High School Placement

Happy New Year and welcome back!! The beginning of the New Year brings much joy and renewed vigor to tackle necessary but arduous tasks. Over the next six weeks our 8th graders will be completing the remaining high school applications with the assistance of the High School Placement team. Parents, please keep reminding your son or daughter of the importance of completing all high school placement related assignments on time and to the best of their ability. Families will begin to hear from schools regarding acceptances and denials as early as the last week of January. Remember: SEND ALL NOTICES OF AC-OR FINANCIAL CEPTANCE/DENIAL/ AID TO SCHOOL WITH YOUR SON OR DAUGHTER.

Parents should check that you have completed all required steps in the financial aid and application process for a smooth acceptance. Firstly, any parents who were required to fill out and submit the PFS and/or TADS must send

proof of completion and submission of these forms to the High School Placement office. Not submitting these forms in a timely fashion could result in your son or daughter being denied



financial aid/scholarship awards. Please do not put your family in that position. Secondly, If you are applying to any of the local Catholic schools, it is very important that you take the time to fill out the PSAS and submit it to the schools that accept it. If you have questions regarding the PSAS, please do not hesitate to call a representative of the High School Placement team. You may also want to reach out to the individual Catholic schools to which you are applying to seek guidance as they each have slightly different guidelines and deadlines for financial aid awards. In addition to the financial aid documents, parents should make sure they have visited high schools they are interested in and set up student for a day at the local schools to which you are interested in sending your child.

Liberty Science Center is a New Jersey nonprofit corporation dedicated to offering exceptional science learning experiences on-site. Our eighth grade at Robert Treat Academy had the opportunity to visit this exciting and educational facility, located in Liberty State Park, Jersey City, New Jersey. The students, engaged learners, got to feel the science excitement, and actively connect people of all backgrounds to pivotal science and society issues. Students had the pleasure of viewing an IMAX movie, which focused on the Hubble telescope. The IMAX features an 88-foot wide screen. The Hubble Space Telescope, perhaps the most important astronomical tool since Galileo invented the telescope, produces astonishingly beautiful images of objects that tures. are hauntingly far away in space.

Students also viewed the "Eat and Be Eatand Science Department en"' exhibit, which is designed so students can get up close to the animals. Habitat windows are low and shaped so kids can easily discover the fascinating creatures that call Liberty Science Center home. The next exhibit they experienced was "Wonder Why". They observed the balance of a colorful beach ball on a stream of air at the Bernoulli Blower, made huge sheet Soap Bubbles, sounded off a Resonance Tube, sent a message around the room with a Sonic Tube, made Fluorescent Rocks glow and puzzled it out with Brain Teasers. This was an amazing trip in which students had the chance to make use of science and mathematical knowledge in order to solve real life problems and learn about fascinating new crea-

Ms. Capuano and Mrs. Feinstein have implemented a new activity in our second grade classroom to motivate students' behavior. The activity is cross-curricular since students are learning economy concepts, math skills, and are working to maintain positive behavior throughout the day.

The concept starts with each student assigned a Credit and Debit Notebook to track money they earn in our class. The notebooks serve as a bank account. They earn money based on a number of things. All students receive credits for the classroom jobs they perform during the week. Students also earn credits for positive behavior, completed homework, and classwork assignments. We strongly believe in working together as a team, and throughout the week they earn credits for their commitment and dedication to being the best they can be. For the most part, credits have prevailed



in our class, but sometimes debits are issued. Debits are issued when class rules are broken. We strongly encourage acts of kindness throughout the day and they have collaboratively taken this approach to heart. Our students are always proud to help and encourage their fellow classmates.

The rewards for their commitment begin when Ms. Capuano and Mrs.

Feinstein issue a paycheck to all students at the end of each pay period that reflects the money they have earned after balancing their credit and debits. At the end of the day on Friday, they cash their checks at our "school bank" and purchase items from our classroom store. They are aware if they see something they like, but do not have enough money, they can save their cash for the following week. This is not an easy skill to master ... waiting for something, but we truly believe it is an important life lesson.




