






Composting Bin

207 is now a composting school!
Composting is a controlled, aerobic process that converts organic materials into a nutrient-rich, biologically-stable soil amendment or mulch through natural decomposition. The end product is compost. Microorganisms feed on the materials added to the compost pile during the composting process. They use carbon and nitrogen to grow and reproduce, water to digest materials, and oxygen to breathe.

Water Refill Stations Finally Come to 207!

Thanks to Councilwoman Joann Ariola, 207 students and staff can now pack less liquids to school each day, since they will be able to refill their bottles at our schools three new filtered water refill stations. We also tested the tap water in the building vs the filtered water and did find some slight differences in water quality. Our school's sustainability initiative aims at reducing waste and plastic use, and refill stations help us do this Here are three benefits:

Minimizes Plastic Waste: Single-use plastic bottles have a major negative impact on the environment and pollution. Refilling bottles helps cut down on the quantity of plastic trash that ends up in landfills and the ocean, as well as the demand for fresh plastic production.

Conserves Resources: Energy and natural resources like oil are needed in the production of plastic bottles. Reusing bottles can help preserve these resources and lessen the negative effects that raw material extraction and processing have on the environment.

Energy Savings: The energy used in the production of new plastic bottles adds to greenhouse gas emissions. By reducing the need for single-use bottle production, shipping, and disposal, refilling bottles helps save energy.

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
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

Ingredients

- Pretzels
- Chocolate- Milk chocolate or Wilton Candy Melts
- Sprinkles
- Wax paper

Instructions

- Melt chocolate in microwave or double boiler saucepan
- Dip pretzels in chocolate, top with sprinkles
- Place on parchment paper and let dry

- 15.25 ounce box strawberry cake mix
- ½ scant cup vegetable oil, or TB melted butter
- 2 large eggs
- White chocolate melting wafers, optional
- Heart sprinkles, optional

Instructions

- Preheat oven to 350 F
- Combine the cake mix, oil and eggs in a large bowl and stir until combined
- Scoop dough onto a piece of parchment paper on a tray
- Place tray in the oven for 9-11 minutes
- (Optional) decorate with sprinkles and melted chocolate
