# Our Principal's Message



## **Dear Parents and Guardians,**

We received our preliminary scores from the PARCC assessment taken last school year for the first time by students in 3<sup>rd</sup> through 8<sup>th</sup> grades. You will be receiving your child's individual score report in January and I will be sharing more detailed information in my State of The School Report scheduled for March.

As you know, this is the first time public school students were administered this national test. You are also well aware the rigor and preparation for this assessment is at a much higher level than the NJ-ASK. I am very excited and pleased to share with you, overall, our students did an outstanding job in meeting this new challenge.

The goal I set was for our students to score 25% above the state average in mathematics and language arts literacy. This goal was met in both contents on all but 2 grade levels. In those 2 grades they performed 18% above the state average. To say I am proud of our students and staff would be an understatement. I am in awe of this achievement and it is testimony to their hard work and your cooperation in supporting your children and the Academy.

You should have no anxiety regarding your child's performance on this test. There was no expectation that all students would pass. This is a very different test with 5 categories of performance. There were no current students who scored in the lowest level 'Did Not Meet". Again you will be getting more detailed information in January.

I am truly blessed to be a part of such a special school with very special staff, parents, and, of course, our students. I adore them all, even the ones who work my last nerve!

I would like to take this opportunity to wish all of you a happy and healthy holiday season. As a school we will be celebrating the holidays at this month's Parent Council meeting. I hope to see you all there.

## Matter Matters to Fourth Grade Scientists

Do you remember the first time you learned there is ONE word for EVERYTHING the eye can – and cannot – see? The idea that everything is made of "matter." That liquids, solids, gasses are matter, just in different phases? Fourth-graders have been trying to wrap their minds around this for the past two months or so.

Well, throwing words around is never enough, and there's no way that information will stick in young minds that way alone. Fourth-graders want to see with their own eyes, and feel with their own fingers, and listen with their own ears, and smell with...you get the idea. So, recent science lessons included hands-on work.

That included observing matter (salt, sugar, and sand) through a magnifying glass to determine their physical properties. In addition, students experimented with mixing those samples of matter in water to determine whether physical or chemical changes were taking place.

However, the most-popular activity was making "flubber." The objective was to determine if a physical or chemical change was taking place. After combining the ingredients -- roughly one cup of liquid starch, one cup of Elmer's glue, and one cup of water - students agreed the change was chemical. How did they know? The ingredients combined to form a new substance and could not be separated again.

A: I spend lots of time with my family. I go to church on Wednesdays and Sundays. I also like riding my bike and taking walks around my neighborhood.


#### 6. What are two of your future goals?


## Written Conversations




