Color of my Words Fifth grade, JRC



During the month of August, the students studied how to identify each place value of a number up to the one hundred thousand place as well as state the value of each digit. They also learned how to compare numbers using place value and value. Towards the end of the month, we started to use estimation to help us determine if our answers were reasonable. Now that we are equipped with these prerequisite skills, we are ready to apply our knowledge to solve multiple-step word problems.

Some things you can do to help reinforce these skills is to have them practice at home and most importantly, have them study their multiplication and division facts. This will enhance their skills and understanding when we get to more challenging concepts this year.
