Dress Code

o All students must adhere to the District's Mandated Uniform Policy. The uniforms consist of the following:

• Navy Blue: Pants, shorts/skorts, skirts, jumpers and sweaters

White: Polo shirt (long or short) or dress shirt

• Navy Blue: Shirt (long or short) or dress shirt

Khaki: Pants, shorts/skorts, skirts, jumpers and sweaters

Emergency Information

Your children will be bringing to you an information sheet to be completed and returned to the school the very next day. On this form, you will list the necessary emergency information as is requested. Should your telephone or the names of parties change, please bring this information up to date in the office immediately.

School Day

Students are to report to school "READY" for instruction at 8:15 a.m. daily. Unless notified otherwise, school will be dismissed at 2:45 p.m. daily. The attached school calendar will give you dates school will be dismissed early or closed. You should keep this calendar handy for the rest of the school year.

Illnesses



o If your child is ill before the **start** of the school day, please be kind enough to make arrangements at home for the child to remain there as we do not have facilities to care for sick children who arrive ill. Children who become ill during the school day will be cared for. However, if the situation warrants, the nurse or the school administrator may have to call parents to come for their sick children.

Inclement Weather/Late Opening

Ouring the year inclement weather may cause school to open late, close early or not to open at all. In the event inclement weather should affect the opening or closing of school, announcements will be made over our local radio stations. We encourage you to tune into one of them for information. Please <u>DO NOT</u> call the school or the radio station during this time, as you will only interrupt the normal operations.

Blackboard Connect

The Atlantic City School District has a telephone messaging service called *Blackboard Connect*. The *Blackboard Connect* service enables us to personally communicate with parents about emergency situations, school events and other important issues impacting your child. It allows us to send personalized voice messages to your home, work or cell phone number. *Blackboard Connect* messages will advise you of the following:

- Open house dates
- School Closings
- Early Dismissals
- Absent notification
- Emergency Closings
- PAC Meetings
- School-wide events
- Class trip reminders



Based on the systems proven track record, we know this message service will improve school and district-wide communications with parents.

It is important that we have all of your current telephone numbers so that you will not miss out on any important communications.

Lateness and Absences

We encourage parents to make every effort to get children to school on time daily. Missing several days of school each year can put students at least a year behind their peers in academic performance and absenteeism affects student performance, according to a report by Attendance Works. In New Jersey chronic absenteeism is generally defined as missing 18 days of school.

o In the event there is lateness or an absence, children must bring a note from the parent to the teacher explaining the reason(s). Students arriving after 8:15 a.m. must report to the office to pick up a late pass before entering their classrooms. Parents will be called in for conferences if lateness and absences become habitual

Leaving Messages For Students

• We encourage parents to give children necessary directions and information before they leave home as the school is not equipped to handle the volume of telephone calls to give students personal messages. Message taking can be very disruptive to the routine of the school. EMERGENCY calls are accepted at anytime and every effort will be made to assist you.

Lunch Procedure



• Lunch will be provided daily to all students. However, some students will receive free lunch and others will have to pay either the reduced rate or the full amount based on the economic status of the family. Students are allowed to bring their own lunch to school. We ask that parents send the lunch with the child to school in the morning. No parent will be permitted in the cafeteria during the school day. Also, please do not send candy, soda, or junk food with your child. A good healthy lunch is essential for promoting learning.

Mark Belongings

o Please take the time to mark your child's belongings with their name. It is important that you do not permit your child to bring valuables to school or bring large sums of money.

Parent Advisory Council

• We invite all parents to take an active role in the Parent Advisory Council. Parent participation and the support of the school's effort can be efficiently and effectively done through the council. Organization of the council will take place at the first parent meeting. Parent meetings will be held quarterly.

Parents of Pre-K and Kindergarten Children

o Parents of Pre-K and kindergarten children are asked to be **prompt** in picking up their children from school.

Richmond Avenue School Security Policy



- 1. Visitors are **not** permitted to enter the instructional area during the regular school day (**between 8:15 a.m. to 2:45 p.m**.) **unless** a previous appointment has been arranged. There will be **no** exceptions to this rule.
- 2. All visitors must enter the school building using the main door, located on Windsor Avenue.
- 3. All visitors must check-in at the front door with security personnel and then proceed to the main office.
- 4. All visitors entering the instructional areas must be cleared through the office and receive proper credentials. A visitor's permission pass will be issued.

Richmond Avenue School Rules for Students

- ➤ No fighting on school grounds.
- No profanity will be permitted in school or on the playground.
- No disrespect will be permitted to teachers and other adults in the building.
- > Students will not leave the school grounds during the school day without proper authorization.

- > Students will be prepared for class and aware of class routine.

- > Students may not leave their rooms without a teacher's authorization and Hall Pass. They will go directly to the designated area and then back to class. They are not to run or play in the hallway.
- > Students will not litter the building and classroom areas.
- > Students will not be permitted into the school building **before** 8:15 a.m., unless authorized by administration.
- > Students will not enter or leave the building without teachers.

HOMEWORK GUIDELINES

Dear Parents,

Homework serves an important purpose in your child's school life. It is a means of reviewing and reinforcing the lessons taught in school. Homework is also a way to help your child to develop work and study habits that will assist him or her throughout the years spent in school.

You can help your child develop some routines that will be of assistance in successfully completing homework assignments. The following suggestions are offered for this purpose:

- Ask your child if he or she has homework that day. Be aware that homework is generally assigned everyday except Friday or the day before a holiday. By asking your child about homework, you are helping him or her to remember that there is an assignment to be completed.
- ➤ Become interested in your child's homework. Ask him or her to show the homework to you and to explain what the work completed was about. Sharing your child's work with him or her reinforces the importance of homework and helps the child to understand that you are interested in his or her progress. Looking at your child's homework also keeps you informed about the progress of the child and the way in which your child is able to complete the work assigned.
- Remember that homework is your child's work—not yours. You should not do the work for the child; rather you should be concerned with whether or not your child did the work. If your child has trouble with a homework assignment and cannot complete it, write a note telling the teacher about the problem. It is the teacher's responsibility to make the homework assignment clearly understood by each student.
- ➤ Help your child set a regular homework time each day and remain with that commitment. Free your child of other responsibilities at that time.
- ➤ Provide your child with a quiet place to work and study where he or she is not disturbed by younger children or pets.

Homework will help your youngster grow and develop.
