;
- are dressed inappropriately;
- have excessive absences;
- are picked-up early on a regular basis with no valid reason.

<u>CITIZEN-OF-THE-MONTH</u>

Honoring Citizens-of-the-Month is a tradition we have maintained at P.S. 178. Each month every classroom teacher is asked to select a student who has:

- shown respect for others, both students and adults;
- displayed a sense of cooperation and tries their best;
- demonstrated friendship and helpfulness towards others;
- followed school and classroom rules.

We believe these fine qualities are as important to recognize as academic achievement. Teachers select a different child each month.

Our citizens and their parents are then invited for a breakfast where they receive a pin, a certificate, and the recognition they have earned. Their names are published in the school news-letter and are also posted on our main floor bulletin board. Students must be in their school uniform to attend the ceremony.

COMMUNITY BASED ORGANIZATIONS

N.Y. Edge/ Sports and Arts

This is an after-school enrichment program which accepts a limited number of students from grades 1-5. A registration form must be submitted to the program's director, Shay Coke. Since there is a limited number of seats, acceptance into the program will be on a first come, first serve basis. More information will follow.

CURRICULUM NIGHT FOR PARENTS

Thursday, September 12, 2019 beginning at 4:30p.m. parents are invited to come to school and meet the teacher. An overview of the curriculum and expectations for the year will be presented. Thursday, May 21, 2020 beginning at 4:30p.m. an additional parent engagement night will be conducted with information for the upcoming year, and end of year projects.

DISMISSAL - Pick up is 2:40p.m. Monday through Friday for all students

Kindergarten– at the classroom door (K-175, K-178, K-179). **First grade** - at the classroom door (1-139, 1-143,). **Second grade** - **Exit 3** (2-236, 2-239). **Third grade, Fourth grade** and **Fifth grade**—Main Entrance (3-206, 3-207,3-238, 4-204,4-205,5-304, 5-305 5-306). We ask pick-up people to stay clear of the doorways so classes have a clear path for walking. Teachers need to see the pick-up person prior to releasing a child. Please discuss with your child the importance of staying with the teacher until the teacher sees the pick-up person. Bus children are escorted up to the bus line-up by individual school aides. Teachers cannot confer with parents during dismissal.

Many families rely on Middle/High School students to pick up children from elementary school. Siblings must be here at the appropriate dismissal times and **follow directions as to where they should wait. Only the pick-up person should be in this area.** Often older siblings come to our school grounds with 2-4 friends; this congests the limited space even further. Friends should wait down the staircase or on the path next to the parking lot so they won't congest the dismissal areas.

PHOTO/VIDEO TAPING RELEASE

This form should be signed and returned with your blue emergency card. It enables P.S. 178 to highlight special accomplishments of the children in local newspapers, outside agencies, and with visiting programs. Photos and videos may be taken at these functions and we require your continued support.

POLICIES and PROCEDURES

Students will:

- 1. Arrive to school at 8:10am for line-up. Late-comers (after 8:20a.m.) must walk around to Main Door, and get a late pass in the School Aides' room.
- 2. Come to school with a book to read during morning line up.
- 3. Speak and act respectfully.
- 4. Always carry a **pass** when out of the classroom.
- 5. Review the Discipline Code with their parents and follow all rules.
- 6. Act appropriately in the hallways, stairs wells, and classrooms.
- 7. Complete class work and homework daily.
- 8. Wear the school uniform every day. On gym and dance days students wear navy sweats.
- 9. Follow our cell phone/ electronics school policy.
- 10. Always do their best.

PROBLEMS / CONCERNS

If any family has class related concerns, the first course of action would be to contact the teacher via note, phone call or face-to –face meeting.

If there is still an unresolved issue, please feel free to call 718-904-5570, and speak with Ms. Carrara, our Intervention Teacher. If the natter is still unresolved please make an appointment to meet administration. Questions and concerns regarding security, food services, transportation and/or the physical plant, should be directed to the main office.

PARKING LOT

The parking lot is Department of Education private property. We share it with the community—178 and 596 staff members parking there between 7:00a.m. and 5:00p.m. and community residents between 5:00p.m. and 7:00a.m.

Respect this schedule to avoid receiving a parking ticket. Some families, while not parking in the lot, continue to use it as a drop– off area– which is a safety issue and also causes problems with passage. Please do not put your children at risk of injury.

EARLY PICK UP

When a child is called from class to go home early, the lesson is disrupted for the entire class. Please make doctor's appointments <u>after</u> school hours. Early pickups should be done prior to 1:30pm. Early pick –up must be done by an adult age 18 or older.

