

The Duties of a Student

The first duty of a student in a class is to present himself/herself at the classroom before the class is scheduled to begin. Inattention to this duty will result in the acquisition of handwritten work. Habitual tardiness will result in an office referral and the receiving of a higher set of consequences. Tardiness disrupts the class proceedings and therefore disturbs the learning process. This will not be viewed kindly either by the teacher or the administration of Golden Meadow Middle School, particularly if it becomes a repetitive offense.

The second duty of a student is to present himself/herself with the required materials for the completion of, or participation in, the classroom procedures of the day. This information has usually been given to the student prior to the day of the class, by the teacher. Failure to bring these materials (book, binder, pen/pencil, loose leaf paper, etc.) hinders the student's participation in class and causes unnecessary delay as the student attempts to borrow these materials, or uses valuable classroom time having the teacher write out a hall pass so he or she may go to their locker to acquire the needed materials. When the student returns to class, he or she will cause a further disturbance by entering the class late and then having to ask the teacher to repeat the material, or disturbing a classmate by borrowing a notebook to catch up. This constitutes a major disturbance to the learning process of both the student and his/her classmates. This will not be viewed kindly either by the teacher or the administration of Golden Meadow Middle School, particularly if it becomes a repetitive offense.

The third duty of a student in a class is to pay attention to the class proceedings. THE PURPOSE OF THE STUDENT IN THE CLASS IS TO RECEIVE INSTRUCTION AND TO PARTICIPATE IN THE LEARNING PROCESS! Failing to remain attentive to the instruction of the teacher or the learning activities deprives the student of an education for which his parents and all taxpayers are contributing in order that he or she may become an educated and productive member of society.

A student may fail to pay attention during the learning process in a number of ways. These include but are not limited to the following:

Sleeping,

Drawing/doodling.

Copying notes missed due to excessive absence from class,

Talking to other members of the class during instructional time,

Giggling,

Asking questions for the purpose of distracting others from the learning process,


Using tactics or strategies to draw attention to oneself and away from the lesson,

Etc...

Most of these ways are well known to teachers since we were all students in middle school classes at one point in our lives. Teachers also realize that students will from time to time cause minor disturbances; it is the <u>repetitive</u> and/or <u>flagrant</u> behavior which results in the necessity for disciplinary action.

The last duty of a student is to realize that most of their fellow students attend school in order to prepare themselves for a career, either in the business world, or for continuing their education in a university, college, or specialty school system. It is not the privilege of any one student to disrupt the class proceedings/learning process and violate the rights of all the remaining students in the class. Respect should be shown to <u>ALL INDIVIDUALS</u>, <u>AT ALL TIMES</u>, whether they are students, parents, teachers, staff, or administration. This is quite simply a display of proper manners which every parent expects of their child. It should be practiced by students in the classroom. All adults do not necessarily meet this ideal code of behavior, and we understand that sometimes a student will lapse; but ONE correction should be enough! Respect for all individuals is something for which one should strive, and is probably the MOST IMPORTANT LESSON which a student can learn.

Unfortunately, it is the purpose of this essay to bring this information to the attention of those students who, for one reason or another, seem to lack an understanding of their purpose and responsibilities in the classroom and while on school grounds. It is the hope that the use of this information in one disciplinary action will provide the student with a code of behavior to make it unnecessary to repeat this action or to escalate the disciplinary action in a manner that would require the student's loss of privileges or removal from their current educational setting.
