Rock Springs Police Department School Resource Officers (SROs) led a professional development day for all of Sweetwater #1 Staff on Friday, October 19, 2018. All District staff attended the school safety training for half of the day with schools and departments scheduled with a morning or afternoon session.

- Breakout sessions will occur for school and department staff to debrief

Ongoing Professional Development for 6-12 Science Teachers

Scientists from the Science and Mathematics Teaching Center University of Wyoming are providing professional development for 6th -12th grade science teachers in SCSD#1. With the new expectations for student learning in the Wyoming science standards, teachers are challenged to consider different teaching strategies when addressing these standards. Using ideas from the training, science teachers are learning how to use the "*Model of the Three Dimensions of Science Learning*" (model link) when designing lessons around phenomena. The three dimensions are Disciplinary Core Ideas, Cross Cutting Concepts, Scientific and Engineering Practices. This model helps guide teachers in how to use the three dimensions and how they interact during lesson development.

Phenomena and story lines were also investigated by teachers. Our teachers explored the phenomena of red sunsets using jars of water, milk, flashlight, red laser pointers and green laser pointers. The teachers documented their initial understanding by drawing a model on paper. After investigating, they had the opportunity to update their additional learnings on their models. Brainstorming for additional phenomena ideas and story lines were part of the training. When choosing phenomenon to integrate into units, teachers should consider the criteria of relevance, the complexity and the context.

Teachers planned lessons and will be implementing the lessons in the classrooms before the next meeting date. The lessons are designed around phenomena and story lines. The teachers will bring back an artifact and classroom experiences for the next training date. Additional training dates are in December, February and March.
















English Language ArtsTraining

Using WY-TOPP Modular Assessments

The WY-TOPP modular assessments are optional online formative assessments that are available for grades 1-11 in ELA (reading and writing), Math and soon Science will be available. These assessments are on-demand and available throughout the school year. Modular assessments are short assessments that focus on a specific topic or skill e.g. ratios and proportional relationships and are fixed form. Modular blueprints and rubrics can be found by clicking on the link.

The fixed form means that all students gets the same questions in the same order which makes for easy data analysis and data team discussions. According to district staff, modular assessments were a key element used in classrooms successful on the WY-TOPP summative. Also, take advantage of the modular writing assessments. The writing assessments are graded by the same artificial intelligence engine used to score the summative. Guidelines from WDE on modular use can be found by clicking here (enclosed).



Universal Screening Results

Fall Universal Screening took place during September 10th-28th, 2018. This graph represents district scores K-6. Additional testing information and assessment data can be found on the SCSD #1 website. <u>Universal Screening Link</u>

- Kindergarten had the lowest percentage of students that were at benchmark or above, however the trend is that Kindergarteners make the most gains.
- Fifth Grade had 15% more students at benchmark or above this fall as to compared to last fall.
- Sixth Grade had 70% of students performing at benchmark or above.

Under the WAEA requirements, schools are rated as Exceeding Expectations (blue), Meeting Expectations (green), Partially Meeting Expectations (yellow) and to Not Meeting Expectations (orange). The WAEA rating and detailed reports are used by schools to write school improvement plans. The schools will set specific goals and write targeted action plans to support increase student achievement and success. School improvement plans will be submitted to WDE and published on the website on February 1, 2019.

Under the federal accountability model (ESSA), each school receives one or more of the following identification levels for support: Comprehensive Support & Improvement (CSI), Targeted Support & Improvement (TSI), Additional Targeted Support & Improvement (ATSI), and/or Unclassified. A designation of CSI is related to overall performance in Title I schools or a four-year, on-time graduation rate of less than 67% in <u>any</u> school. TSI and ATSI are related to the performance of subgroups. This year, Wyoming schools have been rated as either <u>Identified</u> or <u>Not Identified</u>. Teacher Resources for English Learners:

The WIDA website (https://www.wida.us/) provides a number of great resources for teachers supporting English Learners. The website provides information on the "can do descriptors" under Standards and Instruction, which provide teachers with examples of performance for each language acquisition level.

Make learning visible:

Incorporating more visuals and nonlinguistic representations can greatly support all learners, especially our English Learners. By utilizing the vocabulary from ReadyGEN, Springboard, or content areas teachers can create/show a visual representation (picture) to support building background, schema, and context for students.

Pre-teach whenever possible:

Any opportunity to preview the material for an English Learner will support the student to better understand, when it is presented to the whole class.



<u>Collaboration and Communication with the EL Teacher:</u>

- Make time for conversations to support your students
- Share strategies that have been effective
- EL teacher is a great resource for supporting Language Acquisition

Use sentence frames to give students practice with academic language:

- All students need practice with academic language
- Example: I agree with __(character in the story)__or I disagree with ___(character in the story)___.
- Sentence frames can be as simple or as complex as you make them to support the needs in your classroom

Supporting ALL students during WYTOPP Testing:

In using interim assessments, remember to review the individual needs of students and the accommodations that are allowed during the assessment. Students who have an Individualized Education Plan (IEP) or an Individual Learning Plan (ILP) may have specific accommodations for testing.





Professional Learning Communities at Work:

All teachers and schools across our District, including our EL teachers are focused on PLC's, Professional Learning Communities. Our EL teachers will meet as an English Learner PLC, but will also continue to be a part of grade level and department PLC's as well.

- At the district level, EL students performed higher on the WY-TOPP ELA assessment than the state average in the following grade levels; third, fourth, fifth, and seventh.
- At the district level, EL students performed higher on the WY-TOPP Math assessment than the state average in the following grade levels; third, fourth, seventh, eighth, and ninth.
- At the district level, EL students performed higher on the WY-TOPP Science assessment than the state average in the following grade levels; fourth and eighth.
- Overland performed higher than the state average in both ELA and Math at both the third and fourth grades.
- Sage performed higher than the state average in both ELA and Math in third grade.
- Stagecoach performed higher than the state average in ELA, Math and Science in the fourth grade and Math at the third grade.
- Westridge performed higher than the state average in Math and Science at the fourth grade.
- Pilot Butte performed higher than the state average in ELA at the fifth and sixth grade levels.
- Rock Springs Junior High School performed higher than the state average in ELA and Math at the seventh grade and Math and Science at the eighth-grade level.