EMERGENCY CARDS

In September, each family is asked to fill out one blue emergency cards. These cards provide

information where parents can be reached - home number, cell number, and work number - **and** the number of **two** relatives or friends NEARBY who can be called in an emergency. The school will only release a sick or injured child to an adult or someone 18 years of age or older who is listed on the card. **Please keep cards up-to-date**. In those cases where one parent is denied access to a child, the school **must** have a copy of that court order on file.

When telephone numbers change, please send an up-date to the school with the new number.

ENTRY /EXIT-ADULTS

All adults who are entering/or leaving the building should ONLY use the <u>MAIN DOOR</u>, by our security desk. Adults need to show the Safety Agent a **picture identification card**, in addition to signing the log sheet. These procedures help to maintain building safety and security. **Please leave the building using only this door as well. All other doors are alarmed**

ENTRY/LATENESS - STUDENTS

Only children who eat <u>school</u> breakfast can enter the building between 7:50a.m. and 8:10a.m. through Door 4. All other students will enter the Main Door between 8:10a.m. and 8:20a.m and proceed to morning line up. Students entering the building after 8:20a.m. must get a late pass.

HALF-DAYS

The Chancellor authorizes early dismissal on the following dates to allow time for parent teacher conferences. Dismissal is promptly at 11:40 Thursday, November 14th and Thursday, March 5th.

HONOR ROLL

Honor Roll status is granted to those students in grades 2-5 who achieve a minimum grade level of 3 across all subject areas on their report card. Honor Roll achievement is acknowledged in the fall and in the spring.

HOMEWORK

The purpose of homework is to reinforce learning and to develop a sense of self-discipline, personal responsibility, and independent thinking. It is an extension of the school day and is a good way for

parents to stay involved in the current learning that is taking place. We suggest that parents **SIGN** the homework each night. The signature does **NOT** mean you have checked the accuracy, but only that you have seen that the homework was completed. <u>Neatness</u> of your child's work should be encouraged by the family.

All children in all classes K-5 receive homework each night. Regardless of any homework assignment, it is recommended that every child read from a book of his/her choice completing a reading log. K&1 students should read for no less than 15 minutes 2-3 students should read for no less than 30 minutes 4-5 no less than 1 hour.

INTERVENTION PROGRAM-directed by Ms. Carrara

We have a positive, unified approach to encourage proper behavior throughout the school. The classroom teachers explain the school rules, which are to:

- follow directions when given;
- keep hands, feet and objects to yourself;
- stay on task;

as well as two additional classroom rules, specific to each class, at the beginning of the school year. Students are rewarded by teachers for good conduct and/or class work. Also, any administrator or out-of-classroom teacher can "reward" good behavior. An accumulation of "links of excellence" will result in school rewards. Students understand that there are consequences when rules are broken, based on the NYC DOE Discipline Code Book.

LEARNING SKILLS

A student who learns well will:

- 1. bring all notebooks, pens or pencils and other materials necessary to class;
- 2. participate actively in the classroom and listen carefully;
- 3. **ask** questions if he/she doesn't understand the discussion or if he/she has a problem;
- 4. plan his/her day; make sure he/she understands the assignment before he/she leaves class;
- 5. **use** what he/she learns; **see** how each subject applies to the others;
- 6. take responsibility for learning.

LOST BOOKS

Books are extremely expensive. In the event that books are lost, please contact your child's teacher. There can be a fee for replaced boks.

MEDICAL, DENTAL, EYE DOCTORS

Children should have yearly check-ups by a doctor. **Please submit doctor/dentist notes** to child's classroom teacher who will send them to our nurse. This includes physical, eye exams and dentist.

MEDICATION

No child may take **any** medication in school or use an inhaler unless the parent has had the doctor complete a 504 form, which can be obtained from the School Nurse in room 273. Medication kept in the Medical Room for safety reasons, not in the child's classroom. Please contact the nurse for further information and concerns. Please teach your child how to use their inhalers. The nurse can provide more information to support you with this process. Please contact.

MORNING LINE-UP

All classes will line up indoors. Kindergarten and 1st grade will be in the cafeteria, 2nd grade in the Exit 4 corridor, 3rd grade in the Exit 3 corridor, and 4th and 5th grade in the corridor between Exits 2 and 3. (Walk the school to check this)

MYON READERS/NEWS-O-MATIC

In our effort to encourage independent reading at home students may access myON books or News-O-Matic our online reading programs. Passwords will be given out by your child's teacher. You may also check with Ms. Vasquez, Parent Coordinator, for assistance.

NEWSLETTERS
