Q: How long have you been working in the school PS 207? When did you join?


A: This is my 5th year at 207. I feel so lucky to have joined our 207 family in 2017.

HISTORY IN MAY

May is another month with a lot of history. Have you heard of Floyd Bennett Field? It was an Air Force base in the early to mid 1900s. Now, it is part of Gateway National Recreation area only a 15 minute drive from Howard Beach. It is used as a recreation center. Most importantly, it is used as a airport for the NYPD Aviation Unit. All their helicopters are stationed there. They are used to patrol and protect the city. But you may wonder, what does this have to do with history? Well, this field was named after Floyd Bennett, the first person to fly a airplane successfully over the North Pole, on May 9, 1926. Here are some pictures from the airfield.

Remember & Honor

The Germans controlled the French coast, and in order to retake Europe, the Allies had to first reclaim the French coast. Early in the morning, more than 150,000 British, Canadian, and American soldiers were brought over the English Channel. Beaches with the code names Omaha and Utah were attacked by the Americans. The Germans were bracing themselves for an attack from the east. The Allies had taken the beaches and secured them by night fall. The invasion cost some 2,500 Allied men their lives, but it was a military triumph. It was the beginning of the end of WWII.

On June 6, 1944 the Allies launched a massive invasion of Normandy during WWII. This day is known as "D - Day."
