

# Conflict

A <u>shared</u> disagreement, dispute, argument, bad feelings, or negative actions between two people or groups...



#### **Conflict and Bullying**

- In a conflict <u>both</u> sides can feel right.
- In a conflict <u>both</u> sides can be wrong.
- Sometimes, we need to move past right and wrong.
- Not all conflict is bullying.

#### **Conflict**



#### **Should Middle School Student Use Social Media?**

Almost all social networking sites only allow users aged <u>13 and over</u>. This age limit has been dictated by US law through the Children's Online Privacy Protection Act (COPPA).



#### **Understanding That You Are A Digital Citizen**

- ▶ To know that you need positive actions in this 'community' matter as well.
- To know that everything you post online may be public.
- ▶ To know that everything you post online may be permanent.
- ▶ To know that everything you post online may be traceable.
- ▶ To know that everything you post online reflects who you are.
- What can happen if a student misuses technology or social media?

# CELL PHONES AND ELECTRONIC DEVICES



Electronic devices including cell phones, wearable devices such as smartwatches, iPads, etc., headphones and in-ear headphones such as earbuds must be turned off and stored in a student's backpack when enter the school thev **building.** Cell phones can be turned on and used immediately after dismissal from school. 

### MIDDLE SCHOOL PITFALLS


- 1. Making excuses and not taking responsibility

- Stay engaged by listening, speaking, reading, writing.
- Be curious, ask questions, wonder.
- Make connections between different subjects and real life.
- Take interest in new learning and opportunities.
- Work hard, take responsibility, and become more independent.
- Work together to solve problems.
- Try to understand how others feel; understand other points of view.
- Take healthy risks and try new things.
- Reflect on what you did and how you can improve.
- Focus on progress and know you have the tools to grow.

The adolescent brain is being "rewired" and Executive Functioning Areas Are Impacted -


- Planning

- Appropriate Behavior


The adolescent brain is primed for big rewards which increases risk taking.

Rewards are amplified by social acceptance from their peers [not boring adults].

RISK TAKING IS AN ESSENTIAL TRAIT THAT HELPS LAUNCH ADOLESCENTS OUT OF THE PARENTAL NEST AND INTO THE WORLD.


Encourage appropriate and healthy risk taking. Join a club. Try a new sport. Do something adventurous as a family.




