Additionally, our Renewal School Director was hired and there is a laser-like focus on our Renewal school efforts, including Extended Learning Time (ELT)

opportunities to help schools address the academic, social and emotional needs of students and families. The expansion of our **Community School** model will continue to ensure that the health and wellness needs of students and their families are met.

- <u>Student Achievement</u> Through the adoption and integration of Common Core aligned curricula, there are increased opportunities for students to be **critical and creative thinkers** and **effective communicators** with the incorporation of **higher order thinking questions** and **discussions**. In addition, our schools track and monitor **formative and summative assessment data** to assess students' academic needs and growth.
- <u>Collaborative teachers and teams</u> Our department and grade level teams meet weekly to address a common goal: improving the educational outcomes of our students by looking at student work, analyzing data, and planning coherent and integrated curricula units.
- <u>Strong Family-Community Ties</u> Weekly meetings and learning opportunities with school based staff enabled our families to become more engaged in their school communities. At the district level, there were also a number of well- coordinated activities:
 - * In collaboration with a number of community stakeholders we have embarked on a **Collective Impact** initiative focused on District 5, entitled the **Harlem Renaissance Education Pipeline**;
 - * **STEM Expo 2015** had record attendance of over 2,000 participants; student projects were of the highest caliber;
 - * The District's first ever **Annual Family Day 2015** was so successful that there is a preponderance of volunteers actively seeking to begin planning for 2016;
 - * Our **District Family Advocate** coordinated bi-monthly workshops for families and parent coordinators;
 - * **Family Institute for Diverse Learners 2015**, first ever district wide event to assist and support families of students with individual education plans;
 - * **First Books Drive** in collaboration with the UFT, AFT, NAACP, DC 37 and a myriad of other organizations, we distributed 40,000 books to families across the district to help **promote literacy** and access to rich, high-quality K-12 literature.

The year presented some challenges for us with the loss of one of our beloved principals Jeanene Breeden and several of our bright scholars. It is essential to honor their memories, while forging ahead with perseverance, hope, and resilience. We must also continue to value the unique strengths and talents of each child and provide a safe, nurturing environment which promotes academic excellence and ensures that our students develop lifelong skills on their journey to becoming productive members of our society. I look forward to our continued work together with administrators, staff, families and members of the community to develop and implement innovative programs that will continue to improve the quality of education our students receive.



They are the only high school presenters in the three-day conference. A summary of their presentation is below: **The Philosophical Relevance of Rhinocerotidae**

- Ron Gunczler and Nicholas Pape, Columbia Secondary School, New York

Philosophy education is being disrupted by superficial notions of relevance, and compromised by the clamor for philosophy curricula to be "relevant" in the vaguest sense. However admirable the underlying intent, the effort to increase philosophy's relevance is hindered by a mistaken, flawed, or absent definition of the word. Due to the lack of a concrete idea of relevance, discussions tend to fall back on a default definition that equates relevance with immediacy or practicality. While applauding the desire to make philosophy more relatable to students, we reject the assumption that relevance and immediacy are interchangeable; we propose an alternative concept of relevance: philosophy education is relevant when it provides a student with new angles and new ways of thinking. We illustrate this definition with examples from the media and classroom and explore how our conception of relevance could open up possibilities for philosophy instruction now and in the future for the set of the set

Angelyz Rohena Chosen for 2015 Congress of Future Medical Leaders in Boston, MA

NEW YORK — Angelyz Rohena, a 10th Grader at Columbia Secondary School of New York has been nominated to attend the Congress of Future Medical Leaders in Boston, MA on June 24-26, 2015. The Congress is an honors-only program for high school students who want to become physicians or go into medical research fields. The purpose of this event is to honor, inspire, motivate and direct the top students in the country who aspire to be physicians or medical scientists, to stay true to their dream and, after the event, to provide a path, plan and resources to help them reach their goal.

Angelyz Rohena was nominated by Dr. Connie Mariano, the Medical Director of the National Academy of Future Physicians and Medical Scientists to represent New York based on her academic achievement, leader-ship potential and determination to serve humanity in the field of medicine.

During the three-day Congress, Angelyz Rohena will join students from across the country and hear Nobel Laureates and National Medal of Science Winners talk about leading medical research; be given advice from Ivy League and top medical school deans on what is to expect in medical school; witness stories told by patients who are living medical miracles; be inspired by fellow teen medical science prodigies; and learn about cutting-edge advances and the future in medicine and medical technology.

"This is a crucial time in America when we need more doctors and medical scientists who are even better prepared for a future that is changing exponentially," said Richard Rossi, Executive Director, National Academy of Future Physicians and Medical Scientists. "Focused, bright and determined students like Angelyz Rohena are our future and she deserves all the mentoring and guidance we can give her."

The Academy offers free services and programs to students who want to be physicians or go into medical science. Some of the services and programs the Academy offers are online social networks through which future doctors and medical scientists can communicate; opportunities for students to be guided and mentored by physicians and medical students; and communications for parents and students on college acceptance and finances, skills acquisition, internships, career guidance and much more.

The National Academy of Future Physicians and Medical Scientists was founded on the belief that we must identify prospective medical talent at the earliest possible age and help these students acquire the necessary experience and skills to take them to the doorstep of this vital career. Based in Washington, D.C. and with offices in Boston, MA, the Academy was chartered as a nonpartisan, taxpaying institution to help address this crisis by working to identify, encourage and mentor students who wish to devote their lives to the service of humanity as physicians, medical scientists.

KAPPA IV Debate Team Competes at Columbia University

Scholars from KAPPA IV competed in a day-long debate tournament at Columbia University. KAPPA IV's Debate Team advisor, Douglas Almanzar, took five teams of two students to the competition, which hosted thirty-two teams in total from nine different schools across the city. This is KAPPA IV's fourth year in a partnership with Columbia University's Youth for Debate, which sends college students of all majors to train public school students in the art of the argument.

Prior to this partnership, KAPPA IV teachers and administrators noticed gaps in the school's curriculum, specifically, a lack of opportunity for students to discover and develop their own voices in real-world settings. Partnering with Youth for Debate helped to close that gap. The Columbia University students meet with participating students and teachers at KAPPA IV for two hours every Friday, spanning three months, to practice research and public speaking skills.

Kappa IV Bazaar

On Saturday, May 9, 2015, the KAPPA IV school community along with our PTA held a Bazaar outside of the school filled with community resources and games for students and their families. The street in front of the school was closed off from 9:00 AM to 4:00 PM to allow parents, students, teachers, and community members to explore fun activities and learn about services available in the Harlem community.





The Bazaar was set up like a fair, complete with a bouncy castle, face painting, and student dance performances. The Mott Hall Band, KAPPA IV student dancers and a former KAPPA IV parent DJ also provided entertainment. Representatives from Hot 97 provided giveaways along with help from our after school program Sheltering Arms Children and Family Services. Informational booths of all kind were set up for visitors,

including booths with strategies for parents to help their children succeed in school. Representatives from The Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC); Metro Plus and Harlem Hospital Senior Community also attended and health professionals were on call to offer free blood pressure screenings and glucose / cholesterol tests.

CSS Boys and Girls Rugby Teams win PSAL Trophies

In this year's Rugby 7's tournament held on Randall's Island, the Columbia Secondary School boys team took the city's championship trophy, and the girls team brought home the bronze.
